

STOCKHOLDERS INVITED TO CONFERENCE

All National Farm Loan association members of Klamath county are invited to attend a special stockholders' meeting at Klamath Falls, May 26, it is announced by H. H. Dunbar, secretary-treasurer of the Klamath Falls N.F.L.A., who is making the local arrangements. The meeting will begin at 1:30 p. m. in the Willard hotel, Klamath Falls, Oregon.

"This informal assembly will be of vital interest to all farmers who own N.F.L.A. voting capital stock and who thereby have an indirect ownership interest in the Land bank of Spokane," Mr. Dunbar points out.

"The purpose is to give local stockholding member-borrowers a full explanation of the program for decentralizing the district Land bank's operations, rebuilding this cooperative mortgage system around the local associations and revitalizing the principle of farmer ownership and farmer control."

"Officials of the bank will be present to discuss this program fully and give members complete information about current operations. It is hoped that all members will attend and take an active part in the meeting, because this is a splendid opportunity to get questions answered and develop a bond of better understanding between the local associations and the district bank. A good part of the session will be devoted to informal round-table discussion."

Precision Gained In New Machines

"It is necessary to imagine a Cadillac car more than 60 miles long to explain the super standards of precision observed by Cadillac-LaSalle craftsmen," says Nicholas Dreystadt, general manager.

"For instance, it is almost impossible to visualize such a measurement as 7-100,000ths of an inch," he said. "That is the widest variation permitted when pistons

are fitted into the cylinders of Cadillac and LaSalle motors.

"In order to make clear what happens when an inch is split into 100,000 divisions, let us assume that we have a Cadillac car 60 miles long. The pistons then would be a full mile in diameter. And if the builders followed Cadillac precision standards, they would fit those mile-wide pistons to a variation limit of only one and one-quarter inches."

"Pistons and cylinders normally are manufactured to limits of 2 100,000ths of an inch," he said. "A satisfactory fit is obtained through the usual practice of sorting them into six or eight different size classifications. At Cadillac, however, we divide the 2,100,000ths limit pistons and cylinders into 30 separate classifications."

Liquor Commission Verdict Appealed

Jane O'Shea, operator of the Little Duck Inn, has appealed to the circuit court from a decision of the state liquor control commission revoking her beer license.

The plaintiff denies that she has operated a disorderly establishment, and prays the court for an order to require the defendant to certify and transmit all its records, papers, etc. in the case.

POPPY DAY HELP URGED BY YOUNG

An appeal for all veterans of the World War and other patriotic citizens to pay tribute to the war dead by wearing memorial poppies on Poppy Day, Saturday, was issued today by Tom Young, commander of Klamath Falls Post of the American Legion. Commander Young also urged generous contributions in exchange for the flowers to aid the war's living victims, the disabled veterans and families of the dead and disabled.

"Saturday will be Poppy Day in Klamath Falls," the commander said, "when we all will be called upon to wear the memorial flower of the World War dead and make contributions for the welfare of those who sacrificed health and strength as part of the price of the nation's World War victory. I am sure that all patriotic citizens will wear the symbolic little flower and will contribute as liberally as their means permit for the work of mercy and relief the poppy makes possible."

"Poppy Day contributions are used by the American Legion and auxiliary to help disabled veterans in hospitals, to help their families at home, to aid children left without a father's support because of the war, and in all phases of Legion and auxiliary work for the war's living victims. Every penny is made to serve effectively for the purposes for which it is donated under the administration of the Legion and Auxiliary's volunteer workers."

"Poppies will be distributed by the women of the auxiliary, the wives, mothers, sisters, and daughters of the men of the Legion. They will work without compensation of any kind, giving their time and effort gladly to honor the dead and serve the living. I hope we will respond in the same spirit when they offer the poppies on the streets Saturday."
