

MEMORIAL DAY PLANS FORMED

MERRILL, May 19.—Memorial day services will be held under auspices of the Merrill post of the American Legion Saturday, May 30, in the Community hall, beginning at 10 a. m., with the Rev. Forrest C. Traville, pastor of the Merrill Presbyterian church, as the principal speaker. Dr. R. M. Stevenson, pastor of the Malin Presbyterian church, will offer prayer.

Brief talks will also be made by Pete Sorenson, commander of the Merrill post, and by a representative from the Malin post. Frank Mosbacher, commander of the Tulelake post, has also been invited to take part in the program.

The Merrill Boy Scout troop will officiate at the flag raising, and members of the Camp Fire Girls' organization will take part in the program. Musical numbers will be sung by the Epworth League choir of the Merrill Presbyterian church, and Maxine and Marjorie Harterode will sing a duet number. Numbers will also be played by the Klamath Basin band.

Lack of buying power, rather than selling pressure, pulled support from under industrial leaders. Dullness ruled throughout the greater part of the session, transfers approximating 900,000 shares.

The list dropped from the start as traders, generally, thought they saw a reverse signal in the failure of the market yesterday to respond more vigorously to the voidance of the Guffey coal act.

The fact that equities, for the past several weeks, have virtually ignored highly favorable business news was also seen as an inducement for many boardroom customers to seek the sidelines.

MARKETS CARRIED TO LOW LEVELS

CHICAGO, May 19. (AP)—Weakening of wheat prices carried both the Winnipeg market and the Liverpool market today to fresh low levels for the present crop year.

Favorable North American wheat crop prospects were reported as exerting greater influence upon world prices. Cables said there were continued urgent offerings of Canadian wheat abroad, with demand in-

sufficient owing in part to improved weather in western Europe.

Wheat closed unsteady, 1-1 1/2 cents under yesterday's finish. May 22-2, July 85-85 1/2, corn 1-1/2 down, May 83 1/2-3, oats 1-1/2 off, and provisions varying from 2 cents decline to 5 cents gain.
