Cantwell Discovers "New Hope"

Beer's Former Trainer Discards Britton for ex-Trojan, Stuhldreher Takes Up Job at Wisconsin.

Mike Cantwell, former trainer for the ex-heavyweight fight champion, Max Baer, has found another "hope" for a trial at the loftiest honor of pugilism. The battle is a young fellow by the name of Odell. Odell is a former University of Southern California football player and is supposedly built for speed and hard hitting.

The fact that Mike has lined up a fighter by the name of Odell is not especially interesting. It is interesting to know, however, that Cantwell is still hunting "boxing ivory."

Cantwell first came into the Klamath country a couple of years ago. He was sore because he got into some kind of a controversy with Baer and Ancil Hoffman at the time of the Primo Carnera fight. What he wanted was a young giant who could step right in and knock Champion Max's block off.

Since then Joe Louis and Jim Braddock have accomplished the trick, but Cantwell still is looking for talent.

He picked up a young fighter here—Murray Britton—and took him to southern California with the intention of building him into a champion. Apparently Britton didn't pan out and Odell has replaced him as Cantwell's newest hope.

The Stuhldreher influence beat the new Wisconsin athletic director—coach to the punch. There were nearly 50 candidates out for spring football practice at Madison before the key man of Notre Dame's immortal Four Horsemen arrived from Villanova to straighten out the mix-up created by the comic opera row between the departed Walter Meanwell and Tubby Spears. It was largely anticipation that brought out the boys.

Harry Stuhldreher, blocker and pilot of what perhaps was the most famous backfield that ever played the game, was presented to all University of Wisconsin department heads by President Glenn Frank.

This was an innovation at Wisconsin, and should have been an existing barrier between faculty members and the new chief of athletics. If it falls in this, Stuhldreher will break them down on his own. He's that kind of chap—a diplomat as well as an able gridiron guide and tactician.

"Our work has only started," says a member of the Badger athletic board. "We will continue to keep in close contact with Stuhldreher and assist him in every possible manner. We will attempt to cement all rifts that have occurred in the past."

"We feel that Stuhldreher soon will solve most of the perplexing problems of athletics peculiar to the Badger campus."

Stuhldreher has been given full authority by the athletic board. He has been told that any changes he wishes to make in the current athletic department setup will be made immediately, but Hank Casserly, sports editor of the Madison Capital-Times, tells me it is the hope of the board that Harry will retain as many of the older members of the staff as possible.

Stuhldreher found a rather plentiful supply of backfield candidates—at least plentiful for Wisconsin—but he is faced with lack of a line comparable to that of any other Western Conference institution. There is a dearth of center guards, and tackles who can move. Finding men for the center of the Badger forward wall is the gravest problem with which Stuhldreher has to contend.

Ed Koltun, a guard who did not report last season, due to a heavy schedule in the school of engineering, may be of some help, as he has shown speed and a desire to get in the thick of things.

The sound of Capt. John Golemske's name made Stuhldreher, of Notre Dame, feel perfectly at home. Captain John suffered a sprained ankle playing interfraternity baseball, but it had healed in time for him to be on hand when the new coach first met the Badger squad.

STRUGGLE ENDS WITHOUT FALL

Christy Captures Short Semi-Windup From Cecil McGill.

Battered down by 60 minutes of exhausting wrestling, Pete Belcastro and Cowboy Chick stood all even at the close of a terrific main event at the Klamath armory last night.

For one full hour the top heavyweights of the Klamath mat season battled for the advantage that never came. In the end, neither had gained a fall and the issue between them remained unsettled.

Records Kept Clean

The Wyoming cowboy still is listed with a perfect record and Belcastro, the junior heavy-weight champion of the Pacific coast, can claim an unblemished state for the present season.

Any way you look at it, the match was a draw. It decisions were possible in wrestling, neither athlete could have been awarded any degree of superiority over his opponent.

The cowboy edged away from Belcastro's drop kicks and Sonnenbergs. Belcastro miraculously escaped the airplane spin that has counted for so many of Chick's Klamath Falls victories.

When the match closed both wrestlers appeared about ready to drop from weariness.

Huge Audience Present

It was a real fight that kept the huge audience on the edge of its chairs. At any moment it seemed one or the other grapple would break through his rival's defense and gain a deciding fall.

The powerful Chick, although he frequently hoisted Belcastro onto his shoulder, could never get free from the ropes long enough to start a split. Belcastro at times hung on with his feet and hands.

Referee Ray Friable spent a busy evening keeping Belcastro in line. Gouging and kneeling, the junior champion wore Chick down more with questionable tactics than legitimate holds.

Chick's wide assortment of holds—some that Pete probably had never seen before—gave him the advantage in aggressiveness. Belcastro, however, proved he could take everything the cowboy had to offer, come back for more and still make things pretty troublesome on his own account.

Christy Beats McGill

In the shortest three-fall match on record here, Ted Christy of California slammed through to a win over the youthful Cecil McGill of Los Angeles in the semi-windup.

Rushing out of his corner, Christy, known for his toughness, pounced McGill to the mat and put him down with a hammerlock in 1 minute and 17 seconds.

McGill, light and fast, came out for the second round and with a series of drop kicks and Sonnenbergs leveled Christy in 17 seconds. In that brief time, McGill locked his legs in the ropes and battered him with drop kicks.

A hammerlock after 25 seconds of the third round gave Christy the victory.

Unable to continue after the third round, Tiger Taskoff of Bulgaria lost the opener to Bob Kennison of Chicago. Taskoff won a fall in the second round with a Boston crab hold. A reverse headlock in the third gave Kennison the win.

The three matches were the best Mack Lillard has rolled in to one program this season.

GIANTS, TRIBE FAIL TO DRAW

Important Contenders Unable to Build Up Following.

The rather unusual spectacle of two teams, in the middle of two battles for the lead in their respective leagues and both apparently unable to make the fans take notice, is to be seen in the major leagues these days.

They are the New York Giants and Cleveland Indians, second and third respectively in the standings. They've both had a few good gatherings, but Cleveland already is facing the spectacle of dwindling attendance while the New York attitude is that the often-injured Giants can't hold together for very long.

Tribe Beats Yanks

Fewer than 5,000 fans turned out to see the Tribe engage in a "crucial" struggle with the league-leading New York Yankees and go down, 10 to 4.

The Giants were rained out in their final game against Pittsburgh and got a welcome breathing spell before tackling the St. Louis Cardinals, who lead them by a half game. The Cincinnati-Brooklyn and St. Louis-Phillies games also were postponed.

Cleveland's defeat gave the Detroit Tigers a chance to come closer to third place as Tommy Bridges found some of his best form and pitched them to a 4 to 2 victory over Washington while the Red Sox kept pace with the Yanks by pulling out to a 3 decision over the Chicago White Sox. Rogers Hornsby's re-viving Browns bowled over the Athletics, 8 to 4. The day's other contest saw the Boston Bees beat out Chicago's Cubs 6 to 5.

Old Star Quits

Remarking idle didn't prevent the Dodgers from taking another hit in the clinch when Freddy Lindstrom, veteran outfielder, decided he wasn't doing himself or anyone else much good as a Brooklyn player and announced his retirement from baseball. He was signed by the Dodgers in January after being unconditionally released by the Cubs and had hit only 24 in 26 games. A leg injury suffered last Friday was believed to have prompted the decision.

Lone American Loses in England

SOUTHPORT, Eng., May 20. (AP)—Marion Milley, America's lone survivor in the British women's golf championship, was eliminated in the quarter finals this morning by Bridget Newell, the favorite, 4 to 3.

Miss Milley was one down at the turn, but started back with three sixes, five over par, and lost all three holes. She managed to cut this lead to three at the 14th, when she got a par to Miss Newell's four, but she slipped again on the short 15th and Miss Newell won the hole and the match with a par.

His feat was unusual if not amazing. He had driven 120 miles alone from Carpinteria, where he teaches school, and arrived at Whittier stadium with hardly time to limber up weary legs.

Six years ago the former Trojan ace set a world's record of 9.4 in the 100-yard dash that still stands.

Still another "comeback" venture proved successful last night when William (Bill) Graver, who set a world's pole vault record of 14 feet 4½ inches, turned in a leap of 14 feet 3 inches and captured the event.
