HELENA, Mont., May 20. (UP)—Montana's two major political parties Tuesday selected delegates to the national conventions with President Franklin D. Roosevelt receiving the unanimous support of the democratic slate.

The eight republican delegates to the national convention at Cleveland, June 22, will go uninstructed. Each delegate will have one vote. Eight alternates were also selected.

Sixteen delegates to the democratic national convention from Montana will cast one-half vote each for Roosevelt. Sixteen alternates were chosen.
