

COLLEGE BOY KILLS FRIEND, SHOOTS SELF

WILLIAMSTOWN, Mass., May 19. (UP)—Lewis Jack Summers, Meriden, Conn., 19-year-old Williams college freshman, shot and killed a class mate in his dormitory room Tuesday, wounded another then shot himself through the head. President Tyler Bennett announced.

Robert Paul Hennesberry, 19, of Chicago, died instantly with a bullet through the heart, and William H. Hartz, 18, also of Chicago, was wounded in the shoulder.

Summers died from his wound.

Third Not Badly Hurt

Hartz was taken to the college infirmary where his condition was reported not serious.

The murder-suicide was discovered by George Clyde, a freshman of Santa Barbara, Cal., who reported to President Bennett and Dean Charles R. Keller that his attention was attracted by four pistol shots in Summers' room.

Bennett said he believed Summers had become mentally deranged over his studies.

Reconstructing the tragedy, college authorities said Hennesberry, son of George Hennesberry, wealthy Chicago rotogravure printer, and Hartz, had gone to Summers' room in Lehman hall after supper.

Strange Expression

As the two appeared in the doorway, Summers whirled around with a strange expression on his face. Words were exchanged briefly, then he opened fire with a .22 caliber automatic pistol, one of two he had acquired recently.

His first shot struck Hennesberry in the head. Hennesberry fell mortally wounded.

Summers fired twice at Hartz, only one bullet taking effect.

He sent the fourth bullet through his own head and died instantly.

VACATION SCHOOL OPENS ON JUNE 7

MERRILL, Ore.—Summer vacation school to be held under the auspices of the Holy Cross Catholic church will begin Sunday, June 7, and continue through Monday, June 22, with classes scheduled to be held from 9 a. m. until 2:30 p. m. in the Merrill school building with the exception of classes for children of pre-school age. The smaller students will be dismissed at 11:30.

Arrangements are being made for teaching five classes, one for children of pre-school age; a communion class; two for children of intermediate ages and one for junior high school students.

Teachers are expected to be in attendance from the Sacred Heart Academy, Klamath Falls, and others will be recruited from young women familiar with teaching arts and crafts and other subjects.

Transportation is to be furnished free. Buses will go east as far as Malin, returning to Malin via the Dallas-California highway and the state line.

DORRIS, Calif.—The remodeling and enlarging of the two-story Evans building, which will be used as the Dorris hospital, being called the Gray hospital, is rapidly going forward. Six men are employed and the doctor expects to have most of the work completed by June 15.

When completed the building will have a capacity for ten beds, an x-ray room, modern furnace with humidifier and air cleaner, 12 rooms, plumbing for both stories, new easy stairs, and many other needed improvements along with a new coat of paint and composition shingle roof.

"Ghost Town" Reborn Under Citizen's Rule

MILL CITY, Ore., May 20. (UP)—Citizens of Mill City, unwilling to accept the status of a "ghost town" when the Hammond Lumber company closed and dismantled the only industry, were ready Tuesday to start sawing lumber in their cooperative mill before the end of the week.

The sawmill workers who set about pulling the town back to normalcy by its own bootstraps, pooled their meager savings, went around the state as salesmen to peddle stock in the cooperative, bought a portable sawmill and established a logging camp.

Legs on Hand

The camp is now sending 16 carloads of logs to the mill over the cooperative railroad each day, and the mill pond already holds 300,000 feet of timber.

When the mill's saws start whining, production will not equal that of the big Hammond mill, but workmen believe they can make enough money by careful operation to save their homes and draw regular wages.

Merchant Buys City

For awhile last winter, some of the residents of the Santiam river mill town were in desperate plight, foodless and too proud to ask for relief. State and county agencies stepped in.

Ray Babb, Eugene merchant, bought Mill City in its entirety when the Hammond Lumber company closed its Oregon logging and milling operations. It appeared tonight as if the stubborn workmen who refused to give up their homes and take their families away in search for other jobs, had made Mill City a good investment for Babb.

Il Duce Orders Highways Built In New Colony

ROME, May 20. (UP)—Premier Benito Mussolini's new imperial machine moved forward on four points Tuesday to defend, consolidate, exploit and commemorate Italy's conquest of Ethiopia.

Developments included:

1. Issuance of orders for immediate construction of 1740 miles of paved highways in Ethiopia.
2. A command to all able-bodied fascists between the ages of 21 and 55 to enroll in the fascist militia.
3. Beginning of a nation-wide

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consensus in Ethiopia designed to facilitate political, social and military reorganization of the new colony.

4. An appeal for subscriptions for construction of a national monument in Rome commemorating the beginning of the new fascist empire and honoring those who fell winning it.
