"The hitch-hikers didn't say much any of the time I was with them. They didn't threaten to kill me, except by the implication when they ordered me around with the gun."

tions. The employers previously had voted a wage increase asked by the unions.

The lockout began after 600 men walked out in five camps. Employers began shutting down logging operations.

Sawmill employers here said for the most part that their supply of logs would be exhausted by the end of this week or the first of next week, necessitating a cessation of their operations.

The shutdown has been accompanied by a show of violence in the Portland district. Two men were beaten up within the past few days and the headrig of one sawmill was destroyed. Detectives were investigating in an effort to learn whether the headrig had been tampered with.

PENSION CHIEF DENIES CHARGE

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 21. (UP)—The sultry Oklahoma air grew blistering hot Wednesday as Gomer Smith, vice president of the Townsend organization, gave answer to charges that he bought firewater for Indians with organization funds.

Smith enlarged upon his opinion of the congressional committee which is investigating old age pension schemes by flatly defying the committee to subpoena him.

Inquisition "Those scandal mongers can go to hell," he shouted as a beginning. His further denunciations of the committee probably were noted by the weather bureau as unprintable causes of high temperatures.

"The tyranny of King George, which brought on the revolution, was gentleman's conduct compared to that of this committee," he said after cooling a degree or two. "This inquisition is being conducted overbearing. The one idea is to bust the Townsend movement."

Political Machine Blamed Smith asserted that the democratic machine of Boss Tom Pendergast in Missouri was responsible for the present investigation. Pendergast fears that only the Townsend movement can impair his strength in Missouri and has determined to wreck the movement, Smith said.

Representative Jasper Bell, democrat, Missouri, chairman of the committee and James R. Sullivan, its counsel, are members of the Missouri democratic machine.

Running for Senator "If Bell's committee wants to start a fight with me, they're welcome," Smith roared. "If I have to go to jail to preserve the constitutional rights of myself and other citizens, my advice to the committee is to get the cell ready now!"

As for the firewater for the Indians, Smith exploded with: "That's a lie, every word of it. Neither state or national Townsend organizations have contributed or spent a damned dime in my behalf."

Smith is campaigning for a United States senatorship on a Townsend platform.

cratic nomination for state treasurer, to 14 votes today.

Rechecks in Klamath county added 13 votes to Burt's total and slashed four from Allen's and previous revisions in Josephine and Benton counties added two votes to Burt's figure and cut Allen's by 17. With returns in 19 counties officially rechecked, the vote stood:

Allen 41,859, Burt 41,845.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 21. (AP)—New revisions of the final vote in Josephine and Benton counties cut the lead of Jack Allen, Pendleton, over U. S. Burt, Corvallis, for the democratic nomination for state treasurer to 31 votes today.

The revision in Benton county, where Burt lives, cut 17 votes from the figure previously given Allen and added six to Burt's, while the Josephine recheck sliced four votes from Burt's figure and left that for Allen unchanged.

The new state total stood: Allen 41,863, Burt 41,832. Before the revision, Allen had led by 50 votes.
