

### RESEARCH PROJECT WILL START HERE

A survey of historical records, carried on as a nation-wide project under the WPA has been launched in Klamath county, according to an announcement from Carl Christensen, who will be in charge of the local field work.

Laura K. Phillips of Portland is assistant state director of the project, the purpose of which is to investigate and record all government documents of historical nature.

Examination of public records found in courthouses, city halls, libraries, universities and museums, as well as private records of historical significance.

Results of the survey will be printed by the University press at Eugene, and will constitute a basis for future specialized research work.

**DORRIS, Calif.**—W. T. Atkin is leaving Butte Valley high school next year to go to Yreka where he will take over the duties of principal with a staff of 15 teachers.
