

REPUBLICANS MAY CAPTURE LEGISLATURE

SALEM, Ore., May 22. (UP)—Results of the primary election brought foreboding today of a republican legislature for the 39th assembly in January, 1937.

A house with 40 or 45 G. O. P. members instead of the 22 of the regular session more than a year ago or the 26 of the special session last fall has been predicted. The senate is expected to hold its republican majority without difficulty.

Veterans of past sessions have good chances of returning to the legislature—especially from Multnomah county where the republicans nominated 12 men and one woman who have served in Salem before. The democrats named only three previous legislators.

Editors over the state have hailed results of the primary as proof of a "sane" election and commended the nomination of experienced lawmakers for a session that is certain to be important.

The next session will be called upon to find new ways of financing relief to supplement liquor revenues. Million-dollar appropriations will be sought for state buildings. The state penitentiary's parole system will undoubtedly come before the session despite the outcome of the case brought by Earl H. Fehl, ex-judge of Multnomah county judge. A southern Oregon judge has promised to work for a change in the habitual criminal statute. License fees for trucks will be debated. There will be other problems galore.

Five members of the last legislature who ran for re-election lost out in the primaries.

Marion county turned down Mrs. Hannah Martin, Salem attorney. Multnomah failed to renominate Rep. Ellis W. Barnes, Portland. Linn forgot Rep. T. W. Munyan, Lebanon. Hood River overlooked Rep. M. M. Hill. Morrow, Umatilla and Union counties gave the cold shoulder to Sen. J. G. Barratt of Heppner.

But the "old guard" came back strong. Multnomah nominated on the republican ticket for the house Gust Anderson, F. H. Dammasch, Robert S. Farrell, Jr., John H. Hall, Frank Lonergran, John H. McCourt, Stanley Meyers and Harvey Wells, all members of previous sessions. In the senate race, Dorothy McCullough Lee, Henry L. Corbett, Allan A. Byson, all in the upper house last year, and Homer Angell and Seneca Fouts, ex-representatives, were nominated.

Democrats in the metropolitan area named Charles H. Leach, and Delbert A. Norton, last year's representatives, and William L. Dickson, who aspired to advance from the house to the senate.

In Deschutes county, republicans wrote in the name of M. A. Lynch, Redmond, former legislator. In Josephine county, W. A. Johnson, ex-representative, was the republican nominee for the senate against W. T. Miller, democrat, another representative.

E. L. Ross, Washington county democrat, and John Thornburgh, republican, both former members of the house, will contest for the senate. Ross was in the legislature last year; Thornburgh in 1931.

Other previous lawmakers to

win were: A. M. Janneson, Washington county; Fred W. Herman, Columbia county; and H. H. Chindgren, Clackamas, all republicans for the house, and Arthur McPhillips, Yamhill democrat.

Senators of the last session still in the running are Walter S. Fisher, Douglas; N. G. Wallace, Deschutes; W. H. Stelwer, Gilliam, Sherman and Wheeler; Robert M. Duncan, Grant-Harney; Malheur and Isaac E. Staples, Tillamook-Lincoln, formerly of Multnomah.

Grand Coulee Dam Imperiled, Ickes Claims

WASHINGTON, May 22. (UP)—Work on Grand Coulee dam and other reclamation projects must halt unless congress appropriates \$61,000,000 for the bureau of reclamation. Public Works Administrator Harold L. Ickes said Thursday.

The senate placed amendments providing money for Grand Cou-

lee, Deschutes, Roza, Gwyhee and other projects in the interior department bill, but the house voted them out, leaving the reclamation bureau without funds for the 1935-1937 fiscal year.

No Work-Relief Funds
Ickes said he didn't think there was any chance to finance the projects from the pending \$142,000,000 work-relief bill. "I think our \$61,000,000 request was reasonable," Ickes said, criticizing the house's action, which forced the bill into

conference. "Of that sum, \$38,000,000 would go directly for work and \$24,000,000 for administrative expenses."

Ickes said the government may be liable for contractors' suits if work is halted on Grand Coulee and other projects. Commenting specifically on Grand Coulee, Ickes said: "We will have enough money to keep work continued there until about October 1."

Washington Demo Convention Gives Promise of Fight

ABERDEEN, Wash., May 22. (UP)—A bitter struggle for power between left and right wings of the democratic party was in prospect for the state convention here today and Saturday. The convention will elect 16 delegates to the national meeting at Philadelphia June 23, a month old age pension plan, choose eight presidential elec-

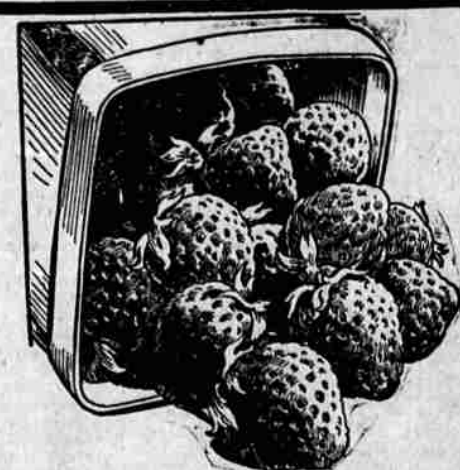
