HOUSES BUILT FOR WILD WATERFOWL

Every home owner has at some time or other built houses for the birds in order that they might add to the beauty of his grounds or help eliminate insects in the garden. Martins, bluebirds, wrens, flickers, owls, and many others may easily be induced to come into one's yard and make their homes. However, few, if indeed any, ever thought to try building bird houses for waterfowl.

Several species of ducks nest in trees. The wood duck, as the name suggests, selects a large knothole or wide limb usually in an oak on some secluded pond or stream deep in the woods or on a wooded lake. Acorns are one of its favorite foods so hence the oak. Next we have the bufflehead, more commonly called butternut, which picks a deserted flicker's hole high in a dead stub where the eight or ten ducklings hatch in perfect safety from prowling skunks or weasels. Goldeneyes, or whistlers, hollowed merrangers, red breasted merrangers, also, termed fishducks, or sawills, take a similar elevated position to rear their young, sometimes as high as 40 or 50 feet. Naturally the question arises: How do the young reach the ground once hatched, for they do not remain in the nest until able to fly but leave almost immediately. This question has caused much controversy among naturalists. Authentic reports give two procedures, one being that the mother bird comes to the foot of the tree or nearby in the water and calls, whereupon the little ones waddle to the edge of the nest and tumble out onto the ground suffering no harm from the fall; the other is for the old bird to carry the young out in her bill or on her back. Both are probably true. At any rate, these ducks do live in trees.

Anyone living in the nesting vicinity can successfully attract tree-nesting ducks by placing houses of the proper type. The United States Biological Survey, U. S. Forest Service, and other bureaus devoted to the welfare of wildlife have put up a large number of duck nesting boxes throughout national forests and wildlife refuges in the country with good success. These boxes are constructed of rough lumber or slabwood and measure eighteen inches in length, ten inches in width, by twelve inches in height, with a four inch opening half way up the front. They are not painted, ducks preferring the natural wood.

In this district the Biological Survey will place such boxes on Upper Klamath waterfowl refuge. Since the wood duck and bufflehead are becoming quite scarce, it is a very desirable thing to have these birds nesting on the refuge where they can be protected from predators and their habits observed. Members of the CCC camp at Clear lake, now located in a side camp at the former location, will carry out this project under the supervision of C. G. Fairchild, U. S. game manager, and agent for this district, C. W. Fensler, camp superintendent, and H. H. Dill, junior biologist.

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Warmer Weather Arrives Friday

Pleasant weather has returned to the Klamath basin after a week of high winds and near freezing temperatures, and the forecast for the coming weekend promises more fine weather with moderate temperatures.

A slightly rising barometric pressure was reported Friday by the local weatherman, and high and low temperatures were recorded at 70 and 45 degrees.

The state weather bureau predicts fair weather for Friday night and Saturday, except for cloudiness at times in the west portion. Warmer temperatures are in prospect in the interior Saturday, and moderate northwesterly winds off the coast are included in the forecast.

LUMBER INDUSTRY MAINTAINS PACE

PORTLAND, May 22 (AP)—The lumber industry kept up its production pace in the past week, averaging 7 per cent more new business than in the previous week, while orders continued to run 14 per cent ahead of 1935, the Western Pine association said today.

New business totaled 63,449,000 feet; shipments reached 60,339,000 feet and production increased to 73,433,000 feet. A year ago orders totaled 67,640,000 feet, production 61,734,000 feet, and shipments 57,122,000 feet.

Figures of the association showed that the business of the past week exceeded the three-year weekly average for May by nearly 11,000,000 feet in orders, 11,800,000 feet in shipments and 24,100,000 feet in production.

The total production thus far in 1936 is 870,347,000 against 667,708,000 in 1935, while shipments total 1,023,411,000 against 862,933,000 and orders aggregate 1,093,410,000 compared to 957,948,000 up to this time last year.

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GOVERNMENT HELD BIG COMPETITOR

PORTLAND, May 22 (AP)—The greatest competitor of business today is the government, which took 22 cents out of every dollar of national income last year. T. P. Cramer, secretary of the Oregon Bankers' association, told a meeting of the Portland Association of Credit Men.

"In 1934, the latest year for which figures are available, 89 per cent of the national income of \$48,400,000,000 went to persons receiving less than \$5,000 and less than 1 per cent to persons receiving \$100,000 or more. Therefore, the problem of taxation is one that must be considered and solved by the average individual who makes up the great bulk of our population," said Cramer.

"We, as individuals, have been so engrossed with making money that we have overlooked that as the government we have a responsibility we must accept in directing the policies of government."
