POWER COMPANY EXTENDS PIPES

California Oregon Power company is now extending water pipe to serve houses to be built in Frank Bryant's subdivision south of the city. About 35 or 40 connections are anticipated immediately, and more later.

The company is extending a new power line along the Midland road to insure ample power service for a rock crusher being installed by Harold Blake, who has the contract on completion of the Weed-Klamath highway. This line will also serve irrigation.

In about two weeks the transmission line between Bly and Sprague river will be stepped up from 11,000 to 22,000 volts, and new sub-stations will be installed at those two points.

LUMBER SURVEY PREDICTS RISE IN PURCHASING

Based upon a detailed economic analysis, the special lumber survey committee in its report to the department of commerce states that prospects indicated a continued gain in lumber consumption. However, no extraordinary rise in demand over usual seasonal increases is forecast and the survey committee recommends that any substantial addition to lumber production should follow actual demonstrated increases in demand rather than any anticipated gain.

The forest products division of the department of commerce in reviewing the committee's report points out that the "ills" of the lumber industry for several years have been due to a large extent to a lack of balance between production and demand. In fact, it has only been since August 1935 that the special lumber survey committee, during its four years of existence, has not recommended further general reductions in lumber stocks. It is, therefore, of utmost importance to the welfare of the industry that an additional rate of manufacture be restrained until a substantial increase in demand actually manifests itself.

Notwithstanding the committee's "warning" to the industry to guard against over-enthusiasm the findings of the committee were on the whole optimistic. Continued improvement in residential building is reported, with indications that home construction this year will approach if not equal 1931. There has recently been a substantial movement of lumber to replace stocks throughout the east which were either lost in the floods or utilized for repair and reconstruction purposes. The committee believes the railroad purchasing outlook continues comparatively favorable. Recent railroad orders for box and refrigerator cars are significant because of their large use of lumber, not to mention the railroad's important consumption for general maintenance purposes.

The forest products divisions also finds considerable satisfaction in the fact that the committee reports a comparative evenness in lumber prices during the past 20 months, with a slight upward trend since December. It is believed that reasonable price stability with increasing volume will in the long run be of greater benefit to the industry than successive price increases with wide fluctuations in consumption and loss of markets.

Piping Arrives for Tulelake Well

TULELAKE, Calif.—Approximately 900 feet of 10 1/2 inch casing to be used for the Tulelake water well, arrived this week to be placed in the near future.

Depth of the well is now near the 700 foot mark with drilling progressing steadily day and night after a brief delay a week ago.

Water in the hole is to be shut out with the sinking of the new casing and drilling will be continued in a dry bore.

WEEKEND FISHING PROSPECTS BETTER

Prospects of warmer weather this week-end brightened the hopes of Klamath country fishermen. Road conditions are improving and travel to the lakes and streams should be fairly heavy.

Word is received at the chamber of commerce that the road into Fish lake from this side is now passable, but chains are necessary. Trolling with worms and spinners should be good at Fish lake.

Fly fishing in the evening is good at Odell lake and it is expected trolling will be good this week-end if the weather holds warm.

The Willamette highway is open and in good condition to Odell lake lodge. It is closed beyond that point. The road from Willamette highway to Crescent lake is passable. Crescent lake lodge and Odell lake lodge are both open, as well as Summit lodge on the west side of Odell lake. The latter place can be reached by boat or train.

Paulina and East lake are turning out limit catches. The roads to those fishing places are in reasonably good shape.

North and South forks of Sprague river are now much lower and nice catches are being made there, mostly with spinners, worms or cluster eggs. Worms are proving effective bait on Seven Mile creek and Crane creek, and spinners are bringing some success. Some good-sized fish have been caught.

LOWER KLAMATH PROJECT VIEWED

MERRILL, Ore.—Possibility of re-flooding Lower Klamath lake came before members of the Service club Tuesday noon, resulting in a decision to appoint a committee of six to study obstacles of the proposed project and to solicit support of other organizations of the county in an effort to cover the old lake bed with water and thus in a measure eliminate the terrific dust storms that sweep across the basin from Klamath Falls to well east of Merrill.

Wilson Lee gave a brief report of the result of the first pack and field meet to be held on the new high school track here and a complete report is to be given by Jim Scoggins at next week's session.

Reports on the meet are to the effect that some records of the recent 20-30 meet held in Klamath Falls were exceeded by entrants here last Saturday and plans will continue to make the event an annual spring meet.

Study of problems taken up at this week's session will be continued next Tuesday.
