

Minor Riot Occurs as Tigers Down Indians

Leslie Fails to Equal Mark

Exceptionally Slow Times Recorded by Sprinter at Rook-Frost Track Meet at Hayward Field Friday Afternoon.

Bob Leslie, ex-Klamath high school sprint star and half-back, took a slow first place in the 100-yard dash and finished second in the 220-yard dash for the Oregon State Rooks Friday afternoon in the annual meet with the University of Oregon Freshmen at Hayward Field.

While Leslie was listed as one of the outstanding men of the meet, his times were far below expectations. Of course, weather conditions may have been a little contrary at Eugene.

The thing to note, however, is that Leslie has never equaled the .09.6 time he set two years ago in the Southern Oregon-Northern California intercollegiate meet at Modoc field.

There has always been a feeling that crediting Leslie with a record of .09.6 was a mistake. He ran the event in that time, of course, but the question is would he have done it had conditions been normal. There was a strong wind at his back when he started and it boosted him along all the way to the finish. Ordinarily, officials at a regulation meet would not permit a record so earned to stand permanently.

Bob himself may have built up some pretty high hopes on the .09.6. Perhaps they were too high. Yet again, under the stress of intercollegiate competition, he may run the dash even faster and become a leading candidate for the American Olympic team.

Veteran, Rookie Setting Pace in Major Leagues

NEW YORK, May 23, (AP)—A veteran and a youngster showed the way to the major league batters through yesterday's games with Bill Terry, manager of the New York Giants, setting the pace in the National league, and 23-year-old Joe DiMaggio, brilliant Yankee rookie, in front in the American league.

The averages of both fell off last week but Terry, appearing for the most part as a pinch hitter, kept his mark up to .455 for a 52-point advantage over Joe Medwick in the senior circuit. DiMaggio ended the week with an average of .411, a decline of only nine points. He took the lead yesterday when Billy Sullivan, Cleveland catcher, failed to get a hit and dropped to second place with a .400 percentage.

Terry, at bat five times in two games, collected only one hit while DiMaggio faced the opposing pitchers 23 times and pounded out nine safe blows. Medwick gained only one point but took second place behind Terry when Bill Brubaker of the Pirates failed to keep up the hot pace he traveled the previous week.

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PEEVISH FANS ENLIVEN GAME

Cleveland, Detroit Show Intense Rivalry In American Loop

By The Associated Press. Among the numerous baseball feuds that are kept alive from year to year by the natural rivalry between neighboring cities, that between the Detroit Tigers and Cleveland Indians seems to be building up to major proportions.

So far this season the American leaguers haven't followed the example of the older circuit and begun tossing punches but there was plenty of warmth displayed when the world champions hammered the Indians down 13 to 10 to gain another step on the field. A brief display of peevishness by the fans and players enlivened the game in the seventh when Al Simmons and Gerry Walker started a double steal and Simmons was safe at home when Catcher Billy Sullivan dropped the ball.

Frank, Paper Thrown. Manager Steve O'Neill and the other Indians gathered to protest Umpire Ormby's decision and the fans, evidently prepared for action, heaved fruit and paper on the field but the ruckus soon subsided.

The makings of another feud might have been seen in the indignities heaped upon the New York Giants by the Phillies. The National league cellar dwellers marched into the Polo Grounds, sent the converted infielder, Bucky Walters, to the hill to pitch four-hit ball and slammed out a 15 to 0 victory.

Tigers Make Gain. The defeat dropped the Giants a game and one-half behind the league-leading Cardinals, who celebrated a one-day stand in Pittsburgh by burying the Pirates 11 to 4.

The Phils failed to gain as Brooklyn rallied to take an 11 inning 4-3 decision from the Boston Bees. The only other game saw the Chicago White Sox defeat the Browns 5 to 3 behind the knuckleball flinging of the veteran, Ted Lyons.

The other clubs in both circuits were idle, and as a result Detroit was able to gain a half game on the Yankees and Red Sox. American league pace setters.

Grants Pass Favored To Down Defending Champions

Southern Oregon league teams will swing into the third week of their 12-game schedule next Sunday with last year's champion Klamath Falls Red Sox entertaining the Grants Pass Merchants at Modoc field and the surprising Glendale Loggers playing host to the Klamath Falls Pelicans. Both battles will start at 2:30.

At Klamath Falls one of the season's largest crowds is expected to witness the game between the two teams that battled it out down the stretch last season. Ken Williams, Merchant manager, will probably start his sensational young southpaw, Rob Hardy, on the mound with Al Droleite back of the plate. In his one start this year, Hardy trifled 11 Glendale batters and allowed only three hits, and is considered by Williams the most promising hurler to show his wares in southern Oregon for many years.

Vernon Francis, Red Sox manager, will counter with either Clyde Carlstrom, who pitched the Sox to the pennant last year, or Lowell Brown, former Portland high school lefthander. Carlstrom will probably get the call, however, as a result of his great performance against the Pelicans in the league opener when he fanned nine and allowed only four bingles.

Because of their upset win over the Red Sox last Sunday, Bill Willis' Glendale Loggers will be decided favorites to win from the cellarite Pelicans. Johnson will start on the mound for the Loggers with Thompson wearing the big mitt. For the Pelicans, either Oakes, or Ziff will do the pitching and Dougling the catching. In an attempt to strengthen their club, the Pelicans are looking for another pitcher, and if one is procured by Sunday, it should be a toss-up battle.

Fred Roper, Grants Pass business manager and Ken Williams, manager, have filed a complaint with the league president and secretary claiming Glendale signed Nelthammer. Grants Pass shortstop, without the latter obtaining a Grants Pass release. That is a flagrant violation of the league rules which forbids a player of one team jumping to another without a release from his former team. "It might be Kamm wasn't officially told," said Tuttle. "Frank Herman, our league secretary, who made the investigation of the Kamm-Umpire Genesha incident, said he would notify them both, and I had supposed he did."

"If Kamm deliberately violated the order, I would have to take the matter under advisement. It is hard to tell now what my decision might be."

"The suspension of Kamm applied only to the three final days of the series—Friday, Saturday and Sunday. I don't regard the situation created last night as very serious."

The tribe slid into a third place with the Mission Reds as the Portland Beavers bounced out of a triple tie into second and the San Francisco Seals slipped down to fifth. The Reds, Seals and Beavers have been changing places daily.

Two Homers Hit. The Seals got 16 men into the lineup as they lost to the Beavers 11-2. Every Beaver batter hit safely, and John Frederick four times in five trips to the plate.

Don Hurst pounded out two home runs to drive in four runs as Los Angeles won 8-5 last night. It was the third of the four games this week the Angels have won.

Under the leadership of Willie Kamm, who is supposedly under a three-day suspension, the Reds defeated the league leading Oakland club 7-5. With eleven strikeouts and only two hits Jack LaRocca looked a cinch to win for Oakland, but was lifted for a pinch hitter in the seventh. Acorn errors and hits of relief hurlers gave the Reds five ninth inning runs.

San Diego batters did better with 19 hits to smother Sacramento 17-3. George Myatt hit safely five out of six tries, Ernie Holman 4 out of 5, and Cedric Durrat 3 out of 4. Ray Jacobs, with a pair of doubles, drove in four runs. Durrat drove in 3, Myatt 2, and Holman 1.
