Bonneville Measure

Held Discriminatory

WASHINGTON, May 23, (AP)—Senator James P. Pope, (D, Or.) attacked the new "Bonneville" bill for operation of the Bonneville power project, declaring it discriminatory against Idaho, Montana and northern California.

The measure, given the senate a month this week, was a composite of bills formerly proposed by Senators Homer T. Bone and Lewis Schwellenbach of Washington, and Senators Charles McNary and Frederick Steiwer of Oregon.

Pope said the bill would increase the rate for electricity sold to public cooperative groups in ratio to the distance from Bonneville.

WOOL CLIP SALE

ALTURAS, Calif., May 23, (AP)—Sale of a wool clip of 115,000 fleeces was revealed here today by Roy R. Baker, local wool broker. The clip was from Lake County, Ore., and prices were 2 1/2 to 2 3/4 c. Portland and Boston firms were the successful bidders.

PASTOR ATTACKS AGNOSTIC THEORY

"Atheistic or agnostic evolutionists have assumed the position as judges of a matter of which they know practically nothing, and over which they have no control whatever," said Rev. J. N. Hoover of Santa Cruz, Calif., in Klamath Temple, of which church the Rev. Fred Hornshuh is pastor. Continuing he said:

"The theories and skepticism of men are blasphemous. Men had nothing to do with the origin of life, the formation of this earth, sun, moon, or the millions of stars seen and unseen. Man can make a perfect likeness of a living thing, but man cannot put life into an image. You cannot put your finger on a single thing man has created. When will man learn the limitation of his knowledge, power and life? The theories of the origin of life are trifling when compared with the Word of God, which no man or nation has been able to change or destroy.

"We must distinguish the difference between evolution and science, for science deals with facts while evolution is a speculative theory, a philosophy of the origin of life based upon hypotheses. When a Darwinian evolutionist tells me from a speck of protoplasm came a multitude of creatures, including man, I ask him to give me the origin of protoplasm.

"No well informed persons object to the study of evolution, but when we are asked to accept theories as facts, there immediately arises a division of opinion. Beyond the Biblical account of the origin of life man has no knowledge. These fellows who tell us man is the offspring of the ape and monkey should not be ashamed to associate with their own folks once in a while. Man no more had his origin in the monkey family than the offspring of an elephant is a canary bird. Like beetles like, all flesh is not the same kind of flesh. The evolutionist who rejects the Biblical account of creation should tell us what insect, reptile, fish, bird or brute we should address as father. The denial of the inspiration of the Holy Scriptures and the rejection of the supernatural is the fundamental propaganda of the agnostic evolutionist.

"How long this world has been in existence we do not know. Theories are not facts. Adam never lived in the Garden of Eden one year, or one thousand years. This is immaterial. The fact of facts is the fact that he lived, and back of that fact is the fact of God the origin of life."

Dr. Hoover will be speaking in the Klamath Temple Sunday morning at 11:00 o'clock on "Heaven, Is It a Locality? If So, Where Is It?" At 7:45 he speaks on "What Is Communism?"

Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, May 23, (AP)—Buoyed by the strength of steel and specialties, stocks got another grip on recovery in today's market. Many issues pushed ahead to two or more points. The close was firm. Transfers approximately 400,000 shares.

Among the foremost gainers were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Youngstown Sheet and Tube, American Steel Foundries, Sears, Roebuck & Montgomery Ward, Western Union, Pullman, Dupont, Douglas Aircraft, Johns Manville, U. S. Smelting, U. S. Industrial Alcohol, Westinghouse, Santa Fe, Delaware & Hudson and New York Central. Greyhound was up around five at its best in response to the declaration of an initial dividend.

The motors were only moderately ahead, as were most of the utilities and rails.

Optimistic items studied in the board rooms included: The report of the F. W. Dodge corporation, in April exceeded that of the same month last year by 9 per cent; that forecast of President Alfred P. Sloan, Jr., of General Motors that the company's sales this month probably will equal those of the previous period, which were the highest on record; Secretary of Labor Perkins' estimate that private industry, between March and April 15, added more than 255,000 persons to its payroll, and that durable goods employment is up to the October, 1930, level.
