PITCHER STOPS VALLEY OUTFIT

Carlstrom Lets Invaders Down with Two Hits Here Sunday.

Sparked by the magnificent work of Pitcher Carlstrom, the Klamath Falls Red Sox, defending champions of the Southern Oregon league, made a brilliant comeback on Modoc field Sunday afternoon by trouncing the Grants Pass Merchants, 9-1.

Last week the Sox were unexpectedly upset by the Glendale Loggers. All four teams in the circuit have now tasted defeat. The Red Sox are tied for the top position.

Carlstrom stopped the Merchants cold until the eighth inning, when they managed to work across their single run. The invaders from the valley could collect two hits off the curves of the Klamath right-hander.

The Red Sox got off to a flying start in the first inning. Brooks singled and was sacrificed to second by Shipman. Hammerstein came on and Brooks scored on an error. The Red Sox scored three times in the second, and one in the fourth.

The big inning came in the fifth, when the Sox drove Lanning from the box. Before the relief hurler, Hardy, could get control of the game, four runs had been scored on five hits.

The cannonading Salem Senators posted the best offensive mark while Bend turned in the best defensive performance in opening games of the state baseball league Sunday.

Salem beat Eugene 13 to 3. Bend beat Hot Gold 4 to 0 and Toledo took Albany 7 to 3. Woodburn, seventh league member, will swing into action next Sunday.

The Senators, comprising most of the state collegiate championship team of Willamette university, banged out 15 hits. Catcher Howard Maple hit four times to drive in five runs. Gastineau, six-foot-three Solon hurler, had a shutout until Van Vleet homed with two men on base in the ninth.

Ray Brooks' high school stars on the Hop Gold team played errorless ball behind Red Miller, veteran hurler, but touched Roberts of Bend for only five hits and no runs. Johnny Londahl, Bend field captain, won most of the awards offered for opening-day "fruits."

Ted Pillette, Toledo hurler, allowed but two hits until the ninth inning when the Albany batters drove in three runs with four bingles.

Slugging Yankees Climbing Fast; New Murderers' Row Does Damage

It looks as if the Yankees will be hard to stop as long as Tony Lazzeri and Frank Crosetti continue to vie with Rookie Joe DiMaggio for the Italian vote of the New York fans and the honor of setting the pace of the revived "murderers' row."

The colorful "De Mag" should have the credit, perhaps, for the Yankees' hitting revival which has kept them at the top of the American league standing but the veteran Lazzeri is the hero everywhere from Mulberry Bend to Telegraph Hill.

Baseball Marks Fall

Tony, putting to rest all reports he isn't as spry as he used to be, staged a hitting spree in Philadelphia which produced six home runs in two days and a new American league record for runs batted in during a single contest.

Another odd record or two fell before Tony's bat as he led the Yankees to a double victory over the Athletics Saturday and the most one-sided triumph of the season, 15 to 2 Sunday.

In Sunday's game, Lazzeri drove in 11 runs, hitting three homers—two with bases full—and a triple. That surpassed by two the old American league record held by Jimmie Foxx and fell just one short of Jim Bottomley's National league standard. The six homers in three consecutive games was one more than the mark held by Babe Ruth and several others while the record book fails to show any player hitting two homers with corners crammed in one game. To hold up their end of the argument, Crosetti smacked two homers and DiMaggio one. The Yankees hit 11 homers in the series.

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It was badly shattered Sunday by the suddenly revived Mission Reds who swept the three week-end games and moved up into second place. The Oaks lost their first Sunday double header when the Reds beat them out 4-3, 5-1.

Beaver-Ducks Tumble

In their usual gallant stand the Acorns repeatedly threatened to overtake the Missions in the opener and forced the scheduled seven inning nightcap into two extra innings. The league leaders lost the second game in the night when Ken Douglas was lifted after issuing his third hit of the game and the Reds brought in four runs on two errors and three hits off Jack La Rocca.

The San Francisco Seals moved into third and dropped the Portland Beavers from second to sixth by sweeping week-end games and winning the series 5-2. The Seals took the Sunday doubleheader 4-2, 6-3.

The day was costly to the Seals when it laid up two young outfielders, Joe Marty, a coming big leaguer, and Al Mudge. Marty was struck on the left hand by a pitched ball, suffering a painful bruise which may keep him out four or five days. Mudge replaced him but suffered a severe cramp and had to be carried to the bench.

Every run in the opener was scored in the sixth, the Beavers putting together five of their 13 hits off J. Millard Campbell for two runs. Two walks, the pitch that hit Marty and three singles gave the Seals the game. Four Beaver errors gave the Seals five runs in the nightcap which should have been a pitching duel between Bill Posedel and Sad Sam Gibson.

Los Koups, Seattle's hurling ace who has been sitting on top of the circuit's moundmen lost his second game of the season as the Indians and Los Angeles split their doubleheader.

Three hits off Koups in the first inning gave the Angels the lead 3-1 and the series 4-3. Errors decided the opener for Seattle 7-6. Poor fielding gave the Tribe two runs and the Angels one. Seattle's Dick Barrett was the only effective hurler of the seven the two clubs used.

San Diego moved up fifth in the standings by splitting the doubleheader with Sacramento 7-2, 0-1 and taking the series 4-3.

Herman Pillette of San Diego and Henry Phippen of Sacramento each hurled 3-hit ball in the short nightcap. Pillette lost when he allowed two singles in the sixth. A plethora of errors boosted the Padres' score in the opener by three. Vince DiMaggio hit for the circuit.

The St. Louis Cardinals, owners of the Sacramento club, recalled Dick Ward, former Los Angeles hurler. The Senators released Alther Frank Alvarez and Ed Hughes, a rookie infielder.
