

AUSTRIA OPENS DRIVE AGAINST LEADING NAZIS

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VIENNA, May 25, U.P.—Chancellor Kurt Schuschnigg Saturday night ordered the arrest of 31 leaders throughout the country after a pitched battle at Prince Ernst R. von Starhemberg's Wachsenberg castle.

Two were killed and several injured when Nazis attacked the castle in an effort to seize arms believed stored there for the Heimwehr, Starhemberg's private army.

With a nationwide roundup of Nazi leaders ordered, Starhemberg, ousted from the government a week ago by Schuschnigg, self-proclaimed dictator of Austria, rushed back to Vienna by airplane from his country estate.

Search Continues
Tonight 28 prominent Nazi leaders were under arrest and the police were continuing their search for others. Eight alleged Nazis seized during the fight at the castle were held for questioning and trial.

Johann Pfolner, a peasant, and Johann Weniger, coachman, both 22, were killed in the battle.

Wachsenberg castle, located in Upper Austria, is owned by Starhemberg. He has never resided there but his family has used it as a summer residence.

Armed Men Surround Castle
Fighting occurred when 50 armed men, described as Nazis by government officials, roared through lines in automobiles and rushed to the castle, which they surrounded.

Gendarmes, informed of the plot to seize arms at Wachsenberg, arrived almost simultaneously with the attackers and fought a pitched battle for 15 minutes.

The attackers broke into the castle but were driven out by the police. Starhemberg was at his nearby estate. He piloted his own plane to Vienna as soon as news of the raid reached the capital.

How the government learned of plans for the raid in time to send gendarmes to frustrate it has not been divulged.

GRADUATION HELD AT MERRILL HIGH

MERRILL, May 25.—History of the Merrill schools from the building of the first log building in 1879 until the present unit system in Klamath county was presented by members of the graduating class of 1936 in a cleverly arranged skit for commencement, Thursday evening in the high school gymnasium.

The first small building, with a floor space of only 16 by 24 feet, boasted of no furniture except rough benches and a stove in the center of the room. Here children of the Colwell, Stukel and Whitney families learned their first lessons.

Wages of the teachers who taught only three months during the summer, were \$30 a month, and \$10 of this was spent for board and room.

As the population increased, schools were built at Gale on land now owned by R. H. Anderson, and later at Doore Hollow, Whitelake and Libby, until in 1922 the schools were merged in the present unit system.

Mary Brown was awarded the cup trophy for the highest term just ended. This cup award was sponsored by the Tulelake Reporter and will go each year to the student with the highest average.

Lawson Kandra was awarded a place on the name plaque for the best school citizen in recognition of cooperation, achievement and fellowship.

Awards also went to students in debate, to athletes in basketball, football and track, and to Ivan Kandra as the outstanding member of the B basketball squad.

The invocation was given by the Rev. F. C. Traville and musical numbers were sung by the girls' glee club and by the mixed glee clubs. An orchestra number opened the program.

Presentation of awards and diplomas was made by Mr. Hendrickson and the Rev. Traville pronounced the benediction.

Members of the graduating class were Ethel Knox, Burton Peterson, John D. Moore, Arthur Brown, Willard May and Wilbur Haskins.
