## STRENGTH SHOWN ON WHEAT MARKET

CHICAGO, May 25. (AP)—Despite notices that 1,000,000 bushels would be tendered in settlement of May wheat contracts tomorrow, the price of the delivery rose strongly late today.

Nervousness of traders was persistent regarding the outcome of tomorrow's developments as to May wheat settlements. Notwithstanding announcement that 2,600,000 bushels had been sold into storage here, and 75,000 bushels bought to cover United States City, highest prices of the day were scored in the final transactions.

Wheat closed flurried, 1-2 1/2 cents above Saturday's finish, May 25-25 1/2, July 25-25 1/2, corn 14-14 1/2, May 6 1/2, oats at 1 1/2 decline to 4 1/2 advance, and provisions varying from 17 cents setback to 30 cents gain.

## Toozie Will Head State Delegation To G. O. P. Meet

PORTLAND, Ore., May 25. (UP)—Walter L. Toozie will head the Oregon delegation to the republican national convention at Cleveland next month.

He was elected chairman at a group meeting Saturday, with Joe E. Dunne, vice chairman, and Lowell C. Paget, secretary.

H. H. DeArmond of Bend and Dunne were tied for the vice chairman post, but a flip of a coin was for Dunne.

U. S. Senator Steiwer was chosen alternate delegate for Paget. This action assured Steiwer, already chosen as key-note by the national committee, a seat on the convention floor.

The delegation of 10 will go to Cleveland pledged to Senator Borah. It was agreed to stand by the Idaho senator as long as he had a chance to be nominated.

## Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, May 25. (AP)—The attention of the stock market today was centered on industrial specialties, a number of which were pushed up fractions to around two points.

At the same time many other sections of the list were neglected, and there were sufficient soft spots in evidence to bring a moderately irregular close. Transfers approximated 700,000 shares.

The major steel issues performed well in the face of the official estimate that current mill operations, at 67.9 per cent of capacity, were 1 1/2 points under last week.

The general run of economic news was still looked upon as satisfactory, but most traders, although apparently still bullish, continued to hold to a limited buying program.

Among the better acting stocks were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Sears Roebuck, J. I. Case, American Telephone, American Power & Light, American Bank Note, Great Northern, Pennsylvania and Public Service of New Jersey.

On the heavy side were Greyhound Corp., U. S. Smelting, Dome, Liggett & Myers, B. G. Ferro and Standard Oil of California. Most of the coppers, rails, motors and utilities moved fractionally in either direction.

Some selling in Greyhound was attributed to expectations of more competition for the bus lines as the result of lower rail passenger fares.
