Butte. Already lookouts are stationed on Chase mountain, south-west of here, and Yalman butte, in the eastern part of the county. The fire season is regarded as opened, and all restrictions are in force, Kimball said.

Hail in Prospect

Late afternoon wind and showers were again in prospect for the Klamath basin Tuesday, according to the local weatherman who reported a continued downward trend in barometric pressure.

The state weather bureau forecast is for unsettled weather during the next 24 hours, with showers in the west and over the mountains. Cooler temperatures are predicted for the interior on Wednesday.

The weather menu for northern California included showers in the coast range and over the Sierra mountains Tuesday night, and cooler weather Wednesday in the upper Sacramento valley and interior of the state.

SALEM, May 26. (AP)—The temperature set a new high mark for the year here yesterday when it rose to 88 degrees. Last night's low was 46, but before eight o'clock this morning the mercury had risen to 71 degrees.

GRANTS PASS, May 26. (AP)—High wind accompanying a thunderstorm which swept this district late yesterday gave Gene Langley, Grants Pass salesman, brain concussion and a narrow escape from death.

The gale blew a tree on his car near Kerby, the 12-inch trunk striking the hood. Langley was brought here and regained consciousness during the night.

Windows were cracked in two Grants Pass stores. A brief but heavy downpour accompanied the thunderstorm.

MEDFORD, Ore., May 26. (AP)—The warmest day of the year came to the central and upper Rogue river valley yesterday, with a recorded temperature of 97 degrees, in mid-afternoon.

The heat was broken by an electrical storm that occurred over the Siskiyou and a brisk wind swept the lower levels. The orchard home of W. H. Simons near Medford was destroyed by fire during the height of the wind storm as the family was at dinner. The origin of the fire has not been determined. The wind fanned the flames, and it was destroyed rapidly. There was insurance on the home, but not the household effects.

The wind did no damage to growing crops but blew limbs from trees in this city.

Company Reports Cut in Gas Price

A check failed to show any other major companies following the trend.

No cuts were reported from other points on the coast.

loads of vigilantes to conduct a meeting in the woods near there. Old Case Reopened

In Oakland county, (Pontiac) officers reopened the unsolved slaying of Howard Curtis, whose body was found near Milford late in 1934.

The body, a bullet wound in the back of the head, which had been severed from the body, was found in a clump of bushes by a hunter. The clothing had been set aside.

A resident of the neighborhood said she had heard screams from the direction of the field several days earlier, and had seen three men in a touring car drive away. Wayne county authorities today raided five homes in the down river district here and found what they claimed was evidence that two recent bombings in Escoria were inspired by the black robed band.

Fire Arms Seized

In the homes, which included those of two former Escoria councilmen, the raiders seized fire arms and literature of the organization.

Coincident with the raids, came a statement from V. F. Effinger of Lima, Ohio, who had been sought for questioning by Prosecutor Duncan C. McCrea that the Black Legion had more than 6,000,000 members throughout the United States and that it had no intention of trying to take over the government.

Aspiration of obtaining a governmental dictatorship were attributed to the order by Harry Colburn, chief investigator for the Wayne county (Detroit) prosecuting attorney's office.

PORTLAND, May 26. (AP)—Multnomah county Judge Charles McNary 300 votes for the democratic nomination for United States senator, an official tabulation showed today. McNary won the republican renomination by a heavy vote over Sam Brown and Theodore Nelson.

The democratic nomination went to Willis Mahoney who polled 15,395 votes in Multnomah county. His opponent, John A. Jeffrey, Portland, received 15,689.

HILLSBORO, Ore., May 26. (AP)—Miss Esther Sloan, 22, of Jerome, Idaho, said with her life for swimming in Dairy creek near here—the first drowning fatality of the season in this area. She and three other girls sought refuge from the heat in the creek yesterday. Miss Sloan who was to have come to work in a cannery here in a few days, sank suddenly when she started across the stream. The body was recovered.

BEND, Ore., May 26. (AP)—Thunderheads to the south and reports of dangerously dry conditions in the lowland woods sent lookouts to their stations in the Deschutes national forest. One small forest fire near Sisters was halted without material damage.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 26. (AP)—Ralph I. Shaddock, recently installed area manager of the Townsend plan, said "from now on when Townsend members go to the polls they will vote for one person for office—they will not again split their votes." He intimated a list of endorsements would be forthcoming soon.

Shaddock also suspended the charter of Clyde Ward's Portland club Number 26 for permitting an ousted lecturer to address the group.

PORTLAND, May 26. (AP)—Allotments totalling more than \$95,000 assured continuance of work on the two short-route projects until appropriated funds arrive July 1, the WPA office announced. E. J. Griffith, state WPA administrator, said the Willamette river road was allotted \$48,000 and the Wolf creek road \$47,500.

PORTLAND, May 26. (AP)—Mental examinations for all teachers and applicants for teaching positions became a requirement today of the Portland board of education as insurance against carrying of communicable diseases.

PORTLAND, May 26. (AP)—Campaigns here for elimination of rabies brought the attention today from Mrs. Gladys Woodbury, widely known in anti-vivisection work that an epidemic of the disease exists only in the imagination of certain health officials.

PORTLAND, May 26. (AP)—"Bees-ness" around Northwest Thirteenth avenue and Burnside street was going at a land office rate late Monday.

Much to the surprise and fright of many persons, a swarm of bees suddenly took over a marquee on the Flatiron building in the downtown district.

A painter and a policeman solved the situation by climbing a ladder and scraping off the bees until they were able to get the queen bee in a box.

About the same time, Joe Rupp put in a frantic telephone call to the sheriff's office and said a swarm had invaded his home. A bee expert finally removed the swarm.

JURY DISAGREES IN WESTLIND TRIAL

The jury in the Westlind case disagreed Tuesday afternoon and was dismissed.

The alleged peregrinations of a bottle of medicine were traced by prosecution witnesses Monday, as the state tried to convince a circuit court jury of its claim that Dr. O. W. Westlind, a Klamath Falls naturopath, had practiced medicine without a license.

The bottle started its tour when Orville Gervais, a patient of Westlind, bought it from the doctor, according to Gervais' testimony.

Gervais said some time later he went to Dr. George H. Adler for further treatment and turned the bottle over to him. From then on the bottle travelled quickly, witnesses declared.

Adler said he turned the medicine over to Dr. E. D. Johnson, former head of the state board of medical examiners, and Johnson said he, in turn, gave the bottle to A. H. Davis, special investigator for the board.

The bottle then was forwarded to Hardin C. Blackmer, Klamath county district attorney. Davis testified, and Blackmer said that he had sent it on to an O. S. C. chemist for analysis.

Al Croup, deputy county clerk, wound up the state's case, by testifying that Dr. Westlind had never applied to the clerk's office for a certificate to practice medicine.

The defense case was even more brief. Dr. Westlind, the only witness, denied that he had ever sold a bottle of medicine to Orville Gervais.

Closing arguments in the case and the judge's instructions remained to be made this morning before the jury could start deliberations.

Selection of a jury required much more time Monday than the actual taking of testimony. The 12 selected were Charles G. Whitney, Margaret Baldwin, James A. McCluskey, W. A. Layman, DeWitt E. Jobe, Geraldine B. Gwaley, Charles Inman, A. D. Lambert, C. J. Swingle, Silas Obenchain, Jerry D. Pearson and Ed P. Livingston.

SEATTLE, May 26. (AP)—Defeated right-wing leaders of the Washington state democratic party widened a breach with victorious left-wingers today by discussing plans for a convention to protest platform plank adopted at the state convention in Aberdeen.

The left-wing victory over the week-end, and adoption of the left-wing platform, including production for use and public ownership plank stirred many "old line" democrats.

King county democratic chairman, Joseph A. Whitestone, Seattle, said he was considering calling another convention to repudiate the left-wingers' actions.

But if you prefer to keep the bulk of your government CLOSER HOME, so that it will be easier for you to have some hand in it yourself and much simpler and less expensive to present your grievances if you have grievances, you will be inclined to prefer the PRESENT form of government, which confers large powers upon the states.

THE point is this: DO SOME HARD THINKING on your own account on these subjects, which really DO concern you very closely, and will concern your children even more. Don't just waste time aside as the exclusive concern of the POLITICIANS.

JERSEY FOREST FIRE KILLS FIVE

NEW GRETN, N. J., May 26. (AP)—A south Jersey forest fire, in which five men lost their lives, was brought under control today after more than 750 men fought it on a wide front for 48 hours.

A final check of the crews showed that all were accounted for. At one time several CCC workers had been reported missing but they were found on the fire lines.

Only one danger spot remained near Manahawick and men were rushed there by truck to meet the threat. The state forest fighting service called the fire "the worst in its history," and estimated it had ravaged 15,000 acres.

Famed Pioneer's Descendant Dies

CANBY, Calif.—Mrs. Ida May Caldwell of Canby, who died at the Modoc General hospital in Alturas Sunday after a long illness, was a third cousin of the late William Jennings Bryan and a direct descendant of Daniel Boone, relatives said.

Born in Vacaville in 1860, she was a charter member of the Native Daughters of the Golden West and later deputy grand president of the order.

She is survived by her husband, Henry Caldwell of Canby, where they resided for the past 37 years; a daughter, Mrs. J. B. Steele of Adin, and a twin brother, J. W. Lammie of Winter, Calif. Funeral services were to be held in the Adin church Tuesday.

BIG ARMY BOMBER VISITS KLAMATH

An army bomber dropped down in the Klamath airport at 2:10 Tuesday to pickup Father Stanley Reilly, air corps chaplain, but it was too late.

Father Reilly, who had expected the plane Monday, had left by train. He will take a transport from San Francisco for Panama, where he will be located at Franco Field.

When the priest notified headquarters that he was delayed in Klamath Falls by the tunnel fire on the Southern Pacific, he received a message that the bomber would pick him up here Monday at noon. He waited at the airport, but the plane did not come in.

Tuesday afternoon it came in from Medford. After circling the field for pictures of the port, the army fliers came down, inquired about Father Reilly, and took off in 10 minutes for their Hamilton field base.

Father Reilly came here for the Knights of Columbus convention.

Arab workmen at the Royal Airforce airport at Ramleh struck and were replaced by the govern-

ment with 100 Jews, the agency added, and 20 more Arab leaders, charged with agitation and public disorder, were banished to various parts of Palestine.

The British high commissioner for Palestine, Sir Arthur Grenfell Wauchoppe, in an address at the Levant fair, warned terrorists: "No strike, no violence can deter the government from fulfilling its obligations under the league of nations mandate."
