

Aga Khan's Horses Win Epsom Downs Derby

FIRST, SECOND PLACES TAKEN

Mahmoud Finishes Ahead of Taj Before 500,000 Spectators.

EPSOM DOWNS, May 27. (AP)—Mahmoud and Taj Akbar, owned by the Aga Khan, ran one, two in the 133rd running of the derby before an estimated crowd of 500,000 today. Thankerton, owned by Mrs. J. Shand, was third.

The victory was the second successive year and the third time in seven years in which the Aga Khan's silks have been in front in England's most famous race. Bahrani won last year and Blenheim in 1930.

New Record Set
Held at 100 to 8 in the betting, Mahmoud finished the one and one-half miles three lengths in front of his more highly regarded stablemate. Three-quarters of a length separated Taj Akbar and Thankerton. Lord Astor's Pay Up, the favorite at 6 to 1, was fourth in the field of 23 which included William Woodward's American-owned Boswell.

Mahmoud ran the distance in 2:13 4-5 for a new track record. The old mark of 2:34 was established by Hyperion in 1933 and equaled by Windsor Lad two years ago.

Carloca, owned by the Maharaja of Rajpalia who captured the 1934 running, took the lead early in the race and held it for a half-mile with Midstream in second place as Jockey Charles Smirke and Gordon Richards riding Mahmoud and Taj Akbar, respectively, held their mounts off the pace.

Thankerton moved up fast in the next half mile, however, and held the lead at Tattenham corner as the leaders swung into the final drive. Bala Hissar, also owned by the Aga Khan, was second and Pay Up third. Mahmoud and Taj Akbar moved up fast, however, and passed the tiring leaders in the stretch with the former winning well in hand.

Boswell, the only American-owned horse in the race and highly fancied at 7 to 1, was up with the leaders for the first half-mile but fell back fast and trailed far to the rear at the finish.

Late Challenge Futile
Boswell still was up with the leaders in the down-hill run to Tattenham corner but found the pace too swift.

Entering the straightaway, leading to the judges, Thankerton held a three-length lead but weakened as Smirke shot Mahmoud to the front with Taj Akbar in close pursuit. Taj Akbar made a gallant attempt to overhaul his stable companion but Mahmoud had enough left to stave off the closing challenge.

Athletic Stability Promised

Oregon President Issues Optimistic Statement on School Affairs.

The recent rearrangement of athletic affairs at both Oregon State college and the University of Oregon gave strong indication that things were not entirely satisfactory.

Oregon State employed Percy Loevy to take over the administrative work for many student functions. The school also divorced its athletic set-up, making the business of running the sports program a separate job. At Oregon Hugh Rosson, graduate manager, and his assistant, Tom Stoddard, resigned. Anse Cornell, former College of Idaho and Pacific University coach, was appointed business manager of the A. S. U. O. at a much lower salary than any recent Oregon managers.

All this shifting around wasn't especially reassuring. Everyone knows Oregon and Oregon State face a critical athletic year. It is pretty generally believed that the new conference schedule each school must put a reasonably strong team in the field or suffer possible elimination.

Some official words were spoken to the effect that while everyone wanted to see the Oregon schools forge ahead in athletics as well as other affairs, few could be depended on to come through with the right kind of support.

Perhaps this feeling of uncertainty is what prompted Dr. C. Valentine Boyer, Oregon president, to issue an optimistic statement.

"Perhaps that wasn't it at all. Maybe student affairs are exactly as promising for next year as he indicated in the following story from the University of Oregon:

"Prospects are bright next fall for the most successful year in a long time in every branch of student activity at the University of Oregon, according to word from Dr. C. Valentine Boyer, university president.

Dr. Boyer said this statement is based on a review of the preliminary work done by the newly organized athletic and educational activities boards, both of which report plans already under way for the year 1936-37.

"The entire program is assured of adequate financing. Dr. Boyer's survey showed, and since the university business manager will be in charge of all accounting details, an efficient financial management can be expected, he pointed out. Sufficient funds are in sight for a full schedule of major and minor sports, forensics, music, lyceum, publications and student events. Since the entire plan is now headed by the university president, these activities can be integrated with the general university program, thus insuring greater stability for each phase, Dr. Boyer said.

"The most encouraging thing about this new development is the enthusiastic co-operation that has been forthcoming from the part of students, faculty members, alumni, those directly concerned with the activities, and friends of the university," declared Dr. Boyer. "This is due largely to the excellent personnel of both administrative boards, and because prospects for better athletic teams and greater educational activities

have never been brighter in the history of the university."

"Almost equal in importance to the new administrative plan is the great improvement now under way in physical education facilities. When the new physical education building and infirmary are completed this summer the university will have the best equipped student activity plant on the Pacific coast, and best in the country, Dr. Boyer pointed out. McArthur court is already one of the finest and largest basketball pavilions in the country, and the new building, which will adjoin it, will offer facilities for a great variety of other sports.

"The finest of medical attention will be available to all students at the new infirmary. Special attention will be paid to health measures, such as conditioning for athletics, it is pointed out.

"One of the most encouraging factors for a successful year is seen in the fact that all branches of athletics and other activities will be in the hands of experienced men. Dr. Boyer pointed out. The coaching staff, headed by Anse Cornell, newly-elected athletic manager; Prince G. Callison, head football coach; Howard Hobson, head basketball coach, and William H. Hayward, veteran track coach, will be intact for the coming year. All are experienced in athletics, and have been at Oregon for some time, and thoroughly understand conditions here.

"Both Callison and Hobson, although young men, have already had extensive experience in major sports coaching, and both have national reputations. Gene Shields, line coach, is also regarded as one of the leading mentors in the country, and this summer will go to the University of Minnesota, where he will take special courses in coaching. Hayward, several times coach for the American Olympic team, is also outstanding in his field. Oregon also has a first-class freshman coach, John Warren, who has made an excellent record in the year he has been at Oregon."

Bonanza Camp Takes Fifth Game in Row

BONANZA, May 27.—Pounding three Sycan hurlers for a total of 20 hits, the Camp Bonanza Cubs moved on to its fifth straight win with a 19-7 triumph over the Indians in a game played at Bonanza, Sunday.

Lefty Boudreau, Bonanza mound ace, added to his growing streakout record, setting down 13 Sycan batters on strikes. Boudreau was troubled by wildness issuing eight passes, and being touched for four hits.

CARDS WIN TWO FROM PIRATES

Jim Winford Turns in Two-Hit Performance to Stop Bucs.

Manager Frankie Frisch is wearing a big grin over a pitching discovery that may be just what the doctor ordered to round out his staff of St. Louis Cardinals "varsity" hurlers.

Since the season opened he has been depending on the Dean boys, "Wild Bill" Hallahan, Roy Parmelee and Bill Walker as his starting set, but double-headers are piling up ahead.

Two-Hit Game Hurler
Jim Winford, 26-year-old right-hander imported late last year from the Columbus Red Birds, may furnish help.

Winford started against the Pittsburgh Pirates in the nightcap of a twin bill, after Dizzy Dean had let the Bucs down 6-2 in the opener, and the new-comer came through with a two-hit performance, while his mates were battling out a 6-2 win.

The double victory pushed the Cards a full game in front of the New York Giants, despite the triumph of the Terrymen over Brooklyn, 7-3, behind Harry Gumbert's seven-hit twirling. It was the fifth straight win for Gumbert.

Tigers, White Sox Split
In the American league, the Red Sox, aided by Jimmy Fox's twelfth homer of the year, pulled up to within half a game of the lead with a 5-4 victory over the Yankees.

Bill Dickey, veteran Yankee catcher, collided with Eric McNair in a tight play at the plate, and an X-ray showed a kidney injury which will keep him in the hospital for ten days.

Trailing the Yanks and the Sox, the Detroit Tigers managed only a split in a double bill with the White Sox, dropping the nightcap 2-9 before Sugar Cain's tight pitching, after homers by Goose Goslin and Dixie Walker helped General Alvin Crowder take the opener 12-9.

Roy Henshaw pitched the Chicago Cubs from sixth to third place in the National league with a 10-4 win over the Reds, despite Kim Cuyler's homer. The Phils outslugged the Boston Bees 7-2, with Johnny Moore collecting his eighth four-bagger.

The St. Louis Browns came from behind with a four-run rally in the ninth to trounce the Cleveland Indians, 8 to 5, while the Senators had little trouble with the Athletics and won handily, 8-2.

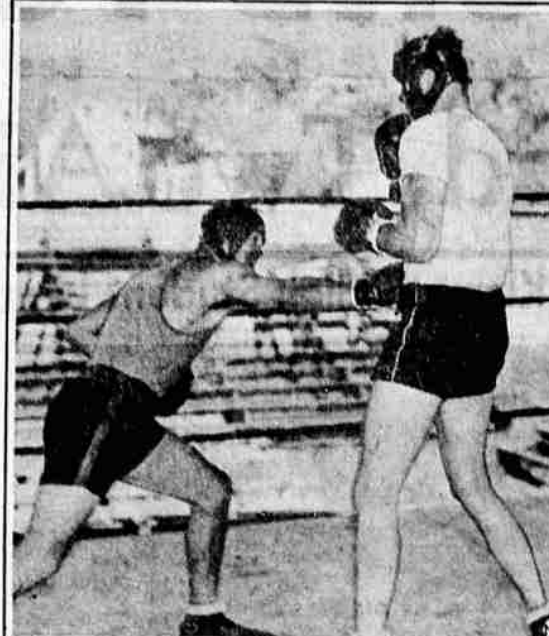

He turned in the only really good hurling job in the circuit, and was robbed of a well-earned shut-out by poor fielding as Sacramento won 2-1 from Portland.

It has happened to him before. Both Sacramento runs were scored in the fifth on a walk, a hit and two errors. Neither run was earned. Caster allowed only four hits, gave three passes and struck out nine. The Beavers bunched three of their eight hits off Buck Newsome in the eighth for their lone tally.

Padres Pound Seals
Mannuel Slavo allowed only five hits as San Diego's hitters pounded San Francisco for a 9-3 win to drop the Seals into fourth place below Seattle. A walk and three hits in the fifth brought the Seals' only runs, while Vince Di Maggio, with two doubles and a single, led the Padres' 17-hit attack.

In a home-run orgy the Seattle Indians scalped Oakland's Acorns 18-6. The tribe pounded out 20 hits, including four homers and six triples off three Acorn stars.

First-Sacker Stars
Bill Lawrence, Dick Gyselman, Fred Muller and Art Hunt homed for the Indians after Leroy Anton of the Oaks banged out one. Jerry Donovan, the only Seattle outfielder without a homer, scored all five times at bat, hitting two triples and a pair of singles.

Jim Shevlin, formerly with the Cincinnati Reds, made his debut as the Tribe's first-sacker with two triples and a single and getting hit by a pitched ball.

Bishop Short on Sum Needed to Buy Beavers

PORTLAND, May 27. (AP)—A sum slightly over \$100,000 kept Max Bishop from owning the Portland Beavers' baseball club today.

The former big-timer and recently deposed manager of the Beavers said E. J. Schetter, president of the club, indicated several days ago he would sell his controlling interest of 1,300 out of 1,500 shares for \$140,000, but that yesterday Hattie Schetter, son of the owner, said the price was \$155,000, plus \$84,458 in hold-over debts.

Bishop said he and his associates "were ready to lay down" \$140,000, but has "no intention" of paying \$239,458.

Schetter discharged Bishop, who has appealed to Baseball Commissioner Landis, because the manager had been ill and was unable to play second base.

Several days later Schetter was quoted as saying he was tired of running the ball club, and would sell it "for just what is in it."

Bill Swenney, first baseman, was named manager to succeed Bishop.
