

COUNCIL SUPPORTS HOUSING MEASURE

The Klamath Falls Central Labor council gained city council adoption of a resolution requesting favorable congressional action of the Wagner-Ellenbogen housing bill.

Text of the resolution which the city fathers adopted is as follows: "Whereas, There is now pending before the national congress the Wagner-Ellenbogen housing bill, the object of which is to ameliorate and improve the living conditions of the laboring classes in the United States, and the common council believes that this measure embodies the best interests of humanity in the United States, and should be passed;

"Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Common Council of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, That it respectfully requests its senators and representatives in congress to vote favorably upon this bill;

"And Be It Further Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be, by the police judge, sent to his honor, the President of the United States, and to each of our senators and representatives in congress, and another copy be sent to the labor housing conference, 1714 Connecticut avenue, Washington, D. C., and that this resolution be released to the press."

Murder Is Charged to "Black Legion"



Finding of the bullet riddled body of Charles A. Poole, 32, PWA worker, in a Dearborn township ditch near Detroit, as shown above, led to a sweeping investigation which barred activities of the Black Legion. Alleged to be patterned after the Ku Klux Klan, members are declared to have worn hoods and gowns as shown at right, a police officer posing in the robes. Beside him are weapons authorities say they took from Black Legion members. Below are shown four alleged leaders, said to have admitted aiding in the killing of Poole. Left to right are Dayton Dean, Harvey Davis, "colonel" in the organization; Urban Lippe, and Irvin Lee. The legion membership form is said to state that its aim is to "uphold Protestantism and combat Communism," while waging a "moral crusade."

KLAMATH GIRL TO GET SCHOLARSHIP

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, May 27.—Betty Beaty, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles L. Beaty of Klamath Falls, who was one of the 44 young men and women of the state recently selected by the state board of higher education to receive scholarships to attend Oregon State college next year, plans to register in pre-medical in the school of science.

These scholarships are granted only to students from among the upper one-third of their graduating classes who face financial difficulty in attending college. Miss Beaty was highly recommended for a scholarship by several prominent citizens of the state.

Miss Beaty maintained a high scholastic record throughout her high school career, which has included work at Astoria, Portland and Ashland, as well as at Klamath Falls. Her extra-curricular activities have included membership in the G. A. A., Social Science club, Literary club, Ski club and the Pep club. She plans to enter college this fall. Her scholarship will assist in defraying tuition fees and laboratory charges.

An additional 21 scholarships to Oregon State college will be awarded later by the state board of higher education to students selected from among those already registered at the college who are in need of financial assistance to make it possible for them to continue.

A scholarship similar to that won by Miss Beaty was awarded last year to Harold Kleiner of Klamath Falls to enroll in the school of forestry at O. S. C.
