

40 ET 8 SOCIETY MEETS ON JUNE 6

Members of the "40 et 8" Society of California and Oregon will gather at the Oregon Caves, Saturday, June 6, to participate in a big annual interstate "wreck." This is the first event of its kind ever attempted by California and Oregon Voyaguers, and much credit is due to Voltaire Locale 165 for bringing this initial ceremonial to southern Oregon. Many prominent Legionnaires will be present including 40 et 8 state officials and members from as far south as Los Angeles, and much favorable publicity for southern Oregon has already appeared in print.

The beautiful new chateau at the Oregon Caves has been reserved for the voyaguers and the wives and will be the center of the social features, which will include the official banquet, entertainment program and dance. The "wreck" will take place in the famous "Ghost Chamber" of the Oregon Caves, 3,200 feet underground and an impressive ceremony is planned. It is safe to say that no more fitting background for a ceremonial of this nature could be found in this or any other state in the Union.

Several "goofs" (candidates) from various American Legion posts in southern Oregon will be introduced to the many mysteries and foreign customs of "La Socte" during the "wreck," which is scheduled to start at 6 p. m. The banquet will be served at 9 p. m. and will feature short talks by Grand Chef de Gare, Lahan A. Steeves of the Oregon "40 et 8," Grand Chef de Gare, Tom Estabrook of the California "40 et 8," and other prominent officials of this unique veterans' organization. The committee in charge of the various activities comprises the following: Lee Garlock, Medford, general chairman; Niel Allen, Grants Pass, housing; Horace L. Bromley, Medford, banquet; Harold Prestel, Grants Pass, wreck; Cass Wymore, Medford, train; Paul Taylor, Ashland, and Henry Pace, Medford, refreshments; Paul B. McDonald, Ashland, reception.

Grand Chef De Train Lee Garlock, urges all voyaguers to send in their reservations to Niel Allen, Grants Pass at once, for although the entire chateau has been reserved for the 40 et 8 members and their wives, present indications point to a capacity crowd. Reservations have already been received from Los Angeles, San Francisco, Fresno, Portland, Salem, Roseburg, Grants Pass, Medford, Ashland, Klamath Falls, and a successful event is assured.

CASCADE SUMMIT, Ore.—The forest service road which connects Cascade Summit with Oakridge is being cleared of fallen trees and other debris that have fallen during the winter months by the bureau of public works which is working with the forest service department. 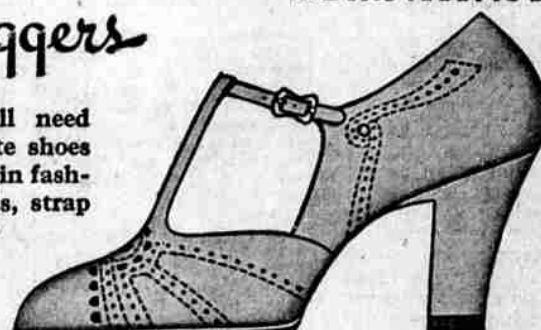

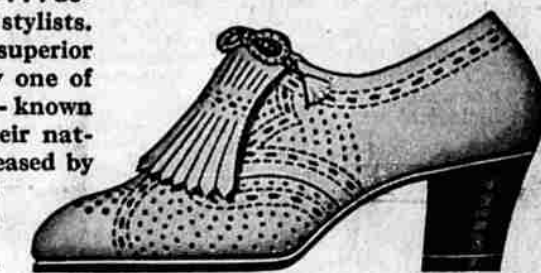
