ENTERPRISE, Ore., May 28. (AP)—Fire wiped out the Pioneer Enterprise hotel today, several guests escaping with their lives. Milton Smith slid down a drain pipe from a third floor room and suffered burns, while David and Layton Pyburn risked a dash through the flames to get to safety. The fire was discovered when F. H. Murphy and several associates heard loud voices in an adjoining room and opened his door to find the hall in flames. It was believed the fire started in a vacant room and got under full headway before it was observed. The building, a three-story stone and wooden structure, was owned by A. L. Emmons. An estimate of the damage was not immediately available.

Martin Refuses Aid to Prisoner

SALEM, May 28. (AP)—Robert Green, 59, serving a life term for murder in Coos county, will remain in prison, as far as Governor Martin is concerned. The executive today refused to issue any clemency to the prisoner, who was convicted of murdering Caleb Green, because "there was no justification for a pardon in view of the seriousness of the crime and record of the case." The prisoner and the victim were not related. Green was first convicted in 1928, but the state supreme reversed the conviction and ordered a new trial. He was convicted the second time, and receive at the penitentiary March 29, 1929.

Indian Confined to County Jail

Leonard John, an Indian, was confined to the county jail Thursday when he failed to pay a \$25 fine levied on a charge of assault and battery. John was accused of beating up Matty Patty near Chillicothe. Charles Snow, charged with violation of the basic speed law, pleaded guilty in justice court and will be sentenced May 29.

Freight Agent Here—R. S. Morrill of San Francisco, assistant general freight agent for the Great Northern, is a business visitor in Klamath Falls.

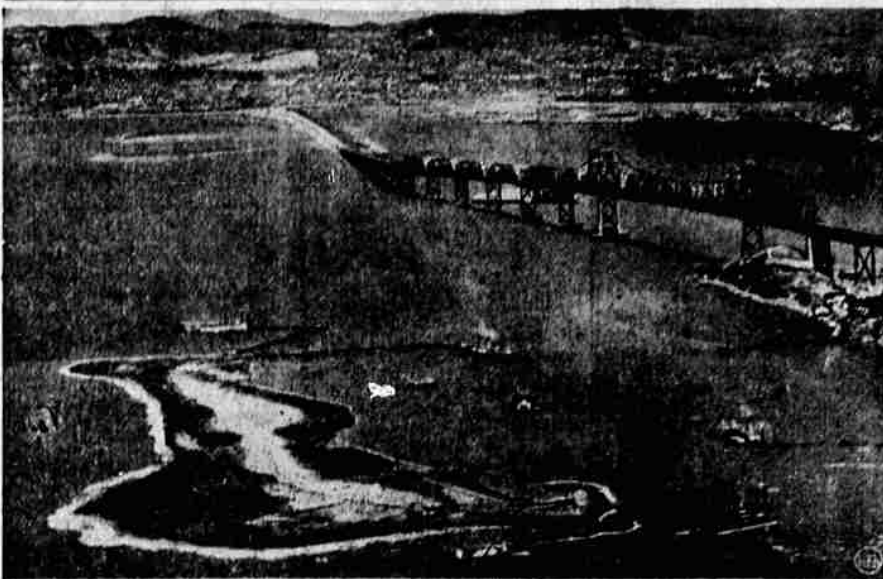
Grange Plans Dance—The Lost River grange will hold another dance at Olene Saturday night. Funds will be raised to send four-H club members to the summer school at Corvallis.

GIANT OF OCEAN HITS 32 KNOTS

ABOARD THE S. S. QUEEN MAY, En Route to New York, May 28. (AP)—Metal furniture rattled today as the Queen Mary's powerful turbines pushed Britain's new pride of the seas toward her maiden landing in America.

The slight vibration became noticeable, especially aft, as the Queen Mary touched a speed unofficially estimated at about 32 knots. It did not, however, disturb the passengers.

There were increasing indications of an attempt to beat the Normandie's record average speed of 30.35 knots, if favorable conditions continue.

The Queen Mary finally got out of Cherbourg at 8:35 a. m., New York time. It was reported 45 cases of bullion had been placed aboard.

ALERT POLICE NAB HIT-RUN DEATH DRIVER

PORTLAND, Ore., May 28 (AP)—The persistence of two policemen in following up clues led to the arrest today of Fred L. Guthrie, 25, for the death of Mrs. Vivian A. Lee, 32, wife of Harold Lee, foreman in a furniture factory, where Guthrie worked.

She was killed and Mrs. Harriette Jenkins, 23, was injured critically when they were struck by an automobile while crossing a street.

Policemen Collie Stoops and C. Miller arrested Guthrie at his home and later said they obtained a confession from him that he hit "something" while driving a stolen automobile, which he had taken after a night spent in drinking at several taverns.

The policemen, upon receiving a radio report of the accident, found an automobile abandoned a short distance away and learned it had been stolen. Rex Briggs, who heard the crash, said he talked to the driver and the man fled.

With the suspect's description, the officers went to a tavern, found the automobile owner and from him obtained a further description of a man he believed had stolen the machine. From

the owner, they learned the neighborhood in which the suspect might live and after awakening several people they found the home of a man whose description corresponded to the death car driver. Stoops and Miller said they found Guthrie's wife at home with their three small sons but the husband was missing. They waited for him and when he appeared he denied any knowledge of the accident. Three hours later the police-

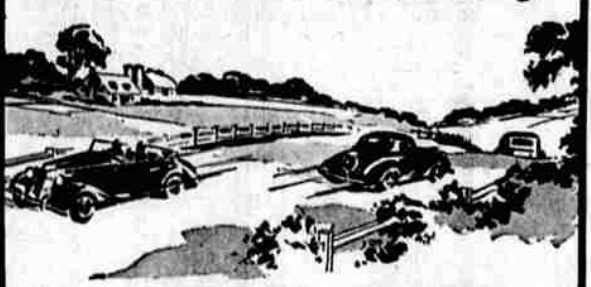
men said he confessed and told of drinking a 45-cent quart of wine at home, leaving the house and visiting several taverns, where he drank beer, and then, en route to Lee's home to visit him, he struck "something." He said he fled across a field when a man asked him if he had "hit two women," and took a street car home.
