SALEM, May 27 (AP)—Goodhue Livingston's design for Oregon's new \$2,500,000 statehouse, combining modernism with Grecian simplicity, won for him the \$132,000 architectural contract for the structure. 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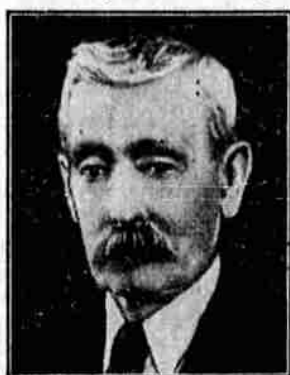
