## TUBERCULOSIS EXPERT HOLDS 'CHEST CLINIC'

Dr. G. C. Bellinger, superintendent of the Oregon state tuberculosis hospital at Salem, held a "Chest Clinic" in Klamath Falls, Thursday.

The clinic was held at the Klamath Valley hospital beginning at 8:30 a. m. and so arranged that each family physician, as well as a member of the patient's family, was present for the examination.

This clinic was a follow-up service to the Mantoux skin testing which has been carried on by members of the medical society and the public health association within the past two years in the city schools.

Through the efforts of Miss Kathryn Ransom, rural school nurse, the health association and P-T-A. members, the parents were urged to have their children showing positive reaction to the skin test taken to their family physician and upon his advice, X-rayed.

These X-rays were interpreted by Dr. Bellinger, a clinical examination of each patient made, and recommendations given to the physician as well as the parent. According to a statement from Dr. Bellinger, several childhood lesions were found, which by careful follow-up may be the means of preventing tuberculosis in later life.

These clinics are not a routine service, but a voluntary service given by Dr. Bellinger to assist the physicians with their cases.

Twenty-seven patients attended the clinic. Among these were eight adults, of which three were post-tubercular cases. Eight children were contact cases and 11 were children showing positive skin test reaction.

This was the first clinic of its kind held in Klamath county. Dr. Bellinger was to hold a clinic at Medford today.

Dr. Bellinger was a guest at the Kiwanis luncheon at noon. Mrs. Bellinger, who accompanied her husband on this trip, was entertained at luncheon by Mrs. Mary Holmes at the Klamath Valley hospital. Nurses who assisted at the clinic were Miss Kay Ransom, Mrs. Lulu Johnson, Miss Naomi Carlton, Miss Lydia Fricke and Mrs. Mary Holmes.

## Home Building in Progress Here

Attached to Cupid's dart nowadays is a building permit! A survey of Pacific northwest marriage trends, considered a prime indicator of housing demand, indicates that an increase in marriages is one of the most powerful forces behind the current revival of Klamath Falls home building, declares the research department of the Equitable Savings and Loan association of Portland.

The department made a study of marriage statistics in three of the most densely populated counties of the northwest—King county, in which Seattle is located, Spokane county and Multnomah county, which contains Portland.

"A substantial backlog of depression-delayed marriages has accumulated," reported A. V. Lindgren, director of the department. "The depletion of this reserve is underway, and will stimulate northwest home building for several years."

"By the end of 1935, Spokane county had recovered 42.5 per cent of the ground lost during the depression, and Multnomah county, 18.2 per cent, while King county had reached an all-time high level, 45.5 per cent above the depression low."

## HOME LIVING SURVEY MAKES PROGRESS HERE

The home living survey carried on under WPA has just completed the first of four sampling periods in Klamath Falls and the second one has already started. Since the survey began in April, a total of 409 addresses have been called upon and the occupants interviewed. It is expected that the study will be completed here about July 1.

A staff of 14 men and women working under Local Supervisor T. Lester Johnson, with headquarters in room 611, Oregon Bank building, has been engaged in the work.

**Data Is Confidential**  
The purpose of the survey is to improve the American standard of living, and the information given is held in confidence. No names appear on the schedule and no family can be identified when the final results are tabulated by government statisticians. In this study the interest is not in the identity of individuals or families, but only in the information to be obtained from all classes of families living in different parts of the United States.

More specifically, the survey is a scientific study of the manner in which American families of various income levels, living on farms, in villages, small cities and metropolitan areas, spend their money, and what kind of living standards they get for their money. Since the study is national in scope, it will give an accurate and complete picture of the difference in standards and costs of living in all parts of the country and consequently will aid the federal government in making adjustments which will result in raising the standard of living of all groups.

**Willbur Sees Need**  
The need for a national study of this nature was first recognized in 1929 by Ray Lyman Willbur, then secretary of the interior, who requested the social research council to call upon a committee of experts to plan an inquiry into the economic and social well-being of the American people. In 1932 the United States chamber of commerce called attention again to the need of a comprehensive study of the costs of living of a representative number of people throughout the country. The study now being carried on in Klamath Falls and other parts of the country is a result of these recommendations. It is being conducted jointly by the national resources committee, the department of agriculture and the department of labor.

In Klamath Falls, one half of the families will be requested to co-operate in giving information in regard to their expenditures of the past year, the ownership of certain durable goods, housing facilities and other aspects of family living. The families to be visited are selected by the chance method.

A service extended by members of the staff to those co-operating in the study is the distribution of publications of the bureau of home economics. These include many pamphlets particularly useful to families, such as "Canning Fruits and Vegetables at Home," "Stain Removal From Fabrics," "Getting the Most for Your Food Money," etc. They are free, and may be obtained through the field agents.

## BUSSARDS ATTEND SALEM CONFERENCE

Mr. and Mrs. Russell D. Bussard have returned from Salem, where they attended the Pacific Northwest Dry Cleaners conference. George Gaubatz, chemist, technical adviser, and dean of the National Institute of Dry Cleaning and Dyeing in Washington, D. C., was the principal speaker.

Plant owners were greatly interested in technical dry cleaning information he had for them on the cleansing of garments, glazing of fur with a recently discovered formula, and especially his description of new materials on the market for both men and women's garments. He explained the way threads in this material were made, and the reason for unavoidable shrinkage.

Many manufacturers of materials are having Gaubatz and his staff make experiments and tests for the dry cleaning and shrinkage of materials they are preparing for market, so as to perfect their fabrics for dry cleaning. When manufacturers label their garments, as some of them are beginning to do, with the result of the institute's tests, the consumer will be able to choose materials that will dry clean satisfactorily.

Bussard is a graduate of the national institute, and greatly enjoyed visiting with his friend, Dean Gaubatz, who was on the train coming from the south when Mr. and Mrs. Bussard boarded the train for Salem.

## STATE MILK BOARD WILL MEET HERE

The Oregon milk control board will hold a public hearing in the city hall Wednesday at 10:00 a.m. All members of the board, Edgar W. Smith, Glenn B. Marsh and A. E. Engbretson, are expected to attend, accompanied by Paul C. Adams, administrator, and J. D. Mickle of the state department of agriculture, to secure facts and evidence regarding the local price situation and all other matters pertaining to the production and distribution of milk and cream in Klamath and Lake counties.

The board is completing a statewide series of hearings to guide them in the promulgation of an order establishing uniform prices for milk and cream in all parts of the state. Such hearings have been held in the Willamette valley, the coastal counties and in eastern and central Oregon, and the local hearing will complete the state-wide series.

Dairymen, distributors and others interested in the dairy industry in these counties are invited to give sworn testimony or submit briefs pertaining to the local situation. V. L. Applegate, local representative of the board, is notifying members of the industry of the coming meeting, and a large attendance from Klamath and Lake counties is expected.
