Later, after most of the transients had gone to sleep in boxcars and gondolas, they opened their wild, ruthless attack, using two knives and a gun.

One old man, who had been befriended by one of the bandits when another had threatened him, said that his benefactor gave him a 50-cent piece, one of a hand-ful of shiny 50-cent coins the man took from his pocket. The other bandit, however, insisted on shoving the old man into one of the ice reefers.

A letter, declared by Detective Richard Bowen of the Detroit police laboratories to be written in human blood, was received by the police department today, warning it to "lay off the Black Legion."

About the time Fehl was to have been automatically released after allowing good time behavior, April 15, under the procedure which had been followed for some years, the attorney ruled the procedure was against the law, and a parole was necessary.

Governor Martin issued the parole under condition the prisoner remain away from Jackson county. Fehl refused to accept, and his wife started habeas corpus proceedings. Circuit Judge L. H. McManis this week dismissed the action on the grounds that the "law was plain, and that a mandamus action could not control under the act."

WASHINGTON, May 29, (AP)—Senator Borah's final pre-convention address—in which he warned his party not to "go back" and launched another attack on "monopoly"—left room for further speculation today as to what the Idahoan will do if he is displeased with convention results.

In his broadcast speech, only 10 days before the big assembly at Cleveland, the presidential candidate last night declared the republican party is "fighting for its very life," because "the insidious, deadening coils of monopolistic, corporate interests drained away its energy."

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for the preservation of life and liberty against the blind, insatiable mass action seen in other parts of the world," the speaker said.

Dr. Dobbs developed the fact that Christian civilization has been divided into periods of 400 years each since the birth of Christ. In each of these eras some influence has developed, grown strong and broken through, becoming the dominating influence of the following period.

The first period, from the birth of Christ to fall of Rome was characterized by idles, decadence, pressure of Barbarians, and the increase of concessions to governors of provinces to stop the invasions.

From these concessions feudalism had its inception, and with the fall of Rome, feudalism and oppression grew to the dominating factor in the next 400 year period. Also in this period the church grew in power, and when in the year 800, Charlemagne was crowned King of the Holy Roman Empire, feudalism died, and strife between church and kings developed to the predominant characteristic of the next era.

With the death of Henry the Sixth, the church became all powerful, and the Dark Ages began to last for another 400 years. During that period, culture, art and education were controlled by the church. Terrible inquisitions were held, and there was a complete paralysis of individuality, growth and liberty.

With the renaissance the pendulum swung to the other extreme, and the oppression of the church was broken. A growth of individuality and independence in art, culture, and all of life, was seen. The Magna Charta was drawn up, and the constitution of the United States was another step in history which followed this period.

During the present era the rugged type of individualism has become the dominating force, and in the opinion of Dr. Dobbs, this period will run the usual 400-year cycle, coming to its end with a period of social reconstruction just as bitter as those in the past.

Humanity, not individualism will be the ruling power to come, but this will only come about when men are willing to give up something of their own for the common good, Dr. Dobbs concluded.

"The eastern markets follow the west rather reluctantly but the trend is very clearly upward again, trading close on imports and many fear that the new levels will mean increased use of substitutes. The piece-goods markets, as well as yarns and tops are behind wool values. Foreign markets are inclined to be a bit easier again this week."

QUEEN MARY BREAKS DAY'S RUN RECORD

ABOARD THE S. S. QUEEN MARY EN ROUTE TO NEW YORK, May 29 (AP)—The Queen Mary broke the French Normandie's record for a full 25-hour day run by traveling 747 miles up until noon, ship's time, today.

(Since the Queen Mary is traveling westward across the Atlantic, clocks were set back one hour during the long run, thereby making the day 25 hours long).

The ship is following "13" track, which is a route of approximately 3,150 miles from Cherbourg to Ambrose Light.

The Normandie's best day's run to the west was 744 nautical miles.

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
