

OLIVER SLY, PIONEER, DIES HERE SUNDAY

Klamath county lost one of its best known pioneers in the passing of Oliver W. Sly, who died here Sunday evening, May 31.

He was born near Jackson, Amador county, California, on October 24, 1860, one of nine children. His parents crossed the plains by ox-team. When about 15 years old his parents moved to Jackson county, where Sly grew to manhood and attended the country schools. In 1887 he was married to Effie M. Stinson at Central Point. In 1895 they moved to Klamath county where since that time they have resided. Sly followed the business of farming and stock raising. During the early days of Linkville, he drove one of the freight teams which brought supplies from Ager, which was the nearest shipping point to Klamath county at that time. The last 30 years he has resided at the well known State Line ranch, near Dorris, known by that name because of the house being in Oregon and the barn being in California.

He leaves his wife, Effie M., and five daughters, and one son. The daughters are Mrs. Mabel Taber, Mrs. Lottie Miller of Klamath Falls; Mrs. Mildred Wanichuk, of Bend; Mrs. Ethel Owen of Dorris, and Mrs. Agnes Swigert of Montague, Calif. The son, LeRoy W. Sly of Chico, Cal. Two brothers, George Sly of La Pine, and Nell of Seaside, and one sister, Mrs. Annie Fredrick of San Francisco. Surviving also are 14 grandchildren.

Arrangements for the services are under the direction of the Klamath Funeral home.

MONTH OF MAY ABOVE NORMAL

Both temperatures and precipitation during the month of May were above average, according to reports from the U. S. weather bureau. The mean temperature for the month was recorded at 56.1, or 2.9 above normal, and the precipitation was 1.6 of an inch above normal, with a total fall of 1.08 inches.

The mean maximum temperature was 70.4 degrees and the mean minimum 41.6. The highest temperature was 88 degrees on May 10, and the coldest on May 7, when the mercury went down to 29 degrees above zero.

There were 15 clear days, 12 partially cloudy and four entirely cloudy.

CANDIDATES LIST COSTS OF CAMPAIGN

R. A. LaLonde, who missed the democratic sheriff's nomination by 11 votes, spent \$149.85 on his campaign, according to his expense statement filed with the county clerk.

Guy Bellant, another unsuccessful candidate for the democratic ticket, spent \$89.85. Joe Kinsey, who won the nomination, reported expenses of \$27.80.

George M. Denton, unsuccessful candidate for the democratic nomination for county commis-

ioner, spent \$45.50. R. H. Anderson, who won the republican nomination for that post, used \$70.70 in his campaign. A. C. Liston, one of Anderson's opponents, spent \$12.75. W. T. Dean, a democratic candidate for commissioner, spent \$25.

Ben Zbinden and J. M. Ezell, defeated candidates for the republican nomination for county clerk, spent \$17.95 and \$27.05, respectively, in their campaigns. It cost W. L. Wales \$20.50 to put on the campaign that won him the republican nomination for county surveyor.

The slight foot pressure exerted when the driver of the new Series Sixty Cadillac V-8 slows to a stop from a 50-mile pace, is built up by the super hydraulic brakes into a force sufficient to lift the car vertically to the top of an 8-story building.

Three Millionth Ford Produced

DEARBORN, Mich. — The 3,000,000th V-8 Ford came off the famous final assembly line at the Rouge plant of the Ford Motor company May 26 under the eyes of Henry Ford and Edsel Ford and a group of British cement manufacturers headed by Viscount Wolmer.

The car, which marks another milestone in Ford production, was immediately driven to the new Ford Rotunda after it had been inspected by the Fords and their guests. There it will remain on display for a few days after which it will be started overland to Dallas for exhibition during the summer in the Ford Exposition building at the Texas Centennial exposition.
