Conferees Approve Flood Control Bill

WASHINGTON, June 1, (AP)—Senate and house conferees reached agreements today on the \$320,000,000 Omnibus flood control bill and the \$262,000,000 Overton measure to provide flood control works in the lower Mississippi basin.

Both bills call for contributions by state governments to meet any costs and damages incidental to the acquisition of properties for flood control projects.

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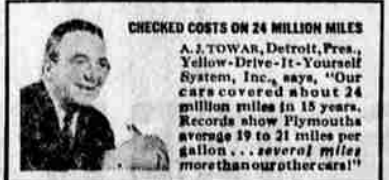
