

FIRM CHARACTER NOTED FOR WHEAT

CHICAGO, June 1. (AP)—Firmness characterized the wheat market today, but there was no important follow up to demand, and advances failed to hold well.

Some damage to the spring wheat crop in central South Dakota was reported. Sentiment in favor of higher prices, however, was tempered by prospects of cooler weather northwest and showers.

Wheat closed steady, 1/4 off to 1/2 up compared with Friday's finish. July 34 1/2-35 1/2, Sept. 34 1/2-35 1/2, corn 1 1/2 down, July 59 1/2 to 59 1/2, oats 1 1/2 decline, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 7 cents.

Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, June 1. (AP)—Cheering business news brought quiet buying in today's stock market, and leading steel, rails and specialties pushed up fractions to a point or more.

The utilities were not so vigorous, and there were scattered losers in evidence, but the close was firm. Transfers were around 750,000 shares.

Among pleasing developments was the report of the American Iron and Steel Institute that mill output this week will be at 85.2 per cent of capacity, up .3 of one point from last week.

A little late profit taking shook most gains down from their peak levels of the day. Among the best performers were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Youngstown Sheet and Tube (at a new year's top), National Steel, American Steel Foundries, Republic Steel, Santa Fe, N. Y. Central, Great Northern, M-K-T preferred, J. I. Case, Sears Roebuck, Corn Products, Warner Bros., Radio, Pullman, Schenley, Byron Jackson and American Smelting.

Certain Teed products dropped nearly 2 following announcement of recapitalization plans. Commercial Investment Trust, ex-dividend 20 per cent in stock, sold around 70. It closed last Friday at 82 1/2.

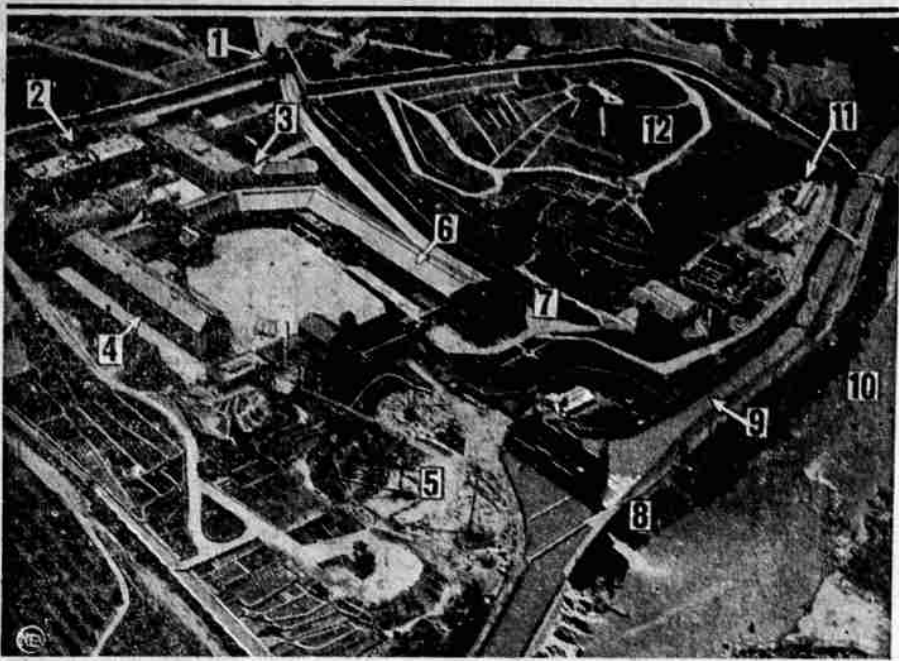

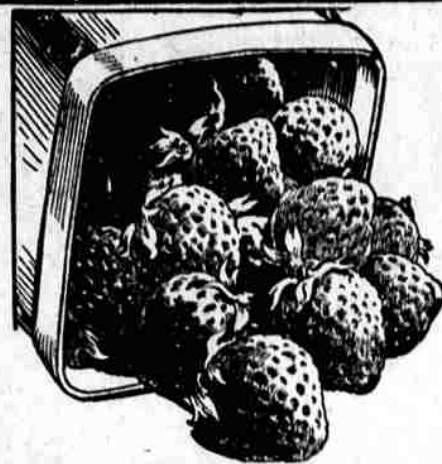
The Cyclo-Stormograph at Underwood's pharmacy registers little change in barometric pres-
