court's invalidation of New York's statute governing the minimum pay of women.

Described in some quarters as a blow to labor and greeted in others with "delight," the 5-4 split decision ruled out the empire state's 1933 law on the ground it violated "the right to make contracts."

Other Laws Affected

Whether their own laws would stand or fall became an immediate question of importance to officials in many of the 16 states where statute books contain at least some of the provisions written into the New York legislation.

The majority opinion, read by Justice Butler and concurred in by Justices Van Devanter, McReynolds, Sutherland and Roberts, held that a state has no power "to prohibit, change or nullify contracts between employers and adult women workers as to the amount of wages to be paid."

The minority opinion, by Chief Justice Hughes, joined by Justices Brandeis, Stone and Cardozo, argued that there is nothing in the constitution "which denies to the states the power to protect women from being exploited by over-reaching employers through the refusal of a fair wage."

TOURIST BUREAU WORKERS COMING

Returning to Klamath Falls, the girls will have dinner at the Pelican grill. Sunday morning, the junior chamber of commerce will be host at a cowboy breakfast in their honor at Moore park. They will leave for their respective homes Sunday noon.

Balsiger, Locke and Ostendorf Motor companies will provide cars for transporting the visitors to beauty spots of the Klamath country. They will stay at the Willard and Hall hotels, and the Willard will provide meals.

Meetings of this kind are held annually at the opening of the tourist season by the Klamath county chamber of commerce.

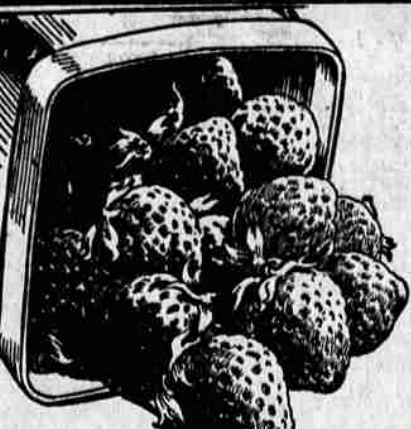

WARNING ISSUED AGAINST RIFLES

A complaint from a Conger avenue resident whose house was penetrated by a .22 calibre bullet was received Tuesday by Juvenile Officer Carl Cook.

The bullet went through the screen of a window, broke a hole in the glass, and came to rest on the bed.

Cook pointed out that a .22 rifle is dangerous up to one mile. In fact, he said, it is more dangerous than a higher powered rifle, because most people realize the potentialities of the latter, but are inclined to be careless with small calibre weapons.

The officer believes the Conger avenue bullet was shot at something flying over the other side of Link river, and had carried about half a mile when it hit the house.

Cook said he also is receiving complaints from persons who have seen boys shooting birds.

If parents will forbid boys hunting in the city with small rifles or air guns, Cook said, both birds and humans will be safer. Meanwhile, he is rapidly compiling the new shooting range in the hills beyond Pacific Terrace, and safe shooting will be provided there.

Long Bell Firm Begins Sawing

Long Bell Lumber company sawed its first log in its plant on Klamath river south of town Monday, and was operating the sawmill full blast Tuesday.

Manager C. K. Fleming said that other departments would begin operating shortly.

Both the Klamath and Dorris mills are operating on one shift. Logs for the Klamath mill are shipped by rail from the Yam-say mountain country.

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ACTION AGAINST PICKETS SOUGHT

PORTLAND, Ore., June 2.—The Southeast Portland Lumber company filed a suit today for a circuit court injunction restraining the Lumber and Sawmill Workers' union from picketing the plant.

The company workers are not affiliated with the pickets and have no dispute with the firm, said the complaint, which charged that outside union groups attempted through intimidation to gain a foothold in the mill.

Bodily harm has been threatened if workers continue to work, and officials also have been threatened with personal assault and damage to property, it was stated.

The company's minimum wage scale is 55 cents an hour. It is the only sizeable plant in Portland whose workers do not belong to the Lumber and Sawmill Workers' union, and American Federation of Labor affiliates.

SENATE APPROVES FLOOD MEASURE

WASHINGTON, June 2.—The senate today approved by voice vote the conference report on the \$320,000,000 omnibus flood control bill, sending it to the house for final congressional action.

The measure would require states and local subdivisions to meet land costs and damages incurred incidental to the acquisition of sites for flood control works.

It would provide for 217 projects, all of which were approved by the board of army engineers.
