Timber Marker Develops Into Highly Specialized Job

A new job has come out of the woods. It is the occupation of timber marker and it bids fair to become a permanent profession, according to the Western Pine association of Portland. This highly technical job has grown up as an item in the extensive forestry practice of western pine loggers and was first introduced on private timberlands by these operators.

The timber marker goes into the logging woods ahead of the sawyers who fell the trees. He must have a thorough knowledge not only of standing timber, but of what comes out of timber; namely, lumber. His tools are a crayon, a hand ax, a pad of waterproof paper, a box of tacks and a Baltimore stick. This last is a short wooden stick of graduated markings. Pacing a certain distance from a tree, the timber marker holds the stick up in front of him. By the simple system of triangulation, marks on the stick indicate the full length of the tree or any part of it.

When the timber marker has thus measured the tree and also considered its general appearance for the making of lumber, he marks a slip and tacks it on the bark. After felling, the tags are attached to the stump to show the cutting has been properly done.

On the slip the marker instructs the sawyers as to how many and what lengths of logs shall be cut from a particular tree. If the slip reads "12-16," the sawyers know they are to cut a 12-foot log, then a 16-foot log, then another 12-foot.

Trees that the sawyers are not to touch, the marker designates as seed trees or trees too immature to be cut, tacking blank tags on them to show they were not overlooked.

This new practice of timber selection has two objects in view. One is to make positive that good seed trees, from which a continuous forest of pine will grow, are left on every acre of land logged over. The other is to cut trees into log-lengths most suitable for lumber making.

No two trees look alike, except to people who don't know anything about them. One tree will yield the most high grade lumber if the lower logs are cut into two 12-foot lengths, while another tree will grade better in a 16-foot log, a 12-foot and a 14-foot. Branches, because they make knots, play a big part in the timber marker's selection of lengths.

After more than a year of timber marking ahead of the sawing crews, the Mount Emily Lumber company is so pleased with the results that the new job has been made a part of the permanent payroll, according to L. K. Kinzel, in charge of the company's timber and logging operations.

"Ten years ago lumbermen would have laughed at the idea of sending a man ahead of the sawyers to pick and choose, and to mark every tree of commercial size on the tract," Mr. Kinzel said. "The truth is, it still sounds rather queer. However, this practice not only assures a continuously growing western pine forest, but we have found it pays the company in hard cash."

"Since putting two timber markers to work, after training them in both woods and saw-mill, we have cut better lumber from our logs than ever before. We wouldn't think of being without timber markers."

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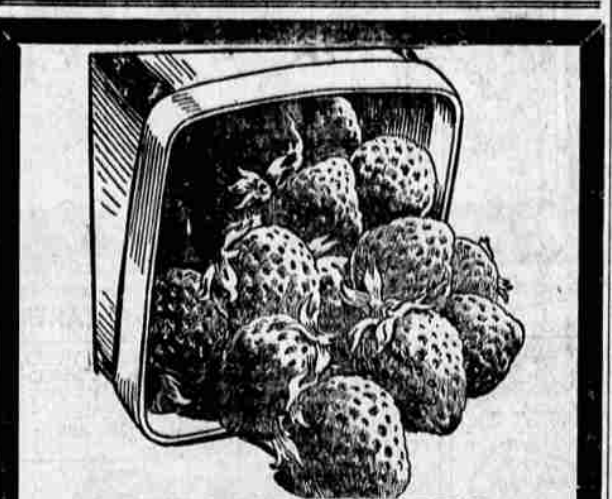
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
