First green corn of the local season due about Friday, will be priced around 45c doz.

New potatoes have taken a change for the better again with prices up 15-25c in the Shafter district. The stock is much better and is taking fumigation well.

With the laying season dwindling, more Leghorn hens are being culled out with resulting ease in the local situation.

Some Black Tartarian cherries from Roseburg being offered.

Both red and white new onions being quoted around \$2 cental.

Cantaloupes lower with jumbo stock \$3-3.25 except the 27s which are down to \$2.75 crate. Market steady to 25c lower in the south.

Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, June 3. (AP)—The stock market had a weather eye for squalls today, and, as a result, made little or no headway.

A fresh outbreak of labor disturbances in France, together with doubts regarding the outcome of the senate tax controversy, were said to have kept many traders on the fence. The close was irregular. Transfers were around 600,000 shares.

In one of the slowest sessions for some time, only a few specialties managed to move ahead. Numerous issues were unchanged to off a point or so.

In addition to the political troubles of the French, the nervousness of the gold bloc countries was exemplified by the action of the Netherlands bank in raising its discount rate from 3 1/2 to 4 1/2 per cent, the second boost in a week. The increase was for the purpose of stemming the gold outflow.

Owens-Illinois and Coca-Cola were up three and two points respectively, at their best. Warren Bros. and Cerro de Pasco were ahead one point or so. Resistance was shown by Corn Products, American Can, Sears Roebuck, Canada Dry and Standard Oil of New Jersey. The rails, steels, motors and utilities were in the backward column.

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MASSACHUSETTS LAWMAKER DIES

GLOUCESTER, Mass., June 3. (AP)—U. S. Representative A. Platt Andrew Jr., died at his Gloucester home early today. He was 63.

Andrew came home from Washington April 25, suffering from influenza. His condition improved, until two weeks ago, when it suddenly became critical.

Andrew, a director of the mini and an assistant secretary of the treasury during the administration of President Taft, had held office as congressman from the sixth Massachusetts district since 1921, when he was elected to fill an unexpired term.
