

ARMY PLANE CRASHES IN TIMBER AREA

GRANTS PASS, June 5. (AP)—An army observation plane was completely demolished yesterday morning when its pilot, Major Gates, and his mechanic were forced to bail out when its motor failed above the clouds near Heagle, Jackson county.

Gates and the mechanic were uninjured. They quit the ship about 11:30 a. m. when trouble developed in their Douglas built ship above the mountainous country. They were on their way from San Francisco to Seattle.

The fliers arrived at Medford at 5 o'clock yesterday. A party left there this morning to inspect the wreckage. It was expected nothing could be salvaged.

MEDFORD, Ore., June 5. (AP)—An army airplane crashed in the heavy timber northwest of this city Thursday morning. Major B. E. Gates and Private Charles Robbins, both of Maxwell field, Alabama, "bailed out" and landed with minor injuries.

Major Gates is landing slightly in the branches of a tree and sustained facial scratches and a blacked eye.

The two airmen made their way to the timber camp of George W. Barker near Heagle, and were brought to this city in a truck.

The plane is a total wreck. Major Gates upon arrival here telegraphed to San Francisco and a plane arrived here last evening returning him south. A plane is due today to return Private Robbins.

According to Private Robbins, they were forced to leap when the motor failed and the plane lost altitude rapidly.

It was Robbins' first experience with a parachute, and the fourth time Major Gates has leaped for his life.

The plane was on a tour of the west coast to "build up air hours" for Major Gates and Robbins.

The plane passed over this city and circled the air field at eleven o'clock Thursday morning.

BOSTON, June 5. (AP)—U. S. Dept. Agr. Prices were firm in the Boston market on a rather moderate turnover of fine territory wools. Average to good French combing lines of 64s and finer territory wools in original bags brought mostly around 84-86 cents scored basis, but it was difficult to secure good wools below 85 cents. Average to short fine French combing wools moved around 82-84 cents scored basis.

HAWAIIAN ISLAND ARMY POSTS OPEN

The U. S. army recruiting station, city hall, Medford, has received additional vacancies for the Hawaiian Islands. Field artillery, infantry, and engineer corps, are now open to young men who can pass the required physical and mental requirements.

Young high school graduates especially are invited by Sergeant Hill, local recruiting officer, to look into the possibilities offered. He points out that many enlisted men, each year, are appointed to the United States Military Academy, West Point, New York. Men are also picked from the ranks to enter the flying cadet corps, where they are taught aviation, as well as to many other technical or trade schools.

The sailing date for the Hawaiian Islands is June 23. Men for this assignment must be enlisted a few days prior to that date.

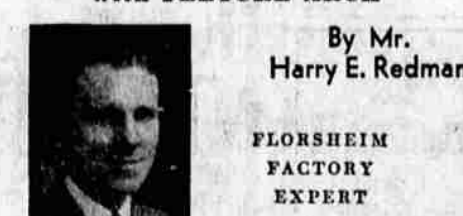
