PROTESTED WARRANT BASIS ORDERED

County Treasurer George P. Taylor announced Friday that the Klamath county road fund had been placed on a protested warrant basis.

The reason, he said, is that the fund has temporarily run out, and the warrant basis will probably have to be continued until the gas tax money comes in from the state about July 15. Banks, Taylor said, are taking the road warrants at par.
