

Harmon Waley Knocks Out Tough Al Capone, Alcatraz Prison Grapevine Reports

ALCATRAZ ISLAND, Federal Prison, San Francisco, June 5. (UP)—James J. Johnston, the Rotarian the government chose to be warden of its toughest prison, saved the flaccid reputation of one of his most famous charges Thursday by denying that string-beanish Harmon Waley, Weyerhaeuser kidnaper, had scored a one-punch victory over Al Capone, who used to fancy

himself quite handy with his fists in his New York "Al Brown" days. Newspapers heard of the incident through grapevine sources. Their story was that Capone, whose temper has not improved under the stringent regulations of the American Devil's Island, called young Waley a "baby snatcher" during the course of an argument at their work.

Right on the Button Thereupon, so the story goes, the 160-pound, six foot one inch Waley brought one up swiftly from the floor and landed on the shorter but heavier man's "button," knocking him to the ground and stunning him temporarily.

Guards were supposed to have intervened at that point to prevent Capone from going in to take some more.

Waley's hands apparently were tougher than those of another inmate supposed to have swung a punch on Capone's scarred face some months ago. The other convict came out of the fracas with a broken hand, the same grapevine route said.

Usual Denial Johnston was inside the prison when today's story broke and he was not available immediately for his usual denial. By the time the United Press got in contact with him, he was in a more mellow mood than formerly.

Instead of his brusque "we don't give out any information about our prisoners," Warden Johnston, who mixed studies of penology with business activities so successfully he made his avocation his profession, took time out to talk about it.

"I heard the story first from your newspaper boys," he said. "So I went out to investigate."

Started as Bouncer "I wasn't able to find anything to verify the story. In fact, unless my own information is all wrong, Capone doesn't even know what Waley looks like. Sorry."

Waley is the 24-year-old youth who aided William Mahan, alias Dainard, in seizing young George Weyerhaeuser of Tacoma, Wash., and holding him until \$200,000 ransom was paid. Waley was captured within 10 days after the boy's release and Mahan finally was caught a year later. Capone had quite a reputation as a fighter when he was a New York "tough." He got his start in the underworld as a bouncer.
