On the Day's News

SKIMMING the headlines is always interesting. Without headlines, the newspaper would be far, far indeed from the bright, lively, entertaining picture of the day's events it now is.

THE editor of the newspaper THINKS he is the big shot of the works, although privately the columnists know better, and IN REALITY the plain, hard-working news writers who cover their beats day by day and report accurately and crisply what is going on provide the blood stream that nourishes the whole newspaper body.

But don't overlook the headline writer. His work is the most thoroughly read of anybody's in the business.

AND don't overlook this fact: The headline writer's style is brief and crisp and to the point, never wasting a word. If you want what you have to say to be listened to, take a hint from the writers of headlines.

THIS headline smites the eye on the day this is written: "China War Spins Flares."

The trouble seems to be that it didn't flame soon enough. Japan has the idea that China will be an easy conquest, and when a warlike nation gets that idea about another country trouble is likely to follow.

THE headlines, on Friday of the week preceding the Republican national convention, in time that Landon has the best chance of the nomination. It may be, however, that he has merely the best press agent.

The national convention of a great political party (the Republican party still is a great organization, regardless of what may have been said in the past four years) is about as political as anything can be, and in politics nothing is ever certain until it happens.

(THE nominee at Cleveland, you may take it for granted, will be the man regarded as having the best chance to beat Roosevelt. If Landon, in the opinion of the delegates, is that man, Landon will be nominated. Otherwise not.)

HERE is an interesting tale from Mexico City:

Bandits raided a Mexican town and burned the school house. The teacher, SENORITA (Senorita is Spanish for Miss) Maria Hernandez, climbed to the roof of her home with a rifle, cut loose at the raiders and in the course of a half hour battle killed two of them and wounded four. The rest took to the brush.

A country that produces school teachers like that must have a future. So don't give up hope for Mexico.

THIS headline is interesting: "Drouth Causes Big Crop Lossen."

The losses are in the southeast, and in Charlotte, North Carolina, officials urge residents to pray for the end of the drouth which has caused loss so far in excess of 150 million dollars (estimates, not statistics.)

End the drouth? Isn't that heresy in these days when SCARCITY is supposed to make us all prosperous and happy?

Mussolini Hurls Armed Warnings Against Critics

ROME, June 6, (AP)—Premier Mussolini hurled a warning, cast in steel and men at Italy's critics today. The fascist dictator called 40,000 soldiers in the army's best motorized squadrons to parade the empire tomorrow as his gauge against possible criticism at future league of nations sessions on the Ethiopian question.

Their triumphal review will center at Rome where Viceroy Pietro Badoglio, victorious commander of the Ethiopian campaign, now in Italy, is to receive the accolade of hero from the nation's highest leaders.

PENSION BOOSTERS SUPPORT MAHONEY

Mayor Receives Pledge in Candidacy For U. S. Senate.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 6, (AP)—The Oregon Townsend headquarters threw its support today to Willis Mahoney in his candidacy for a seat in the United States senate.

Dr. Ralph Shaduck, state area manager of the pension program, said Regional Director Frank Arbuckle of Los Angeles directed the Oregon Townsend members to work for the Klamath Falls mayor in opposition to the republican incumbent, Senator Charles McNary.

Mahoney won the democratic nomination over John Jeffries, Portland attorney.

Senator McNary polled a strong vote to win the republican nomination over two Townsend candidates, Sam Brown and Theodore Nelson.

GAY DECORATIONS PLANNED FOR 4TH

Gay and appropriate decorations will adorn the streets of Klamath Falls prior to and during the three-day Independence day celebration, it was announced by Marshall Cornett, general chairman of the celebration committee.

The committee has contracted with the Cam Advertising company of Portland to provide the decorations.

Plans call for putting up the banners about ten days before the celebration opens. Decorations will be placed on Main street and South Sixth street.

"The appearance of the city is important to the proper spirit for our celebration," said Cornett. "We feel that these street decorations will not only help build the celebration spirit in people of this community, but they will also give effective advance publicity for the big event."

All plans for the celebration are shaping late under Cornett and his various committee chairmen.

CLEAR LAKE PROBE BACKED BY SENATE

WASHINGTON, June 6, (AP)—The senate today passed a house bill to authorize a bureau of investigation to determine whether any dams or waterworks have been constructed in the Clear lake watershed in northern California in violation of the water rights of southeastern Oregon. The bill was introduced by Representative Walter M. Pierce of La Grande, Ore. The measure now goes to the house for action on a minor amendment.

MICHIGAN CHIEF NOT OUT FOR V. P.

Development Inspires Interest in Nomination of Vice-president.

CLEVELAND, June 6, (AP)—A report that the opponents of Gov. Landon of Kansas, were seeking to rally behind a common candidate arose today amid renewed assertions from Landon managers that his nomination was assured.

The names of former Gov. Frank O. Lowden of Illinois, Glenn Frank, president of the University of Wisconsin, and Senator Arthur Vandenberg of Michigan, were brought forward by a story in the Cleveland News saying the Landon opposition was trying to unite on one of these.

Denials Made

For the time being, at least, there were denials from both the camps of Colonel Knox of Chicago, and Senator Borah of Idaho, that they were doing more than making a common battle against Landon with each still fighting for its own candidate.

In the midst of this, all talk of the vice presidential candidate revolved around the announcement of Senator Vandenberg that he would not accept the nomination.

Landon supporters, who had raised their claims of delegate strength to 400 votes on the first ballot, said they had expected no support from Michigan. Otherwise they would not comment.

Liberal Planks Eyed

Whether the Vandenberg withdrawal presaged a shift in the alignments of Landon opposition was left, for the moment, a matter of debate and of much speculation in the city's crowded hotel lobbies.

Already there had arisen a discussion of the leanings of William Allen White of Kansas toward liberal platform expressions on minimum wages, labor-business regulation and social security, and whether they might diminish Landon's support among eastern conservatives.

White said today he would formulate no platform proposal (Continued on Page Five)

COUNT STARTED IN LABOR VOTE

PORTLAND, Ore., June 6, (AP)—Labor leaders began counting the ballots of nearly 10,000 union lumber workers in 42 localities today while leaders in widespread labor disputes through the Columbia basin and south coast Oregon region struggled with vexing problems affecting hundreds of other workmen.

The ballots were cast upon the proposed agreement between employers and union leaders for working conditions among loggers of the Columbia basin, whose insistence upon union control of hiring halls led to a walk out and shutdown of more than 30 camps a month ago.

Union leaders said the count, started shortly before noon, would not be completed until sometime tonight.

Granville Winner of Belmont States

NEW YORK, June 6, (AP)—William Woodward's Granville today won the 88th running of the Belmont stakes, noting out John Hay Whitney's Mr. Bones, a rank outsider at Belmont park before a crowd estimated at more than 30,000. Hal Price Headley's Hollywood, also a long shot, was third in the field of ten three-year-olds.

Central Oregon Wilderness Combed for Youth Wanted in Rangeland Killing

PRINEVILLE, Ore., June 6, (AP)—Poses of state police and sheriff deputies scatted through one of the west's last frontiers today, hunting for a 19-year-old youth as a killer in another of the bitter rangeland feuds which have brought gunplay and death in central Oregon since pioneer days.

Fugitive Stays at Cabin

Only a matter of hours behind the asserted slayer, Darrell Walker, three state police troopers rushed a cabin in the hills early today, where they believed Walker spent the night, but he had gone. Striking out anew, poses spread through the timbered stretches of Snow mountain in the remote southeastern Ochoco forest, where Walker was thought to have sought refuge.

State police officers, Arthur Tuck, E. R. Pyle and Joe Miller, after hunting all night, came upon a cabin about 20 miles from the Central Oregon sheep ranch, where Merritt Penock, 25, was shot down yesterday. They said the cabin had been vacated only recently.

Man Reported Surrounded

Sheriff Ben Groff, of Crook county, telephoned from the Allison ranger station, just south of the Gran-arney line, that he believed officers had Walker surrounded in the Snow mountain region. Posesmen from Bend and Prineville were ordered to converge there.

Groff said the stove in the cabin was still warm when officers reached it and the relatively (Continued on Page Five)

SOUTHWEST STORMS TAKE EIGHT LIVES

OKLAHOMA CITY, June 6, (AP)—Tornado winds, floods, lightning, hail and torrential rains left eight persons dead in Oklahoma and Kansas today, and caused widespread property and crop damage.

Six died in Oklahoma as freak twisters roared into several small communities, wrecking homes, business buildings and farmsteads. Lightning bolts dealt death to two persons in Kansas.

The three youths, glum and non-committal, were brought back here late Friday. Roy Barnes was questioned Saturday morning, and it is understood the alleged confession came from him. Others were to be questioned later.

KLAMATH WOMAN HURT IN CRASH

Car Driven by Mrs. Don Zumwalt Collides With Truck at 2nd, Main.

Mrs. Don J. Zumwalt of 430 South Riverside avenue was seriously injured shortly before noon Saturday, when her automobile crashed into a heavily loaded sand truck at the intersection of Main and Second streets. She received a severe cut on her forehead and underwent chest injuries. Mrs. Zumwalt was rushed to Hillside hospital by ambulance.

The truck, which was driven by Floyd Farmer of 2311 White avenue for the W. D. Miller Construction company, had stopped at the intersection of Main and Second street, and had just started to make a left turn onto Main, when Mrs. Zumwalt's automobile coming toward city center, crashed into the truck just behind the cab, according to witnesses.

Witnesses also stated that Mrs. Zumwalt was not driving at an excessive rate of speed and the truck was moving slowly. Her car was demolished and the heavy truck pushed sideways for approximately three feet.

The steering wheel in Mrs. Zumwalt's car was broken in two places from the impact of her chest as she was hurled against it.

She was reported to be resting comfortably early Saturday afternoon, however, according to attendants at Hillside hospital.

Mr. Zumwalt, who is employed by the state highway department in Lakeview, was called home immediately after his wife's accident.

CHINA CIVIL WAR BELIEVED AVERTED

SHANGHAI, June 6, (AP)—Events in south China, where a quarter million men are reported under arms, were characterized by uncertainty today.

Canton leaders were chiefly engaged in issuing reiterative statements that south China wants armed resistance against Japan.

They added, however: "But the actual launching of an anti-Japanese campaign must be inaugurated by Nanking." (Nanking is the capital of China.)

Canton reports credited Gen. Chen Chi-Tang, commander in chief of the forces of Kwangsi province, which with Kwangsi makes up south China, as saying:

"The southwest political council on June 2 urged Nanking to launch a war of resistance against Japan, and asked the government to lead the fight against these invaders."

"The people here want anti-Japanese resistance. I and the Kwangsi army will attempt to fulfill their desire."

His statement and statements of other south China leaders were considered an assurance against the possibility of a civil war in China.

Disorder Reigns In Streets And Deputy Chamber

Premier Blum Attacked as Jew by Rightist, Provoking Outburst; Gendarmes and Students Fight in Latin Quarter

PARIS, June 6, (AP)—Leon Blum's new leftist government received a vote of confidence from the chamber of deputies tonight by an estimated tally of 410 to 205.

PARIS, June 6, (AP)—Students and police fought in the Latin quarter in an outburst of violence tonight after socialist Premier Leon Blum had temporarily withdrawn from the chamber of deputies under a personal attack.

A rightist deputy had assailed Blum as a Jew. The students demonstrated with shouts of "France for the French!"

Rioting Halted

Sergeants-at-arms suppressed the outburst, which approached physical violence, in the chamber of deputies. Gendarmes broke up the student demonstration, making a dozen arrests.

Striking employees of the afternoon newspaper, Paris Soir, beat carriers who attempted to run through a picket line.

Approximately 500 striking members of the delivery force surrounded the newspaper office in a blockade, preventing any of the papers from reaching the streets.

Blum, returning to the chamber, declared flatly there would be "no devaluation of the franc!"

Called a Jew

Leftists, supporting the new socialist head of government, and the rightist opposition cheered, jeered, banged their desks and shouted, wrecking all order in the legislature.

The riotous demonstration reached its height when Xavier Valat, a rightist deputy, shouted: "Blum's coming to power will be a historic date, for it is the first time that a Gallic-Roman country has been governed by a Jew."

Blum arose and walked out of the room.

His new cabinet, composed of socialists and radical-socialists, started cheering, leftist deputies joining in the cheers.

Go to Moscow!

Jean Chippelle, the former prefect of police, who lost his post because of the police firing against the mobs in the rioting of February, 1934, was one of the rightists who joined in the tumult.

Other rightists shouted at Premier Blum: "Go to Moscow! Go to Moscow!"
