DEMOCRATIC CHIEFS HERE FOR LUNCH

At a luncheon Saturday noon in the Elk hotel banquet room, Carl Donough, United States Attorney and Frank Tierney, executive secretary of the state democratic organization, explained to 25 Klamath democrats how each Roosevelt supporter in the United States will be permitted to participate in his nomination and acceptance, June 27, at the democratic national convention in Philadelphia.

Donough said June 27 has been set aside as Roosevelt Day for demonstrations in each county and state in the union. The Portland democrats are making a tour of the state promoting programs for each Oregon county. Persons participating in demonstrations will be termed "Roosevelt Nomminators."

Programs are expected to be finished at 8 o'clock P. M. when Roosevelt will accept the democratic nomination over nationwide radio broadcasting systems.

The luncheon Saturday was called by Charles H. Mack, local democrat chairman, who will be in charge of the Klamath demonstration. Each county democrat chairman will be in charge of programs throughout the state.

Mack urged all democrats, regardless of being precinct committeemen, to attend the meeting of the democratic central committee at the courthouse Tuesday evening, to assist in making plans for the Roosevelt day program in Klamath Falls. He explained that the Roosevelt demonstration will not be a party affair but will include all administration supporters regardless of party.

ANNIVERSARY EVENT SCHEDULED SUNDAY

The First Baptist church announces that it will commemorate the 52nd anniversary of its organization Sunday, June 7. The church was organized in Poe Valley in 1884 and since its beginning the organization has remained complete and intact. There were about 15 charter members, four of whom are still living. These are: Mr. and Mrs. C. R. Delap and Mrs. J. B. Griffith of Klamath Falls, and Mrs. Robert Casey of Ashland, Ore.

Rev. J. B. Griffith was the first pastor of the church which was named "Mount Zion Baptist Church" and was known by that name until it occupied its new building in Klamath Falls in 1904. Since that time the church has been located at Eighth and Washington streets and has been known as the First Baptist church. For some time after moving to Klamath Falls, the church met in various homes of the community. Then it rented the "Old Houston Opera House" where for several years it carried on the services and work.

It was not until 1906 that the membership felt able to erect a building. It became necessary to enlarge the original structure and in 1925 a basement was constructed under the auditorium during the ministry of Rev. A. F. Simmons who was pastor of the church from May, 1921 to 1930. Upon his resignation the church called Rev. L. B. Sigle of Fort Worth, Texas, who began his ministry in March, 1930. Prior to this time the church organization had been slow but consistent. During the five years of Mr. Sigle's ministry the membership increased about 100 per cent. In 1931 the necessity for more room again arose and the old building was enlarged and remodelled into the present structure.

"The First Baptist church has marched hand in hand with the founders and builders of the Klamath country," said Rev. Cecil Brown, the present pastor. "It has blazed the trail for Christianity and has assisted those sturdy pioneers in laying the foundation stone for a better civilization in Klamath county. A number of Klamath pioneers have been connected with the local church, some of whom are still active in Christian work."

The church announces an all-day meeting in connection with the anniversary celebration. Rev. G. C. Griffin, pastor of the First Baptist church of Lakeview, Oregon, who will assist the pastor in the program of the day, will speak at 11:00 a. m. and 8:00 p. m. A basket dinner will be served at noon in the basement of the church followed at 2:30 by a roll call service and covenant meeting. The public is cordially invited to these commemorative services.

open country gave officers hope of effecting a capture shortly. If Walker succeeded in escaping into the wild rugged region farther east, however, the chances of his escape would be increased.

There are no towns and but few inhabitants in the area, which is covered with open pine.

Officers were told that Walker rode into the Ike Mills sheep shearing plant east of here near Sulphur on the Grant-Creek county line about noon yesterday and shot Peacock through the head. Springing on a bay horse, he galloped away toward the hills to the east.

Both are sons of old time residents of the central Oregon range country and officers were informed that their feud over range and fence rights had been punctuated with gunplay on other occasions.

Ranchers on Lookout—Sheriff Claude McCauley of Deschutes county, ordered all ranchers to be on the lookout for Walker and Sheriff C. W. Frazier of Arney county, posted guards along country roads as a precaution against Walker hitchhiking a ride.

Heavy rains which drenched the range lands late yesterday along the southwest foothills of the Ochoco range aided the fugitive by covering up his tracks. Peacock's body still remained in the rugged hill country, where he was killed.

tirely surrounded himself with Jews." The rightist deputy attacked Blum's political prophecies, notably his prediction in 1932 that Adolf Hitler would never take the power in Germany.

Then Vallat attacked the British policy of sanctions against Italy, but not against Germany. Vallat spoke of the 1934 riots, and said he regretted to see that Pierre Cot, who was air minister at that time, was back in the cabinet again.

Chlappe arose to answer a charge that insufficient police preparations had been made at the time of the rioting, but his words were drowned out by the shouting deputies.
