Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, June 6, (P)—The stock market took on a little brighter hue today as scattered equities managed to advance fractions to around a point.

The European muddle was still a thorn in the trading flesh, however, and no pronounced buying rush was in evidence. The close was steady. Transfers were around 250,000 shares, the smallest in volume in about a year.

Merchandise issues, apparently reflecting high hopes of soldiers' bonus spending after the middle of this month, were among the best gainers.

Improvement in low-priced rails and utilities gave the bond division a better tone. Grains and cotton pointed downward. Foreign currencies were quiet.

The more popular stocks included those of Sears Roebuck, Montgomery Ward, May Department Stores, Colonial Beaco Oil, Youngs Bay, Sherrill & Tube, U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, General Motors, Chrysler, Douglas Aircraft, Anaconda, Crown Cork, Standard Oil of New Jersey, Western Union and Consolidated Edison.

The rails were a bit better than even.

Some banking quarters saw in the change of governors of the Bank of France the possibility that the
