

Red Sox Defeat Loggers on Wet Diamond, 7-4

BASE RUNNING SETTLES ISSUE

Heavy Hitting Glendale Team Beaten Here Sunday.

Battling through rain on a wet diamond before a small gathering of faithful, shivering fans, the Klamath Falls Red Sox came through for a 7 to 4 win over the Glendale Loggers Sunday on Modoc field.

The hard-slugging Loggers out-hit the Sox, but by clever base-running, assisted by several free passes off Johnson in the early part of the game, the Red Sox were able to keep pace with the Glendale boys.

Glendale scores first

Glendale got off to a flying start with two hits in the second and one run. The Sox came back and tied the score. In the fifth frame, Glendale opened up its big guns and slammed three hard hits through the infield, scoring two runs. The Sox exactly duplicated when they came to bat, touching Johnson for three hits, while two men crossed home plate. In the sixth each team scored once, tying the score 4 to 4.

At this point in the game Carlstrom, due to a sore arm, was replaced by Turpin. In the remainder of the game, Turpin allowed the Glendale Loggers four hits, but they were never able to score. The Sox were more fortunate off Johnson, and slammed out three hits in the seventh to score two more runs. Turpin scored again in the 8th after being sacrificed around the base by his team-mates.

Next Sunday the Red Sox and Pelicans battle it out on Modoc field.

Wrestling Interest at Peak With Approach of Chick-Belcastro Match

Wrestling will hit an all-time high in Klamath Falls Tuesday night when the two leading heavyweights of the season, Dude Chick and Pete Belcastro, meet to settle an issue existing for many weeks.

The issue—which is the better wrestler—is simple, but the manner of finding an answer will be difficult.

Mack Lillard, promoter, said Monday morning that the reserved seat sections were almost gone. More than 1000 general, however, will not be placed on sale until after 7:00 o'clock at the armory ticket window.

Belcastro, the junior heavy-weight champion of the coast has not lost a match in Klamath Falls this season. Jumped into prominence when it was learned he had downed two opponents in the same evening at Marysville. The rugged Klamath grappler earned a \$50 side bet. He has agreed to meet Chick to beat each wrestler in one fall in matches not to last over an hour.

Belcastro was in Klamath Falls Monday making ready for his second meeting with the cowboy from Wyoming. The first ended in a draw.

Lillard said Chick had spent the past week in Medford where he kept fit by playing golf and fishing.

Chick has the best record of any grappler to appear in Klamath Falls. He has won all his matches here and has lost but one fall.

The first match with Belcastro went the full hour limit without a fall.

Tuesday night one or the other grappler will emerge with a victory. By making the affair a no-time-limit match, Lillard has removed the possibility of another draw.

Both men will weigh around 195.

The struggle between Ted Christy of Los Angeles and Juan Vigario of Portugal was drawing considerable interest. The match is billed as the semi-windup. It will be Vigario's first showing in Klamath Falls.

Bob Kennison of Gold Hill meets Al Stecher of Canada in the one-hour opener.

Troeh Wins Title; Klamath Gunners Place High

LA GRANDE, Ore., June 8. (P)—Through the reverberating echoes of the Oregon State trapshoot, Frank M. Troeh of Portland emerged today as the state's best pigeon cracker.

He won the Oregon all-around championship with a score of 340 out of a possible 350, and scored a perfect 100 to pace the Portland five-man squad to victory yesterday in the Oregonian telegraphic shoot. His other triumphs were in the doubles event Saturday and the singles yesterday.

The Portland team cracked 489 of a possible 500 targets to win the team shoot. Eugene's team was second, with a score of 477, followed by Bend with 470; Corvallis, 469; Tillamook, 467; Salem, 466; Klamath, 466; Heppner-Pilot Rock, 465; Medford, 464, and La Grande, 458.

The 1937 state tournament will be at Salem, it was decided at the annual business meeting.

In winning the singles event, Troeh was forced to shoot off against Tom Carpenter of Monroe and O. G. Hillbrand of Wasco, after all finished with scores of 197. Troeh broke 25 targets in the shoot-off while Hillbrand went out on 24 and Carpenter on 22.

Those scores 96 from 24 yards to win the handicap. C. A. Dunn and W. E. Fisher each scored 95, with Dunn winning the shoot-off.

Herman Peterson of Dillon, Mont., topped the field in the singles with 199-198, but being an outsider was ineligible for the state title.

Los Angeles' baseball Angels, accustomed in recent years to breathing the purified air of the stratosphere and in the last few weeks to the dank atmosphere of the Coast league cellar, took a whiff of the clear air normally inhaled by human beings.

Sunshine and light came back into the Seraphs' life when they took a series five games to two from the San Diego Padres. They were materially aided by the current circuit leaders from Seattle, who shoved the Sacramento Senators down into the cellar four games to 1.

Rain Mars Schedule
The only three games played Sunday were won with the aid of pitchers who bats connected at the right time. The Angels split a double header, 4-2, 2-7, while the San Francisco Seals struggled 13 innings to win from the San Francisco Missions, 5-2.

Rain shut off games in Portland and Seattle.

Jack Salveson broke a 2-2 deadlock in the ninth at San Diego and won his second game of the series by tripping and scoring on Don Hurst's single.

Just as heroic was the performance of Wally Herbert, whose left-handed hurling won both of the Padres' games during the week. He hit a homer with one on to lead a four-run fourth inning rally in the nightcap.

Error Decides Game
At San Francisco little Ken Sheehan was aided by Eddie Joost's error, the only miscue of the game. Sheehan led off in the twelfth with a double, and was on third with two away when Ted Norbert bounced an easy one to the Reds' third baseman. In his eagerness to make the last out, Joost dropped the ball and Sheehan came home with the deciding run. Two more scored before the side was out.

Twelve thousand watched the long pitchers' battle between Sheehan and Wayne Osborne. The Missions took the series 4-3.

Rain kept Oakland and Portland off the field most of the week, the Beavers winning from the Oaks, 2-1.

DAT CHAMPION HITS STRIDE

Arky Vaughan Pulls Up Toward .300 Mark in National.

Take it from Arky Vaughan, the National league batting crown won't be given up without a fight.

The heavy hitter of the Pittsburgh Pirates is making that much clear by his stick-work these days.

Slow to start, Vaughan has come along fast at the plate in four weeks, has pulled up 38 percentage points in less than 21 days, and is now batting just a shade under the .300 mark.

Hits in 10th Game
Of course, that's still far off the .385 mark he posted last year to win the title. But consider his steady, uninterrupted rise since mid-May, while most of the leaders have been falling off sharply, now that the heat is on. Consider, also, that he has been hitting better than .385 since before June 1.

Vaughan hit in his 19th straight game Sunday, getting three singles in five times up to set the pace as the Bucc collected 18 hits and clubbed the Phillies 6-2.

The victory left the Pirates just one percentage point off third place in the National league standings, since the Chicago Cubs won out the Phillies 4-3 behind Curt Davis' tight pitching to maintain their advantage.

Dean Downs Glants
The Cardinals continued to lead the pack, downing the second-place New York Giants 6-3, as Dizzy Dean, the top big-league pitcher, chalked up his 11th win, taking the mound with only 48 hours rest.

The New York Yankees, meantime, pulled their American league lead out of the fire and stretched it to 2 1/2 games by outlasting the Cleveland Indians 5-4 in a 16-inning struggle, while the second-place Boston Red Sox were losing their jinx hold on the Chicago White Sox and were getting snowed under a 16-hit attack, Philadelphia 15-31, 3-26.

The Detroit Tigers, hard-hit by injuries, but still fighting for their world's championship, replaced the Indians in third place by staying off the Senators' closing rally, through the able relief pitching of Rickey Lawson in the ninth, to win 10-8.

The Boston Bees threw off the assault of the Cincinnati Reds on the National league's fifth place by coming through with an 8-3 triumph, while the St. Louis Browns downed the Athletics 9-5, to move within a game of sending Connie Mack's crew into the American league cellar.
