Impressive discussion of the availability of Senator Stewler of Oregon, convention keynote speaker, measured against a possibility that a mid-western neighbor of Landon's, Senator Dickenson of Iowa, might get the nod.

French Miners Call Walkout

PARIS, June 8. (AP)—Coal miners in northern France numbering 150,000 called a general strike today a few hours after 1,000,000 other workers had won a complete victory in the "folded arms" refusal to work.

Workers in Paris building trades also began a walkout to enforce the five point agreement which ended the 14-day strike after Premier Leon Blum's "New Deal" government interceded for organized labor.

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Another Gasoline Reduction Likely

Further reductions in freight rates on gasoline from bay points to Klamath Falls, which may mean another cut in gas prices here, have been reported from the railroads, according to Secretary Reynolds of the chamber of commerce.

Reynolds was informed that the rate, now 40 cents per cwt., will be cut to 35 cents on June 15. Another cut to 30 cents is scheduled for July 15.

Recently, after considerable agitation on the part of the chamber of commerce, reductions were made from previous high rates, and the gas price was knocked down one cent. The chamber particularly pleaded for equality with Rogue valley points.

Stand Collapses; Forty-Two Killed

BUCHAREST, Rumania, June 8. (AP)—While 50,000 people knelt in prayer, a grand stand at a Boy Scout review collapsed today, killing about 42 persons.

An official statement said only three persons were killed, with more than 100 hurt; police said 30 were dead and several hundred injured; the latest unofficial figure showed at least 150 hurt in addition to those killed.

King Carol, Crown Prince Mihai, and the Dowager Queen Marie saw the catastrophe. The grandstand fell as 30,000 spectators and 20,000 Boy Scouts knelt in prayer in a religious service preceding the review.

The shrieks of the injured drowned out the voices of the priests intoning the service through loud-speakers.

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Britain Defaults on War Debt Issue

WASHINGTON, June 8. (AP)—Great Britain defaulted today on its semi-annual war debt installment to the United States.

In doing so it advised this government that inability to pay was due to reasons "no less valid now" than when it first suspended all payments in 1934 on the ground of prevailing economic conditions, and the fact German reparations payments had been halted.

Formal notice that Britain did not intend to pay the \$665,474,071 installment due on June 15 was contained in a note transmitted to Secretary Hull by Sir Ronald Lindsay, the British ambassador.

"All that the convention will be expected or permitted to do," he said, "will be to sign, as usual, on the dotted line."

"And, also typical as it is of the republican party, graciously the opportunity to endorse that candidate who likewise has been selected in advance. . . . The 1936 republican convention will be reminiscent of the one in 1920 in still another respect. The Chicago gathering in the earlier year was merely a marionette show, the strings controlling the principal actors of which were held in the hands of Boss Boies Pasrose.

"The convention about to open will also be controlled by an absentee boss, who, in this instance, will be William Randolph Hearst."

The cabinet member also asserted the republican platform would be "the result of an alliance between the republican party and the Liberty league," with former President Hoover as "orthopedic." Frank Knox as "orthopedic," J. Edgar Hoover as "orthopedic," and Senator Borah supplying "an anti-monopoly bib as well as tucker."

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Reckless Driver Sentenced Monday

Chain Letter Craze Reflected in Postal Receipt Comparison

Postal receipts for May, 1936, totaled \$7,695,19, a decrease of 15.79 per cent from May 1935, when the chain-letter craze swept the country, and receipts totaled \$9,138,29.

May 1935 showed a gain of 46.85 per cent over May 1934, according to Assistant Postmaster R. L. Griffith, who stated that chain letters were responsible for approximately 40 per cent of the gain in receipts in 1935.

Allowing for this figure, the normal receipts in May of this year, would show a gain of 15.73.

The gain of May 1936 over May 1934 is set at 23.65 per cent, according to the assistant postmaster.

Chinese Leader Predicts Peace

NANKING, June 8. (AP)—Gen. Chiang Kai-Shek, leader of the Chinese national government, stated tonight he was confident there would not be civil war between north China and south China, and that there would be no war against Japan.

"I am sure," said the generalissimo, "the leaders of Kwangtung and Kwangsi provinces (comprising south China) will not seize upon the diplomatic policy of the central government as an alibi to start a civil war."

Sultan Dies

MANILA, P. I., June 8. (AP)—Moros thronged into Mainbong on the island of Jolo for the burial today of Sultan Jamalul Kiram, the last Mohammedan ruler of Sulu. The once powerful sultan died Sunday night of kidney trouble.

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
