MARKET UNSETTLED BY CROP REPORTS

CHICAGO, June 8.—(AP)—Pessimistic crop reports from spring wheat territory did much to rally prices late today, and almost overcame losses occasioned by light to good rains north-west.

Fair support for the Chicago wheat market came about through resting orders to purchase on declines. There was also some buying of wheat against sales of corn.

Wheat closed steady at the same as Saturday's finish to 1 cent off, July 84-84 1/2, Sept. 84 1/2, corn 1-1/2 advanced, July 60 1/2, oats 1-1/2 off, and provisions varying from 2 cents decline to 10 cents gain.

Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, June 8.—(AP)—The stock market strode into a rally today that lifted selected issues one to two or more points. Steels and specialties led the procession. The come-back was attributed partly to a turn for the better in European news, as well as indications of continued domestic economic progress. There was profit-taking in the final hour, but the close was firm. Transfers were around 700,000 shares.

A boost of 1.3 points to 49.5 per cent of capacity in the steel mill operating rate gave a fillip to this section of the list. It was the best week's upturn since the period of April 20. U. S. Steel climbed more than two points at its best.

Montgomery Ward and General Motors reported sales for May were best for this month in the history of these companies. The former was up a point or so and the latter held a fractional advance.

Other prominent gainers included Bethlehem, Republic Steel, Johns Manville, Westinghouse, J. I. Case, Air Reduction, Allied Chemical, International Harvester, Deere, Crown Cork, Dupont, American Telephone, Western Union, Radio, American Water Works, Public Service of New Jersey, Cerrito de Pasco, Sears Roebuck, New York Central and Great Northern.

Curtis Wright was relatively lively, and a shade lower as trading in "when-issued" rights of the company started on the exchange.

The French franc recovered substantially and sterling was heavy. Bonds did better.

Malin Postoffice Receipts on Rise

MALIN, June 8.—In a communication recently received by Mrs. Maud Thomas, Malin postmistress, from the first assistant postmaster general, Mrs. Thomas was advised that total receipts of the local office have increased appreciably during her term of office, which automatically increases the salary of the incumbent.

In order to be eligible for such an increase, the office must have maintained an increase for three quarters of the fiscal year. A fluctuating increase is not recognized. Mrs. Thomas will have held her present position a year next July.

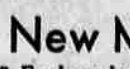
