

Heavyweights Settle Wrestling Issue Tonight

Junior Baseball Eliminated

Legion Not to Enter Race for State Title This Year. Pop Warner Facing Major Operation.

No Junior baseball this year. The American Legion, busy with its forthcoming Fourth of July celebration, will put its junior baseball program on the shelf for this season at least. The game has been well-organized in Klamath county for many years, and scores of youngsters have participated. While outstanding talent has been discovered, Klamath has never gained the distinction of entering the state finals. On several occasions the club has reached the last round of the district championship, but each time it has been eliminated. The only Legion baseball this season will be one game against Medford.

Glenn Scobey Warner, 65, is seriously considering undergoing a major operation on his left hip to fit him for his 42nd season of football coaching this fall.

The operation is made necessary by an accident Warner suffered while hunting in South Carolina 30 years back. Pop has limped for the past 10 years as the result of the injury, but it did not start to handicap him severely until two years ago.

Warner, now in his old home town, Springfield, in western New York, barely is able to walk with the aid of a cane. The operation is calculated to put him on the job at Temple University in September in top shape.

Going under the knife would prevent Warner from taking in his third Olympic games, something he would regret exceedingly, particularly in view of the fact that his name is being used in connection with two different European tours. Football's foremost play-maker planned to make the trip with his old Stanford staff and current Temple line coach, Fred Swan.

A young Indian named Jim Thorpe made the first Olympic junket of Warner, then athletic director of Carlisle, a memorable one in Stockholm in 1912.

Webfooters See Fine Prospects for Next Season

EUGENE, Ore., June 9 (P)—The return of 10 lettermen, bolstered by half a dozen outstanding freshmen, gives University of Oregon a promising outlook for track next year, Coach Bill Hayward said today.

Strength will lie in the middle and long-distance runs and in field events, while the sprints are a question mark.

Six lettermen will be lost from the team which won three of four dual meets this year and topped all northern division teams in the coast conference meet at Berkeley. They are: Captain George Scharpf, miler; Carson "Bud" Shoemaker, sprinter; Arne Lindgren, broad jumper; Howard Patterson, quarter-miler; Marvin Janak, pole vaulter and high jumper, and Edell Bryant, distance runner.

Lettermen returning are Sam McGahey, miler and two miles; Chandler Berry, Bill Foskett, Leonard Holland, shot put and discus; Elmer Koskelo, javelin; Frank Lloyd, broad jumper; Jim McDonald, Gilbert Schultz, quarter-miler; Francis Sinnette, hurdles, and Ken Milne, half-mile. George Varoff, ineligible this spring, was expected back to display his 14-foot pole vaulting.

COWBOY READY FOR BELCASTRO

No Time Limit Set For Main Event Match at Armory.

One of the two leading heavy-weight wrestlers of Klamath Falls will be eliminated from the undefeated class at the armory tonight when the long-standing champion, Cowboy Dude Chick and Pele Belcastro is settled.

Chick, although held to a draw in his first meeting with the junior heavyweight champion of the Pacific coast, will rule a slight favorite when the main event gets underway. The cowboy from Wyoming will also be the most popular of the two grapplers. Belcastro, standing with the Klamath Falls wrestling fans has diminished recently with his reversion to rough tactics.

Prelims at 8:30
If advance tickets can be taken as a true indication, Mack Lillard, the matchmaker, says the huskiest wrestling audience of the season will see the struggle. While nearly all the reserved seats have been exhausted, about 1000 generally will go on sale at the armory ticket window around 7 o'clock.

The preliminary match between Bob Kennaston, Gold Hill, and Al Stecher, Canada, is scheduled for 8:30 o'clock. This will be followed by a semi-windup featuring Ted Christy of Los Angeles and Juan Vigario of Portugal.

No Limit Set
No time limit has been placed on the Belcastro-Chick battle, thus assuring a winner. A decision can be awarded only if one or the other grappler is unable to continue the match.

Lillard has appointed Ray Friable as referee for tonight. Because of the ex-Medford man's experience both as a wrestler and official, the matchmaker declared he was the only available man qualified to handle the matmen.

While Belcastro's title as the coast junior champion will not be risked, the athletes are eager to protect their unofficial joint-championship of the city. Since coming here last winter, the cowboy has dropped but one fall. With the exception of a first meeting with George Wilson and another with Belcastro, he has won every match. These two ended in draws.

Belcastro has won every match here this season but one—the draw with Chick two weeks ago. Two weeks ago Belcastro escaped Chick's fatal airplane spins while the cowboy was equally successful in avoiding Pete's dropkicks and body slams.

The wrestlers will be about equal in weight.
Lomski Takes Third Straight Comeback Win

CHICAGO, June 9, (UP)—Leo Lomski, Aberdeen, Wash., who once took a decision over Heavyweight Champion James J. Braddock, scored the third victory on his comeback trail Monday, when he gained a third-round technical knockout over Adolph Welter, Green Bay, Wis., at Marigold Gardens.

Lomski punished Welter with rights to the heart for the first two frames, and in the third smashed a terrific right to the jaw. Welter went down for an eight count. He was virtually helpless when he arose, and the referee stopped the bout after several more blows. Lomski weighed 186, Welter, 191.

Max Schmeling's Boss Concerned by Louis' Hands

NAPANOCH, N. Y., June 9. (P)—Joe Jacobs, whose first idea for seeing that his fighter, Max Schmeling, didn't get the worst of it in his scrap with Joe Louis a week from Thursday was to raise a hullabaloo about "sneak" punches, has come up with another suggestion.

Jacobs wants the New York state athletic commission to adopt the International Boxing Union custom of bandaging the fighters' hands after they have entered the ring. Union officials seal the bandages in a box at the weighing-in ceremony and don't break the seal until the men are in their corners. Without accusing anybody of anything, Joe says that ought to be tried at the Yankee stadium June 18.

Schmeling was slated to resume serious work today with six or eight rounds of boxing after a week's rest, and has given his sparring partners notice to expect the worst.

James Jeffries Predicts Easy Win for Louis

SAN FRANCISCO, June 9. (P)—James J. Jeffries, old time former heavyweight boxing champion of the world, predicted today that Joe Louis will knock out Max Schmeling "any time he pleases" in their forthcoming fight in New York this month.

"From what I've seen of the colored boy in motion pictures I'd say he is entirely too much for the German," Jeffries said.

"He moves too fast and throws too many punches for Schmeling." The old-time ring star, who retired undefeated only to make a disastrous comeback attempt against Jack Johnson in 1910, offered the opinion the late Bob Fitzsimmons would have whipped Louis easily.

Asked how he thought he would have fared against Louis, Jeffries smiled and said: "Well, I licked Fitzsimmons a few times."

Spina and Brown Signed for Fight Next July Sixth

PORTLAND, Ore., June 9 (P)—Al Spina and Buzz Brown will settle their argument over which is unofficial state featherweight champion in an open-air 10-round fight here July 6.

Weeks of discussion over weights to be made ended when Spina signed contracts at a special meeting of the boxing commission last night. The fighters must make 126 pounds, ringside, between the first and second preliminary fights. Promoter Donald Owen said.

While Brown was in the east defeating the Canadian featherweight champion, Spina rose to fistic fame recently by knocking out Tuffy Pierpont, Young Tommy and Frankie Castello as well as winning numerous other fights.

The fight will be at Multnomah stadium.

Tortin Winner in Golf Event

Seattle and Oakland, running one-two in the Pacific Coast league race grabbed the spotlight with their series at Emeryville.

Manager Dutch Ruether's Indians, who dearly love the home park, capitalized on a two weeks stay there by clambering into first place, while the Acorns, afflicted with battered thumbs, ineffective pitching and injuries, rapidly were whittled down to size. Their tailspin reached a climax in Seattle, where the Ruether hirelings won seven out of eight games two weeks ago.

Only two games out of first place, the Mission Reds invade Los Angeles, now reposing in seventh place. Portland, fifth in the standings, clashes with the last-place Senators in Sacramento, while the San Diego Padres, aside from the Oakland setback, the opening games will be played under the lights.

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 9. (P)—Tommy Burns, one-time world heavyweight champion, likes Max Schmeling, but he concedes today he likes Joe Louis better.

"Louis reminds me of another negro—Joe Gans—who was the world's lightweight champion for 12 years more than 30 years ago, and, if I were a betting man, I would have to back Louis every time he starts for some year to come," Burns said in an article for the Canadian press.

Burns said he had witnessed most of Schmeling's fights. "I am convinced this will be the first real test for the 'Brown Bomber,'" he said.

Burns said he did not believe Schmeling lost his title to Jack Sharkey at Madison Square Garden bowl, "at least not according to all the rules of boxing."

ODELL LAKE, Ore.—Odell lake has been proven a real paradise for fishermen during the past few weeks. Dostie disagreeable weather, enthusiastic sportsmen are seen on the lake daily, and both trollers and fly fishermen have been rewarded with excellent catches, both as to the number and size of the fish taken.

Great numbers of dolly varden, rainbow and silver-sides have been taken on flies, while trollers report fish of unusually large size. The honors for large fish to date go to Charles Slevens, a week and visitor from Oregon City, who landed a dolly varden which measured 34 inches in length and weighed 15 pounds. Pat and Russell McCollum of Klamath Falls tied for second place, each bringing in a 12-pound dolly. The largest rainbow reported to date was taken by Mrs. J. T. McCollum while trolling in waters near her home. All of the above mentioned fish were caught on a Heddon-Basser spook plug, a lure with a very erratic action.

A nine-pound mackinaw, or lake trout, was caught by Mr. Arnold, a guest at Odell resort, who also took a smaller fish of the same variety. Arnold thus proved a master that has often been speculated upon by local fishermen, who have not known whether these fish, brought from Lake Superior and planted in Odell, have ever reproduced in these waters. Heretofore but a few mackinaw have been caught, all ranging in weight from 17 to 45 pounds.

The assurance that these fish really do spawn in Odell is most gratifying to those anglers who like to go after the big ones, and Arnold is to be congratulated on bringing this assurance by bringing in a little one.

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CUBS EXTEND RUN OF WINS

Chicago Takes Fifth in Row; Record on Home Field Recalled.

On their Wrigley Field, the Chicago Cubs won the 1935 National league pennant, putting together the greater part of their famous 21-game winning streak. Now, in another home stand, they have begun a brand new winning streak to join in with the Cardinals and Giants in the hot 1935 race.

The Cubs have won five straight on their home lot now and by trouncing the Phillies 3 to 0 Monday as Larry French revived last year's pitching form they landed only a game and a half behind the second place New York club and five behind the league-leading Cards. Even better, from the Chicago viewpoint, the Cubs and Giants are all square in the losing column although the Giants have won three more.

The Cubs couldn't shake off the pesky Pittsburgh Pirates, the club they ousted from third place by a single percentage point a few days ago. While French was blanking the Phillies with eight hits and whiffing six to chalk up his first complete game in his last seven starts, Cy Blanton was performing a similar feat to give the Pirates a 2 to 1 decision over the Dodgers.

The Giants, meanwhile, took a 7 to 3 drubbing from the Cincinnati Reds, who blasted Harry Gumbert out with three runs in the fifth then battered Frank Gahler for a four-run winning rally in the eighth as Paul Derringer hurled steady ball. The Cards and Bees had an off day.

In the American league the Yankees stretched their lead to three games with a 12 to 3 rout of the Browns while their nearest rivals, the Red Sox and Tigers, mauled each other in a doubleheader. The Sox provided excellent support for Lefty Grove in the opener to win 6 to 3. They failed to provide the same backing for Fritz Ostermeier, however, and Detroit pounded out a six-run sixth inning and a 12 to 7 triumph.

The day's only other game saw the Athletics beat out the White Sox, 5 to 4, in the tenth when Pinky Higgins singled home the winning run after intentional passes by Johnny Whitehead had filled the bases. The Cleveland-Washington game was rained out.

Lou Gehrig and Joe Di Maggio, the iron man and the rookie of the Yankee slugging array, shared the honors in a 16-hit assault upon St. Louis hurling. Each whalloped a home run, Gehrig making his eleventh of the season, and a single, and in between Lou smacked a double and "De Mag" a triple.
