RAINS CAUSE CONCERN IN FARM REGIONS

PORTLAND, Ore., June 10, (AP)—Rains benefited wheat in eastern Oregon the past week, but fell in such quantities in western Oregon that hay and strawberries were damaged in many places, E. L. Wells, federal meteorologist, said today.

Rains are cloudy weather interfered with strawberry picking and caused some rotting. Development of other fruits also were retarded and control of pear blight in Jackson county became difficult.

Pastures Are Good—Pastures are generally the best in years, and milk production is high, Wells said. The cool, wet weather was unfavorable for turkeys, particularly around Roseburg.

Early potatoes made a heavy growth of vines in the Willamette valley. Most garden crops needed warmth and sunshine.

Lambs were ready for market in Curry county and strawberries the best in years.

Cherries and prunes were dropping considerably in Washington county. Some hay crops were lodged or soaked after cut, but others were excellent.

At Turner in Marion county early potatoes made a heavy growth of vines. Prune, pear and cherry crops were light. Pastures were extra good, but some hay crops were lodging.

Herries Too Wet—Other county reports: Linn—Winter wheat, vetch and peas lodging.

Lane—First cutting of alfalfa in progress. Weather adverse for spraying apples and pears. Hay crop excellent, but damaged by rain.

Douglas—Early cherries ripe. Later hatch of turkeys poor at Elsie. Dry weather needed for haying. Pastures best in years.

Jackson—Development of pears retarded by cool, showery weather; blight increasing and difficult to combat. Some alfalfa cut and wet in the field.

Hood River—Strawberries ready, but too wet to pick. Sherman—Rain helped all wheat greatly; winter wheat heading.

Gilliam—Rains greatly improved prospects for all wheat; harvest will be later than usual.

Umatilla—Rain helped all grain. Some cut alfalfa wet. Pastures excellent. Some lambs marketed.

Union County—Considerable damage to winter wheat from recent heat, but rains this week improved greatly. Cherry crop fair, apples light.

Wallowa County—Plenty of rain for present; wheat, meadows and pastures improved.

Jefferson—Sheep shearing completed; haying awaiting better weather.

Klamath—Cool and cloudy; crops made little growth.

Baker—Best weather for grain crops in years; pastures and range excellent.

Malheur—Poa picking started. Yield excellent; abundant rain produced unusually good crops. Some hay down, but too wet to haul.

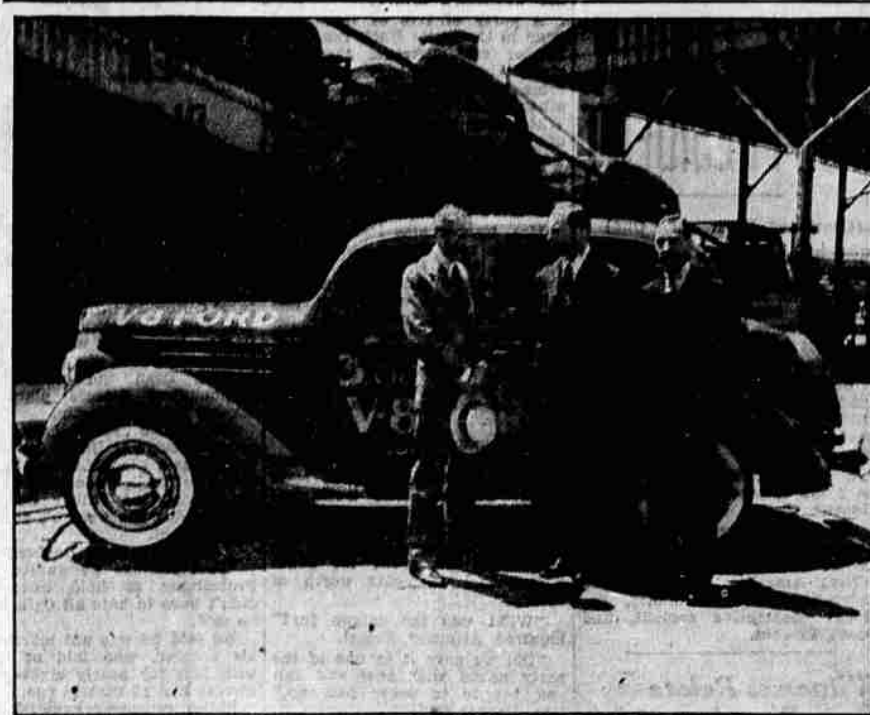

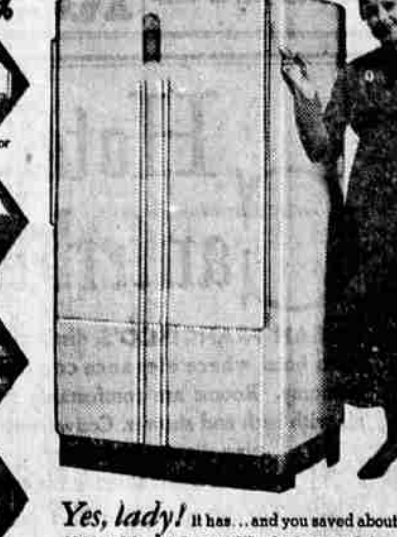
