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MORE TRAVEL REGISTERED IN LAVA BEDS

Travel into the Lava Beds National monument this year has far exceeded expectations, according to Ranger Don Fisher. Season's total to date is within a few hundred of total for all of last travel season, he said.

On June 10, approximately 4000 persons had visited the lava beds this year. Thirty-three states, England, France, Belgium, Sweden, Indiana, Cuba and Hawaii were represented.

Two temporary rangers are on service at the lava beds in addition to Fisher. Brenton Finch, a geologist, and Stanley Woodruff, Klamath Falls, are the men on the job.

Four CCC boys have been selected as guides. They are in training now. Guide service will be provided for any parties needing this help, if a call will be made two hours in advance to Ranger Fisher, through the Tulelake operator.

Roads are in much better shape. All of the approach roads are being re-built. Shikyu county has graded the road to the state line to the biological survey camp, and Clear Lake CCC camp has improved the road from there to the boundary. Roads inside are graded every week.

Modoc forest has improved the road from Perez to the east boundary of the monument. The road from Crescent butte to Mammoth crater has been rebuilt, and Shasta Forest has extended the improvement to Medicine lake. Fishing in the lake, incidentally, is reported as excellent.

The road to Glass mountain is open and improved. A geologist and an historian are in the monument, or expected shortly, to carry on scientific and historical investigations of the interesting area.

Bly Residents Ask Court For Jail Structure

A petition signed by 41 citizens of Bly asking construction of a jail in the east county community was received Wednesday by the county court.

The petition pointed out that a town 55 miles from the county seat and serving a population of 1000 was without facilities of any kind for housing prisoners. The cost of transporting prisoners to and from Klamath Falls would eventually offset the cost of a jail building, the petitioners declared.

The court revealed that it had been considering a jail at Bly for more than a year and would attempt, if possible, to include the project in next year's budget. Sheriff Lloyd Low planned to look into the cost of second-hand jail doors while attending a crime conference in Portland. It was understood.

Tulelake Potato Grower Arrested

Timothy Lehane, 68, Tulelake, is in the Jackson county jail, charged with selling mislabeled potatoes.

Lehane was arrested on Green-springs highway by a state police officer as he was driving this way after leaving Medford. Taken back, he was sentenced to pay a \$75 fine by Justice Coleman in Medford court. When he could not pay the fine, he was sent to jail.

LATE UPSWINGS NOTED IN WHEAT

CHICAGO, June 11. (AP)—Late upswings of wheat values today much more than overcame previous setbacks.

Bullish behavior of spring wheat markets, Minneapolis and Winnipeg, served as a basis for buying here as the day drew to an end. This tended to discount optimistic reports of domestic winter wheat yields.

Wheat closed firm, 1-1/2 above yesterday's finish; July 84 1/2-85 1/2, Sept. 85 1/2; corn unchanged to 1/2 higher, July 61 1/2-62, oats 1 1/2 to 1 1/4 up, and provisions 2 cents to 12 cents advanced.

COMMISSION UPHELD IN LIQUOR CASE

Circuit Judge Edward B. Ashurst Wednesday sustained the state liquor commission's revocation of the Little Duck Inn beer license.

He did so after two days devoted to hearing the appeal of Jane and Eugene O'Shea from the liquor commission's action, during which they placed 23 witnesses on the stand to prove that they had run an orderly establishment.

Evidence Reviewed
Judge Ashurst, in handing down his decision, cited the discretion as to licenses given the liquor commission by the legislature, reviewed the evidence in this case, and recalled the fact that the license was revoked after the commission had held a hearing.

While the Little Duck Inn may not have been an annoyance to the persons who testified at the circuit court hearing, the judge said, it was evidently regarded by the liquor commission as a nuisance to the community as a whole. The judge said there was not sufficient evidence before him to show that the liquor commission had committed a breach of discretion in revoking the license.

Government vs. Liquor
"It is fundamental that liquor must be controlled by the government," said Judge Ashurst. "Otherwise, the government will be controlled by liquor."

"In this connection," he said, "consider the fact that candidates for public office appeared on this witness stand to testify for the appellants in this case." "There is no doubt," said Judge Ashurst, "that plug-uglies have invaded the O'Shea's place, and other beer establishments, and made nuisances of themselves. That is something those investing their money in such places will have to anticipate."

Judge Ashurst's ruling in the case followed a day during which happenings at the Little Duck Inn the night of April 15, were rehearsed again by witnesses for the defendant liquor commission. It was on that night that Charles Harper was allegedly cracked on the head by

Eugene O'Shea, proprietor of the place, arrested some time ago in this case.
