

Helen Jacobs Loses in Wimbledon Tourney

KAY STAMMERS SCORES UPSET

Defending Champion Put Down in First Round Match.

WIMBLEDON, England, June 11. (AP)—England's bid to break America's five-year possession of the Wightman cup started spectacularly today as left-handed Kay Stammers defeated Helen Jacobs, American title-holder, 12-10, 6-1. In the opening singles match of the best four out of seven series for the international tennis trophy. The first set was the longest in the 14 years' history of cup competition.

After Miss Stammers outlasted Miss Jacobs in the curtain-raising match, 12-10, 6-1, Miss Round made it two straight for England by vanquishing Mrs. Fabryan, 6-3, 6-4, to give England a 2-0 lead.

Cowboy Faces 13th Match

Chick Unbeaten Since First Appearance Against Hollis On January 14. Only Two Falls Dropped.

Dude Chick wrestles his 13th match in Klamath Falls next week against Alvin Britt, the Kansan who is recognized as the junior heavyweight champion in 32 states. The Wyoming cowboy isn't superstitious and he looks for no interruption in his record of victory.

No wrestler brought here by Mack Lillard, matchmaker and promoter, possesses a record anywhere near as impressive as the cowboy's. Chick may have dropped a match here and there in other cities, but in Klamath Falls he is supreme.

Chick first wrestled in Klamath Falls on January 14. Since then he has won ten matches and been held to draws in two others. George Wilson and Pete Belcastro got draws with the cowboy in their first appearances against him. When they met him in return match, each was beaten. Wilson, an all-American football player for the University of Washington in 1925, dropped Chick for a fall with a flying tackle. Belcastro put him down with a drop kick. Those are the only falls the cowboy has lost. He has won all other matches in quick order and with one fall—his airplane spin.

Here is the record of the cowboy's matches at the academy:

Belcastro—First match ended in draw with no falls; Chick won the second when Belcastro was unable to come back following an airplane spin.

Wilson—First match ended in a draw, with each grappler taking one fall; Chick won the second match when Wilson missed a flying tackle and injured his neck.

Frank Taylor, Toledo, Ohio—Lost to Chick twice through airplane spins.

Al Karasick, Portland—Unable to recover from the damage of an airplane spin.

Deshong stops Sox

Last January, the Yanks gave up Deshong and Jesse Hill to Washington in exchange for Jump Hadley and Roy Johnson. To date, Deshong is taking his regular turn on the mound for the Sox, and has chalked up seven wins against three losses. Hadley is just "another guy named Joe," so far as the Yanks are concerned.

Deshong shut out the Chicago White Sox with two hits Thursday for a 2-0 victory. Hadley, meantime, was one of five pitchers McCarthy sent to the mound before the Yanks subdued the Tigers, 10-9 in 10 slugging innings.

The Yanks, however, could not increase their 2 1/2 game first-place edge, for the Red Sox came from behind to down the St. Louis Browns, 7-5. The seventh-place Athletics turned the trick on the Cleveland Indians, 5-2.

Cubs Defeat Bees

The head of the National league race tightened up on the strength of the Chicago Cubs' 6-4 win over the Boston Bees, to move into second place over the idle Pittsburgh Pirates. The St. Louis Cardinals' lead was sliced to 2 1/2 games when the post-setters were roundly belted by the lowly Phillies, 12-4, for the first time this season.

"Killer" Spirit Instilled in Black Contender for Title.

LAKEWOOD, N. J., June 12. (AP)—Joe Louis' handlers here finished their hardest job. Into the heart of the cherublike negro boy from Detroit, they have forever instilled the spirit of the "killer" who shows his foe no mercy until he lays stretched out on the canvassed floor.

Five Partners Battered

"Joe knows now; he's got it in his head 'n' good," said Trainer Jack Blackburn. "He knows now that the only referee worth while to him am the referee he carry around in his fist. He know now that the only way to win is to smash 'em down 'til they can't get up no mo'."

As Joe battered five sparring mates yesterday in an indoor workout, you could see the spirit of a destroyer—a killer of the ring—on his set, sullen face. Not once did he smile when his human punching bags tried to stall for time with a fleeting smile that he wiped off quickly with thudding right uppercuts.

Blackburn grinned encouragingly at the Brown Bomber as he levelled his pitiless blows. During a brief let-up, he shouted:

"C'mon now boy, give it to 'em; that's what spawing partners are fo'. Swing dat right, boy. Swing it hard."

A terrific right uppercut unquestionably will be the blow that Louis will aim at Schmeling's chin. Except for jabbing purposes, the Brown Bomber has kept his left inactive during his long training, working and developing his right uppercut. Development of the blow has made his exhibitions slightly less interesting, but more devastating for the sparring mates.
