ILLUSTRATED TALK
PLANNED ON SUNDAY

Sunday evening at 8:00 o'clock in the First Presbyterian church, the Rev. Walter Couden will deliver an illustrated lecture on Alaska. This is at the union meeting of the Methodist and Presbyterian congregations.

Mr. Couden has lived in Alaska and visited various sections of the territory, and has a thorough knowledge of its economic and industrial resources as well as possessing special information concerning the religious work that has been carried on there. His pictures are among the most beautiful ever presented of Alaska. His artistic ability is revealed in the photographing of many scenes never before given to the public.

Mr. Couden is appearing before the various service clubs of the city, and is spending two weeks in this vicinity. He has spoken before churches, service clubs, and general gatherings all along the coast, and many organizations report his lecture "the best yet".

The address will emphasize the religious work that has been done and is being done in Alaska. In particular the work of the Presbyterians on the coast and that of the Episcopalians inland will be dealt with.

PARK CONSTRUCTION
WORK WILL START

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK, Ore., June 12. (Special)—Preparations are underway for the resumption of rim road construction around Crater lake. Two contractors, A. Milne & company of Portland and Pierson and Von der Hellen of Medford, are starting the establishment of camps for summer activities.

The Milne company has the contract for surfacing with gravel 13 miles of the rim road from the north entrance ranger station to Cloudcap on the east side of the lake. The grading of the remaining four miles to Kerr Notch will be completed this summer by the Von der Hellen and Dunn & Baker concerns.

It is probable a bid will be awarded early this summer for the grading of a portion of the remainder of the route from Kerr Notch to park headquarters. This particular route will open up a new section of the park to motorists but yet will be built so as not to detract from the general landscape values.

OFFICIALS START
ON HIGHWAY TOUR

SALEM, June 12. (AP)—Governor Martin and 15 other state and federal officials and newsmen left here today on a six-day trip to inspect the Idaho-Oregon-Nevada highway, and on their return route will visit in Idaho, Nevada and California. The party is traveling in four large automobiles.

Following the rose show parade at Portland during the morning, the party will go to Pendleton for dinner tonight and a short meeting of the state highway commission there tomorrow morning.

Leaving Pendleton, the party will lunch at Baker tomorrow noon, and will arrive at Caldwell, Idaho, in the afternoon, where it will be met by J. H. Stemmer, director of highways of Idaho. Tomorrow night the party will stop at Jordan Valley, where it will be met by Robert A. Allen, state highway engineer for Nevada.

Sunday the party will visit at Reno, Nev., to start the return trip Monday morning via Susanville and Alturas, Calif., for Lakeview, where the group will spend the night. Tuesday the trip to Bend will be made, and Wednesday the officials will return to Portland and Salem.

In addition to Governor Martin the party will comprise Chairman Henry F. Cabell of the state highway commission, and Mrs. Cabell; Ed A. Aldrich of Pendleton and F. L. Touvelle of Medford, highway commissioners; State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock; J. H. Smith, Herbert Glaisyer and W. C. Williams of the highway department; W. H. Lynch and T. M. Davis of the bureau of public roads; G. V. Lintner, federal unemployment official; Ray Conway and E. B. McDaniel of the Oregon Automobile association, and three newspaper men.
