Synopsis of Republican Platform as Adopted by Delegates at Cleveland

CLEVELAND, June 12, (UP)—Following is a summary of the 2600 word republican platform as adopted by national party convention last night.

An invitation to all citizens of all parties to support the republican party in defense of the constitution and in support of the platform is made in the preamble.

To Guard Constitution
The preamble is phrased in the words of the Declaration of Independence in several parts and the platform ends with a paraphrase of the words of the original republican platform of 1855.

The preamble also declares that the campaign cannot be fought this year on the traditional differences between the republican and democratic policies.

A series of charges is presented against the New Deal reciting in detail the opposition of the party to any attempt to undermine the constitution or change the American form of government.

State Relief Supervision
The committee wrote a plank declaring that the only solution to the unemployment problem is the "absorption of unemployed by industry and agriculture." It called for abandonment of all

New Deal acts that raise production cost, encouragement of legitimate business, and withdrawal of government from competition with private business.

The platform said administration of relief was the "major failure" of the New Deal and demanded a return of relief administrative activities to non-political state agencies "familiar with community problems."

Unemployment Survey
The relief plank also urged federal grants to states and called upon them to put up a proportionate share of the costs. It also demanded construction of public work projects "on their merits."

The relief plank also calls for prompt determination and facts concerning relief and unemployment.

On the subject of social security, the platform proposes a system of old age benefits based on:

1.—A pay as you go government policy which would require each generation to support the aged of its generation.

Direct Tax on All People
2.—Every American citizen over 65 years of age to receive supplemental payments necessary to provide a minimum income of sufficient scope to pro-

tect him or her from want.

3.—Each state and territory complying with simple and general standards to receive a graduated contribution in proportion to its own.

4.—To make the program meet sound fiscal policy federal revenues would be obtained from a direct tax widely distributed on all people.

The platform condemns the New Deal's unemployment insurance and old age pensions program as unworkable and one which will deny benefits to two thirds of the nation's people.

Labor Plank Brief
The labor plank is brief. It states that the welfare of labor rests on increased production and prevention of workers' exploitation. The plank guarantees the right of labor to bargain collectively through a "representative" of its own choosing.

On the constitutional question raised by the supreme court's decision in the law affecting minimum wages and hours, the platform advocated "support for adoption of state laws and interstate compacts, abolition of the sweat shop and child labor and protection for women and children in hours, wages and working conditions."

Monopoly Plank Tossed Out
"We believe this can be done within the constitution as it now stands," the platform said, using almost the exact language expressed by Senator William E. Borah.

The committee tossed out Borah's drastic monopoly plank, but strongly pledged the party to "employ the full powers of the government to the end that

monopoly shall be eliminated and that free enterprise shall be fully restored and maintained."

There was no mention of Borah's demand for prevention of holding companies beyond the second degree.

Borah opposed decentralization of relief administration but made no fight on the plank.

13-Point Farm Program
A 13 point farm program will be dangled before the rural voters in an attempt to win them away from the New Deal. Victory or defeat for the republicans will swing largely about the unpredictable 15,000,000 farm votes.

The farm plank twitted the administration by declaring that since it had adopted the republican soil conservation ideas as its own, the agricultural issue could not be removed from politics and isolated to the spot in which it belongs—as an economic and social problem.

The republicans then advocated:

Acquisition of abandoned and

non-productive farm lands by the government for public use; aid to those farmers who plant soil conserving instead of cash crops and who develop new crops suited to American soil; promotion of industrial use of farm products by applied science; retention of the domestic market for the farmers; imposition of effective quarantines against livestock, dairy and other farm products from countries having inferior sanitary laws; provision of ample farm credit at rates as low as those enjoyed by other industries; non-partisan control of the farm credit administration and federal land banks; payment of reasonable benefits upon the domestically consumed portion of exportable surplus crops in order to make the tariff effective; encouragement and further development of cooperative marketing; federal assistance in disposing of surplus crops through expansion of foreign trade and aid to producers suffering from temporary disaster.

It was one of the strongest

and longest planks in the entire platform and embodied all the ideas proposed by Landon.

Grazing Permit Appeals Heard

ALTURAS, Calif.—The first hearing held in Modoc county on an appeal from the Taylor grazing advisory board's permits was held last Friday before U. S. Regional Director of Grazing Brooks. The U. S. district attorney present was J. A. Leach, who did the questioning. Charles Lederer, attorney, represented George and Mary Hudspeth, the appellants, and E. C. Bonner represented C. E. Cummings.

Hudspeth was appealing from a permit issued to him cutting the number of cattle he could graze from 250 to 200. The other appellants, of which there were several, stipulated to a survey being made of public domain.
