Girl Scout Executives To Attend District Camp This Month.

Mrs. Earl D. Gilbert, local director of Girl Scout activities in Klamath county, who won the Pacific northwest scholarship for the district scout instruction camp at Alderbrook, Calif., will leave for that place at the end of this month. Miss Ella Redkey, leader of the high school Scout troop, will also attend the camp.

Alderbrook is located in the San Bernardino mountains, 80 miles from Los Angeles.

Thousands of American Girl Scouts are marking off the days of their camp opening. With over 100,000 Girl Scouts in camps last year the national organization anticipates the biggest camping year in its history, according to Mrs. Paul Rittenhouse, national director.

Training courses for camp directors, instructors in arts and crafts, waterfront activities, outdoor pageants and plays, nature hikes and studies and many kindred subjects are being given now by members of our national training staff in all parts of the country.

Mrs. Rittenhouse said: "These courses will cover a wide range of interests from that of leaders for girls in the seven to ten year age group, to Mariner courses for skippers and mates of Mariner "ships," to older girl scout troops. This course outlines the backgrounds and principles of the Mariner program and its place in Girl Scouting. It covers navigation, marine nature lore, sailor handicrafts, international flag signaling, signaling and traditions, life saving, boating and canoeing, sailing and water safety. It also includes planning and taking a three-day cruise.

There will be camps this year where girls may spend their whole vacation; others where Girl Scouts may camp for shorter periods with their own troop leaders and day camps within city limits for those girls who will be unable to leave the city during their summer holidays.

"Our Girl Scout camps are usually as far from the highways as they can get them," Mrs. Rittenhouse explained, "and in camp the girls live in small units or family groups—not en masse. Because their leaders are trained to be more like older sisters than directors, the camps are not conscious of external control. They plan their own programs and when possible, choose their own menus and cook their own food."
