

Red Sox Score Victory Over Klamath Pelicans

STRONG WINDS CAUSE ERRORS

City Rivals of Southern Oregon League Settle Dispute Sunday

Despite a dust and wind storm in Klamath, a good-sized crowd of fans turned out at Modoc field Sunday afternoon to witness the Red Sox take the Pelicans into camp by a score of 15 to 7. The game was thrilling throughout due to much local interest and rivalry between not only the players, but many of the fans as well.

Due to the severe wind and blowing sand on Modoc field, numerous errors on both teams were made, but this apparently did not kill any of the interest in the game, as the fans were very much in evidence throughout the game.

Sox Lead at Start
The Sox, first at bat, jumped into the lead with a single by Harold Hammericksen, fast outfielder. Wheeler, next up, lashed out a hard-driven home run over the center-fielder, making the score 2-0. The Pelicans came back in the first inning and scored once when Donaldson walked and Molatore tripped.

The game from this point on became a "see-saw," with the Sox scoring a few runs and the Pelicans tying the score. At the end of the third frame, the game was tied, 4-4. By the end of the sixth inning, it was again tied, 7-7.

The Sox, fearing a possible loss, got out their big bats and went to work. By heavy hitting in the eighth and ninth frames, the Sox drove out 6 hits off Brown, scoring 3 runs. The Pelicans were less fortunate off Carlstrom, the Red Sox ace pitcher holding them for two hits and no scores in the last three innings.

15 Men Fanned
The Sox were jubilant over beating Brown, who formerly was on the Red Sox squad. Brown was released last week at his own request and this was the first time he had faced his old-home squad in a Southern Oregon league game.

Clyde Carlstrom, stocky curveball artist for the Sox, struck out 13 men during the game and kept getting stronger the farther the game progressed. Cecil Haley led his team in hitting by slugging out three hits in his four times at bat. Donaldson, for the Pelicans, led his team in hitting, getting two hits in four times at bat.

Britt, though none too well known in this part of the coast, has met and beaten almost every heavyweight appearing here this season.

Frank Taylor, Bob Kenaston, Cecil McGill, Ted Christy and others were put down in the elimination rounds of the big tournament.

Christy survived all rounds and met Britt in the finals. The Kansas won two of the three falls. Chick, who stands undefeated in Klamath Falls after 12 hard matches, recognized Britt has a serious threat to his record. In fact, there are many wrestling fans here who have placed the Wyoming cowboy on the short side of the odds.

Both men will wrestle over the Junior heavyweight limit of 190 pounds.

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CUBS CAPTURE 11TH STRAIGHT

Chicago Leaves on Eastern Swing After Setting Season's Mark

When batting might hooks up with pitching strength on the same baseball combination, fireworks are the general result.

That's the answer to the current poll-mell parade of those climbing Chicago Cubs, now riding high, wide and handsome on top of an 11-game winning streak, longest run in the big leagues this season.

Leave on Tour
It wasn't only that they suddenly came to life at the plate, or in the mound. But when they hit both at the same time—the resultant explosion is no more than can be expected.

The big question mark now is: Can they continue, away from Wrigley Field, as they've done at home? They start the eastern swing Tuesday, and thereby probably hangs their hope for catching up with the pace-setting St. Louis Cardinals by July 4.

The long successful home stand ended Sunday with Frank Demaree's two homers accounting for all the runs as the Boston Bees fell 3-2 and Lon Warneke chalked up his third win of the victory streak, his second straight seven-hitter in five days.

Dean Beats Phillips
The triumph, however, didn't cut down the St. Louis 3½ game lead even a fraction. The gas house gang hooked up in a wild slugging spree with the Phillies and came out on top 12-10, as Dixie Dean, going to work with only 24 hours rest, went in as a relief pitcher to end the game.

The two leaders pulled away from the third place Pirates, as the New York Giants snapped their own five-game losing streak and the Bucs' seven-straight winning run at the same time, with Hal Schumacher turning in a five-hit performance for an 8-0 edge.

Winding up the league program, the Cincinnati Reds climbed to a .500 average for the campaign by trimming the Dodgers, 5-1, on the strength of Lee Stine's four-hit hurling job.

With the Yanks-Tigers and St. Louis-Boston battles rained out, the American league saw the Athletics knock the Indians into fourth place with a 8-6 victory, advancing Detroit to third, while Vernon Kennedy's tight pitching gave the White Sox a 6-4 margin over the Senators.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 15. (AP)—Birdies on the last two holes gave Roy Wiggins, Oswego Lake, a one-up victory over 18-year-old Allan Mills, Portland for the Oregon Golf association's 1936 championship.

Marian McDougall of Waverley won the woman's title Saturday afternoon with a one-up victory over Nancy Hurst, Portland, in an 18-hole match.

Don Moe, who tied with Eddie Hogan for medalist honors, won a playoff with a 37 to Hogan's 39.

First flight honors for women went to Mariel Veatch, Portland, over Mrs. C. W. Hamilton, Hood River, 3 and 2.

Louis Cyr, Peninsula, defeated C. W. Scott, Alderwood, 3 and 2, for the men's first flight championship.

Wiggins got off to an early lead in the 36-hole final match, turning the first nine holes five up when Mills' game cracked and he needed a 42 to Wiggins' 37.

Mills recovered on the second nine with a sub-par 33, wiped out Wiggins' lead and went to lunch 1 up.

Mills returned to reel off a string of birdies, one of which Wiggins contributed to unwillingly on the 27th when Mills' approach struck Wiggins' ball and dropped in the cup, putting Mills three up.

Rich Sportsman Hurt in Racing Accident Sunday

SEATTLE, June 15. (AP)—Victim of a runaway outboard racing boat which injured 15 persons on a Green lake beach, the driver, Adolph B. Spreckels, 28, wealthy San Francisco sportsman, was in a serious condition today in a hospital, where physicians worked to save his left arm.

Spreckels was hurled from his boat, when it struck the shore, and his arm impaled on a telephone pole climbing spike where he hung until spectators got him down. The boat leaped onward into the crowd and stopped against a truck.

Only one spectator, Ord Lockhart, who had been watching the races from a wheel chair, was seriously hurt. Physicians believed he would recover.

Attendees at the hospital where Spreckels lay unconscious refused to give out information about his condition.

H. J. Rahn, Seattle, a business associate and personal friend of Spreckels, said, however, the physicians believed they would save the arm, lacerated from the shoulder to the elbow, unless infection developed.

Mrs. Spreckels, the former Dorothy Bell Endicott of Eugene, Ore., was in the grandstand when the boat charged into the crowd. She spent the evening at the hospital and then went to the Rahn home.

Swimming Ace Graduated at Seattle School
ALMIRA, Wash., June 15. (AP)—Jack Medina, the Washington Athletic club swimming star, stepped up for his diploma at the University of Washington today with the claim to two new world records under his cap and gown.

At an "Olympics carnival" on the smooth water of Blue lake, near here yesterday, Medina turned loose the pressure to beat the officially recognized world records in the 500-yard and 500-meter free style swims.

The sensational W. A. C. women's quartet followed Medina's example to beat the world record in the 400-yard free style relay. The events were over a 50-yard course under the eye of Ray Daughters, coach of the W. A. C. swimmers and the Olympics team. He said the A. A. U. will be asked to recognize the marks.

Medina swam the 500 yards in 5:43, a second better than Ralph Flanagan's official mark, and the 500 meters in 6:12.8, better than Flanagan's 6:13.4.

The relay team—Betty Lee, Doris Buckley, Mary Lou Petty and Olive McKean—turned in 4:09 in their event. The Women's Swimming association of New York holds the recognized record of 4:23.6.

Edith Pemberton, 14, also of the Athletic club, lowered the 50-yard breast stroke northwest record from 44 to 35 seconds.

Stanford Stars Given Diplomas
STANFORD UNIVERSITY, June 15. (AP)—The "vow boys" of Stanford who made life decidedly unhappy for coast football teams during four seasons, were looking for new worlds to conquer today.

Clad in caps and gowns, the group of Stanford players who as freshmen in 1932 swore that University of Southern California should never beat them, received their diplomas yesterday along with a thousand-odd other students of the "farm." They had kept that vow.

Bobby Grayson, Bones Hamilton, Frank Alustia, Keith Tompkins, Monk Moscrip, Woody Adams, Larry Roubie, Wes Muller, Bob Reynolds, Alex Trompas, Harry Carlson, Ray Todd, and Alf Handin—some all-Americans, some sons—were part history here when they clutched their diplomas.

"It's nice to see them together as graduates as they were as freshmen," Coach Tiny Thornhill said, "but it's awful tough to see them go. They were my football team."

Joe Unconcerned by Rumpus Raised Over Bandages
LAKEWOOD, N. J., June 15. (AP)—To Joe Louis all the hullabaloo Joe Jacobs, Max Schmeling's manager, has been raising over the amount of bandage and tape the Brown Bomber will be allowed to use on his hands when he clashes with Schmeling Thursday is just so much noise.

Advised that Jacobs, who had previously said he would like to have the bandages adjusted after the fighters enter the ring, intended to take up the matter of the amounts used, Louis indicated it didn't make any difference to him.

"The commission allows me only six feet of bandage and two feet of tape. That's all I had on in the Baer fight and my hands were swollen afterward," he said. "Maybe they ought to let us use more. But why all the yelling? I'll fight bare handed if they like that."

After battling his sparmates around again before the Sunday crowd, Louis planned a rest today. Tomorrow he is slated for a final workout, including some boxing.
