

FARM REGIONS REPORT HEAVY CROP DAMAGE

Pass area. A thunderstorm struck Medford but only minor crop damage resulted.

Trees were uprooted and sheds blown down in an electrical storm in Douglas county Sunday. Rain and hail lashed the Cascades. Streams rose rapidly. Grain fields were flattened and a few fruit trees were stripped.

Fruit Trees Suffer

To the north at Eugene, 85 was reported, accompanied by thunder and a brilliant electrical display. Damage to hay, hops and fruit was feared, with hay probably the principal sufferer.

A quarter of an inch of rain, accompanied by thunder and lightning, deluged Salem.

A Marquam farm family was stunned momentarily by a lightning bolt which split a large oak tree and sent it crashing across a road. Field crops were beaten down near Silverton and Silver creek rose several feet. Trees were uprooted and roads blocked in some parts of Marion county.

Cloudy weather and intermittent rains were general today and the forecast was "unsettled, mostly cloudy, showers."

Millions in Bonus Bonds Go to Vets

veterans eagerly awaited delivery of \$3,000,000 in bonus payments, sent by registered mail.

Postmaster E. T. Hedlund instructed veterans to be at the address they gave, to insure prompt delivery.

Each envelope will contain government bonds in \$50 denomination and a check to make up the balance due.

Officials of the World War Veterans State Aid commission at Salem did not have spending statistics, but stated much of the bonus money would go to pay indebtedness, some for building improvements while many veterans will purchase automobiles and other merchandise.

Funds were arriving in most of the 36 counties in the state today for immediate release in \$50 baby bonds. Veterans must identify themselves in order to receive the bonds, since they can not be assigned. Jerold Owen, secretary of the veterans' commission, said, "The number of veterans in each county was not

OREGON SUM LARGE
PORTLAND, June 15. (AP)—The 27,600 Oregon bonus applicants certified for settlement by the treasury department through the Portland veterans' office will receive \$15,183,377.89 in bonds but the total accruing to the state will more nearly approximate \$20,000,000.

Dr. Paul I. Carter, manager of the veterans' administration in Portland, said \$20,679,034.90 was provided for Oregon veterans under the congressional act. He said thousands of veterans, in addition to the 27,600 certified through his office, will receive their bonus direct from Washington in instances in which they have borrowed front banks.

The average amount available for the 27,600 applicants was \$550.14.

Total available under the congressional act set the Klamath figure at \$702,616.17.

"INCIDENT" UNKNOWN
SALEM, June 15. (AP)—Wallace S. Wharton, executive secretary to Governor Martin said today he had no knowledge to what E. R. Bryson, of Eugene, referred when he said he had resigned from the state relief committee because of the "Wharton incident."

Bryson issued a statement in Eugene Saturday in which he stated he had resigned from the committee several weeks ago, "partly for business reasons and partly because of what he termed the 'Wharton incident.'" In the statement Bryson claimed that the governor's executive secretary was precipitating the relief committee into politics and had misinformed the governor.

Wharton said also he could not recall any such action as Bryson claimed in his statement. The executive secretary declared he was "at a loss to understand him."

Members of the governor's staff here today said they had not seen Bryson's resignation, nor knew anything about it. Governor Martin was scheduled to be in Lakeview tonight on an inspection trip with the state highway commission.

The relief committee situation arose when the governor issued orders to Elmer R. Goudy, state relief administrator, to keep the state expenditures for relief within the cash income of the state liquor control commission. Governor Martin had refused to sign certificates of indebtedness against anticipated revenues for relief, but ordered the liquor commission to turn over \$100,000 more to take care of an overdraft of about \$24,000 and other checks which may be issued for relief during June.

Wharton said many letters of commendation on the governor's stand had been received at the executive office from "responsible parties."
