

TRUAX, KERNS RETAIN POSTS WITH SCHOOLS

In an astonishingly heavy vote, Dr. L. L. Truax and J. W. Kerns were re-elected to three-year terms on the board of school district No. 1 Tuesday.

Truax polled 422 votes and Kerns 421 to win the two positions open. Lynn Roycroft, a third candidate, got 70.

The vote ran several hundred per cent higher than usual in city school board elections and kept the clerks busy until a late hour compiling the returns.

County School Superintendent Fred Peterson Monday night had yet received no returns on the county school board election, also held Monday. E. T. Crawford, Merrill and Harry Wilson, Malin, were running for the one open post. Direct reports from the candidates' home precincts, however, showed Wilson holding a slight lead in the south-end.

Although the candidates had to represent the south-end district, residents of all parts of the county were permitted to participate in the balloting.

20 PER CENT OF CLIP NOT SOLD

PORTLAND, June 16. (AP)—The Journal said today a survey indicated that about 20 per cent of the 1936 wool clip of the Pacific northwest was unsold or in warehouses.

The bulk of this supply is held by large interests which expect better prices at a later date, the survey said.

There has been some speculative and eastern mill buying at price limits which the average operator cannot meet through eastern connections, the report declared.

The recent sale of 300,000 pounds of wool of the Condon pool here was viewed as a demand for volume, the price ranging from 27 1/2 to 29 cents. None of it went to local mills.

"These prices reflect what is now actually known in the trade, that Boston representatives have had their price limits reduced," says the report. "While the reduction in possible offers is merely a fraction or so, it indicates that recent extreme prices were more or less of a flash and scarcely represented general trade conditions."

The tone of the Willamette valley market was described as quiet, with the 33-cent price received in that recent Roseburg pool causing sheepmen to hold for higher offers.

PORTLAND, June 16. (AP)—Butter showed an advance for undergrades with tops unchanged. The differential between extras and standards is now only 10¢ lb., a condition due to the extreme demand. Butterfat unchanged.

Eggs showed a firm tone with a further advance of 10¢ dozen in standard mediums on the exchange while on the open market quality stuff was keenly sought. Cheese continued of strong character generally with 4¢ lb. added to the former price on the exchange. On the open market Tillamook maintained its recent world's highest price.

BOSTON WOOL

BOSTON, June 16. (AP)—(U. S. Dept. Agr.)—Fine wools had a fair call in the Boston market. Good twelve months Texas wools brought 86-88 cents scoured basis, and choice clip moved at around 87-88 cents. Fine Ohio Delaine was sold at grease basis prices in the range 35-36 cents, but trade appeared to have slackened a little compared with last week. Prices were very firm in all transactions.

UPTURNS OCCUR ON WHEAT MART

CHICAGO, June 16. (AP)—Skepticism that any material benefit to domestic spring crops would result from scattered rains led to a decided upturn of wheat prices late today.

Strong absorption of offerings on declines contributed to rallies of wheat values in the final transactions and more than overcame earlier losses. Some reports said much domestic spring wheat in drought areas of wide extent had been damaged beyond repair.

Wheat closed nervous, 1-3 above yesterday's finish, July 35-35 1/2; Sept. 89 1/2; corn 1-1/2 up, Sept. 59 1/2; oats 1-1/2 advanced, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 15 cents.

Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, June 16. (AP)—The steel, rail and selected specialties donned their climbing clothes in today's stock market, and gains of fractions to 3 or more points predominated.

The list apparently found stimulation in improved industrial news, with less apprehension over foreign affairs. Transfers were in the neighborhood of 1,000,000 shares.

The congressional tax controversy was said to have kept many traders on the sidelines.

Profit-taking was light throughout. Among the popular issues were U. S. Steel, Youngstown Sheet & Tube, Bethlehem, National Steel, Santa Fe, Southern Pacific, Great Northern, N. Y. Central, Delaware & Hudson, Western Union, Consolidated Edison, North American, Radio, United Corp., Curtiss-Wright, Murray Corp., Chrysler, Deere, Coca-Cola, Du Pont, Westinghouse, Firestone, U. S. Rubber, Allied Stores, Associated Dry Goods, Goodyear and U. S. Pipe & Foundry.

Woolworth was up more than a point as sales were currently reported to be running some 7 per cent ahead of last month. J. I. Case was about 8 higher at its best.
