Notice to Farmers—Farmers who have already signed work sheets in the agricultural conservation program will not need to attend the sign-up meetings scheduled for this week and next, according to C. W. Henkle, assistant county agent. The meetings are being held only for those who have not yet signed work sheets and who desire to do so, although notifications were mailed to all basin farmers, including many who had already signed. Schedules of the second payments in the program have been received by Henkle, who stated that he had the information on file and would be glad to give it to any who wished it. The county average on number one payments is \$12.90 per acre, although payments vary on individual farms.

Down in the south-end, where the two men live, considerable "electioneering" featured the campaign, and each polled heavily in his own community. Wilson received 229 votes at Malin, and Crawford got none there. Crawford's vote at Merrill was 198 to 8 for Wilson.

Drunken Driving Charges Filed

Returns from 248 precincts gave Benson 16,281 to 5,444 for Johnson.

Democrats Prepare For Convention

WASHINGTON, June 16, (AP)—Plans for the democratic national convention opening in Philadelphia next Tuesday were gone over at a luncheon conference today by President Roosevelt and Chairman Farley of the democratic national committee.

Farley told reporters he will leave Friday for Philadelphia. If the congressional situation permits, Senator Wagner (D-N.Y.), who will head the resolutions committee, will go that day.

Although no definite announcement has been made, it is expected that J. E. Mack, national committeeman from New York, who placed Roosevelt in nomination at Chicago four years ago, will do so again.

STATE LABOR PUTS BLAME UPON COURT

throughout the state was asked in the resolution supporting the sheep shearers' union, unless the state Woolgrowers' association, at their meeting in January of next year, recognize the union, pay the fixed wage and agree to hire union labor.

WPA Official Speaks

The main address of the short session was delivered by Walfred Shuholm, director of WPA employment in Oregon, and representing State WPA Director E. D. Griffiths. Shuholm commended the labor unions for their tolerant and cooperative attitude during the last year in connection with WPA work. He stated that only one minor walk-out had taken place, and that the friendly attitude of the unions had been helpful in making the WPA a success in Oregon.

Shuholm is a member of the Portland plumbers' union. President E. D. Nickerson, at the close of the speech, explained the WPA set-up and said that it dove-tailed with private industry while helping union members over periods of unemployment.

Fish Bill Discussed

A short speech in support of a new initiative bill forbidding seals and traps on the Columbia river was made by E. H. Stork, representative of the Columbia river fishermen's union. Petitions are now being circulated to bring the bill before the next session of the state legislature, he said.

Joe Clark, international vice-president of the painters' and decorators' union, was introduced to the convention and made a short speech before adjournment.

The convention will reconvene at the Labor temple Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock. Various committee meetings will be held tonight at the Willard hotel, convention headquarters. Prospects increased Monday night for at least two bitter battles on the floor of the 34th annual convention of the state federation of labor here, as the convention's resolutions committee struggled in a "smoke filled hotel room" to prepare its reports on the controversial issues.

Question of the desirability of the 4-L seemed certain to draw fire. A resolution introduced Monday urged that the state federation denounce the organization as "harmful to the interest of workers and a menace to industrial recovery." It asked the convention to pledge its utmost endeavors to "assisting the

organization of workers in the lumber industry" independently of the 4-L, and to "exposing the spurious nature of the 4-L."

Neutrality Policy Offered

The faction fighting the 4-L charged that the organization is a company union on the scale of a whole industry and that it has acted as a strike-breaking organization in the workers' battle for higher wages.

A second major struggle appeared imminent over the matter of a rigid neutrality and anti-war policy for the federation, and the question of labor organization on the basis of industries furnished fodder for a possible third sharp dispute.

Plenty of Dynamite

That there is plenty of dynamite in the convention ready for a contest of any degree became evident Monday afternoon when delegates argued heatedly over proposed minor amendments in the convention rules of order before rejecting them all.
