

CITY VOTES ANTI-NOISE ORDINANCE

The city anti-noise ordinance, which has caused more loud argument in the council chambers for the past three weeks than any other ordinance introduced for some time, was finally passed to its third and fourth reading Monday night and adopted.

The last draft of the ordinance included suggestions from the Klamath Ad club, which recommended that all educational and non-advertising sound equipped trucks, such as safety campaign vehicles, etc., be granted a non-fee permit, and other advertisers who wished to use public address systems on city streets be charged \$10 a day license fee to be paid to the city. All such licenses are to be issued at the discretion of the council. Several representatives of the Ad club were present.

Van Camp Deplores Speeding
Another controversial subject, that of clearing automobiles off city streets from 1 until 5 a. m. in accord with city ordinance in order that the street sweepers' day work, was brought up Monday evening, and the council voted unanimously that the police department enforce the ordinance to the strict letter of the law.

Councilman J. E. Van Camp brought up the matter of speeding on city streets, and suggested that traffic policemen devote their time to catching speeders who jeopardize lives of pedestrians instead of tagging machines which have been parked over the time limit.

All members of the council agreed that the situation was serious, and the matter of putting another motorcycle policeman on duty was discussed.

Van Camp Laments Dogs
Van Camp also complained about the dog situation, declaring that there were more unlicensed dogs running at large than before the Klamath Humane society took over the management of the situation. He demanded that action be taken, and that these animals be taken up by the humane officer until licenses were paid.

G. Q. d'Alban, accountant who has audited city books for some time past, was retained to audit the books for the last six months' period, up to July 1, 1936.

A delegation of property owners from Tenth street, which is designated as a truck street, presented a petition to the council, asking that the state highway be routed over Tenth street instead of North Ninth and Prospect streets. They declared that the dust from the unpaved street was a nuisance, and that vibrations from heavy trucks were wrecking the foundations and chimneys of their homes. They also stated that using Tenth street as the highway would eliminate several bad curves from the present route.

The matter was turned over to City Engineer E. A. Thomas and will be taken up with the Oregon highway commission.

Property Sale Authorized
An ordinance authorizing contracts of sale of property upon which the city has foreclosed, to Dr. A. A. Soule and Mr. and Mrs. C. B. House, was introduced, passed to second reading, and adopted after third and final reading upon declaration of an emergency.

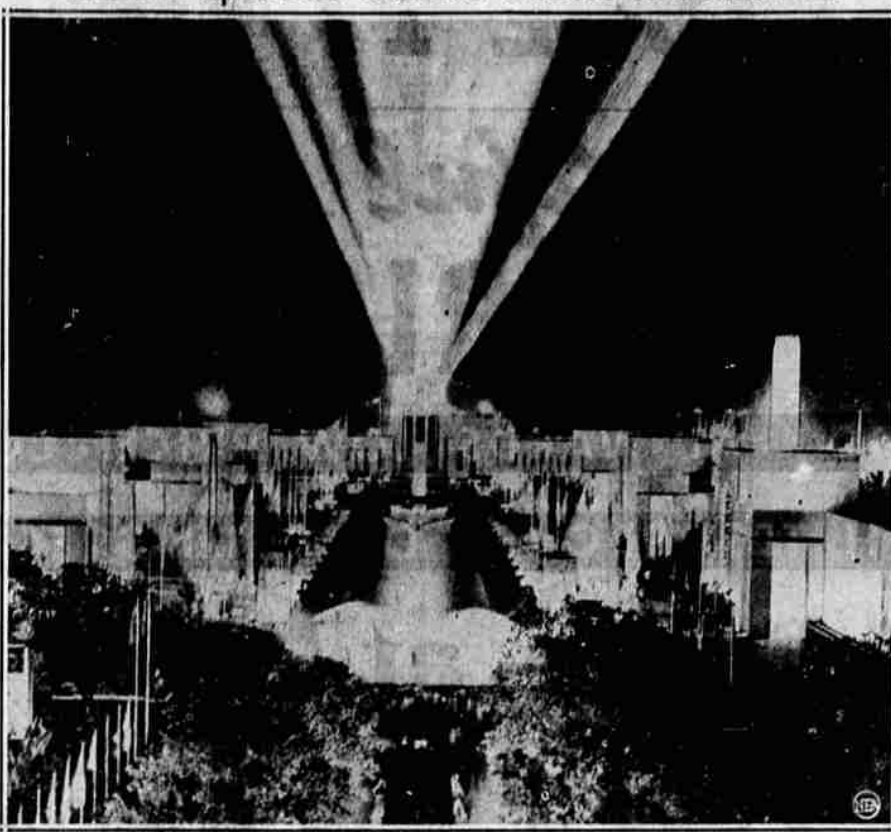
All building permits and applications for licenses which were authorized by proper inspectors were allowed by the council.

SQUIRREL POISON CAMPAIGN PUSHED

Landowners in Klamath county are urged to rush squirrel poisoning in the next week or 10 days as the season is drawing to a close and the rodents will soon begin to refuse grain.

Squirrels go into hibernation very early, about July 1st, except in mountain districts, according to County Agent C. A. Henderson.

Just prior to hibernation they eat only succulent greens and drink water, and refuse all hard food so that poisoning is impossible.

Poisoned grain is available at all county stores and at the county agent's office. Approximately 16,000 pounds have already been mixed and sold and more is available for the wind-up of the poison season.

CHAMBERS RECALLS EARLY YEARS HERE

Barney Chambers, proprietor of the Klamath Gun Store, has spent more than 30 consecutive years in business here.

Recalling the old days, Chambers remembers that when he came to this section of the country, Klamath Falls had a population of 300. There were 12 saloons in the town.

Years ago Chambers was in the cattle business and took a homestead in Oklahoma, 17 miles northwest of Guthrie across the Cimarron river. This was in 1889. Previous to that he worked loading cattle at Quapaw, Okla. When cattle were ordered moved out of that territory, Chambers came to Oregon.

He arrived here from Keno on the steamer Klamath.

For some time before coming here he worked as a government agent under U. S. Marshal Payne, receiving this commission in Kansas City. He operated on the north and south forks of the Red river.

Because of his activities in the cattle business and being an experienced rider, Chambers is especially interested in the rodeo here for the Fourth of July celebration.

STORM WARNINGS UP ALONG COAST

PORTLAND, June 16. (AP)—The coastguard hoisted small craft warnings today as a 22-mile wind struck the Oregon and Washington coast and swept more moisture-laden clouds over the interior.

Rain was forecast for tonight and Wednesday in the west portion of the two states.

Torrential rains the past few days wrought considerable crop damage in western Oregon, splitting cherries, harming new mown hay and causing further spread of downy mildew in hop yards.

The lighter rains east of the Cascade mountains were generally beneficial to grain growers.

20 Feared Drowned As Steamship Sinks

BUDAPEST, Tuesday, June 16 (UP)—Twenty persons were believed drowned today when a river steamer carrying 70 passengers capsized in the Danube.

The steamer was returning from Danube island with a pleasure party and capsized near the Neupest section of Budapest.

Nine bodies were recovered. The ambulance corps and the fire department swept the river with searchlights. All available police patrol boats were called out.

Klamath County Bids For Grange Meeting in 1938

Klamath county's delegation to the state grange convention at Lebanon returned here last weekend to report to local grange members on an important and instructive session.

Klamath made a bid at Lebanon for the convention in 1938. The 1937 convocation will be held at The Dalles.

The returning delegates said the advice to all grangers was to go home and get busy forming a hydro-electric district so that their district can buy power from the Bonneville dam project.

TALLINN, Esthonia, June 16. (UP)—Fifty persons were feared killed and 39 seriously injured in an explosion of an army laboratory Monday.

The laboratory was situated in a woods eight kilometers from Tallinn. Cause of the explosion was unknown.

Reserve army officers were attending a special instruction course in the laboratory and of 180 known to be present, only 90 had been accounted for to-night.
